



As a boy, Pendleton S. Clark always liked to "draw things." He has cultivated the liking into almost 50 years of architectural

Clark, born Feb. 21, 1895, in Lynchburg, is the son of John Robert and Bessie Pendleton Scott Clark. His father was a local tobacconist with the firm of Clark & Collins.

Clark received his education in Synchburg public schools and at Augusta Military Academy. He graduated from the latter in 1910. "A person who wanted to be an architect at that time." Clark said, "had to work with a firm for two or three years prior to going to college."

Back To School

Clark came back from military school and went to work for Beard & Cardwell for a year. He then shifted to Preston Craighill. After receiving his apprenticeship, Clark enrolled in the architectural school at the University of Pennsylvania.

"At that time," Clark recalled, Pennsylvania was the leading school of architecture in the counby. It had won several notable prizes in architecture.'

Clark said, "I went to school three years and graduated with **a** certificate of architecture. Altough the course took only two years to complete, I went an exto year to get some additional work in architectural design and Estory."

Enters Navy

Upon completing his work at Pennsylvania in 1917, Clark had wait a couple of years before he could actually begin practicing what he studied so long to do.

He entered the Navy soon after graduation and was sent to the Naval Training Station at New Gleans. Following a short tour in Louisiana, he entered the officer's training program at the U. S Naval Academy at Annapolis, ĽΜΩI.

Four months later he emerged as an ensign. Until his discharge, he served on USS Missouri with the Atlantic fleet and aboard the USS Huron with the transport ship with Walter R. Crowe under

He holds the Victory Medal with one star, American, European and Asiatic theater ribbons, Phillippine Occupation ribbon, Naval Reserve Medal and the bronze star.

Clark has had other interests. A former president of the Lynchburg Kiwanis Club, he was chairman of the City Planning Commission for three years. He is a member of the naval advisory committee for the Fifth Naval District.


