Ben Cunningham has been a leader in efforts to improve our living en—vironment for over thirty years and has made significant contributions, both in practice of community planning and in public service through the AIA R/UDAT Program.

digest

He has been a persistent advocate of comphrehensive approaches to improve our living environment. The careful integration of the natural and built environment has been his focus in creating settings for the work of other architects, as an urban designer, and as a leader bringing a community together.

As Director of Planning and Design for the Jonathan New Town he led the planning and design work which received national recognition for its sensitivity to the environment and design excellence. His leadership created a framework for excellent design by excellent architects.

As Director of Planning and Design for the Park Forest South New Town, he directed a major revision to the comphrehensive plan that included an intensive citizen participation process that ended a stalemate and assisted in the preservation of an environmentally sensitive area.

A past Chairman of the Institute's Regional Urban Design Committee, he has been active in the AIA R/UDAT Program since 1975. He has served on the steering committee, and as evaluator, team member, and team chairman. He was the Project Manager for the recent Atlanta R/UDAT. He has been successful in helping communities help themselves.

As Executive Director of an international joint venture, he led the programming, planning, design, and construction supervision of a major new communities program (\$ 1.2 billion) in Saudi Arabia, providing direction for a multi-discipline, multi-national team that helped improve the living environment for thousands of Saudi citizens.

2.3.1 Jonathan

1966-1971

The nominee was the Director of Planning and Design for the Jonathan Development Corporation, developers of the Jonathan new town near Minneapolis, Minnesota. He was a Vice President of the Corporation and was elected to the Board of Directors in 1970.

The Project encompassed over 5000 acres and was planned for a population of 50,000 persons.

He developed the overall physical plan for Jonathan and led the integration of the economic and social plans as part of a Comphrehensive Plan.

The nominee played a major role in obtaining planning approvals from local government and maintained continuous liason as the project matured.

He was part of the negotiating team that worked with the Department of Housing and Urban Development in making Jonathan the first of the Title IV New Towns and assisted HUD in the development of criteria for the Title IV and Title VII Programs.

The nominee organized and directed the Jonathan Design Group that provided in – house planning and design services, worked with the community association on design review, and worked with architects and designers of individual projects to facilitate a good fit between the planning framework and the project.

The nominee selected the architects and landscape architects who performed work for Jonathan and directed construction activities during the start up period.

List significant work of the nominee in the areas relating to the category of nomination.

2.3.2 The Jonathan Housing Corporation

1968-1971

The nominee was General Manager of the Jonathan Housing Corporation, a joint venture that included the Stanford Research Institute, the Olin Corporation, Northern Natural Gas, Burlington Industries, and Jonathan Development Corporation.

He was responsible to the joint venture for the development and implementation of innovative housing at Jonathan. The scope included the neighborhood, the housing, and the delivery system.

The nominee worked with labor officials and local authorities in obtaining planning approvals and building permits.

2.3.3 Park Forest South

1972-1973

The nominee was Senior Vice President and Director of Planning and Design for New Community Enterprises, the developers of Park Forest South on the south side of Chicago. The Project was an 8000 acre, 100,000 population new town, being developed under the HUD Title VII New Town Program.

He was engaged to direct a revision to the Comphrehensive Plan and work with local government, citizen groups, and Governor's State University to end a serious stalemate over a variety of planning and development issues including the preservation of an environ—mentally sensitive land. The nominee designed and led a process to bring the community together.

The nominee worked with the Illinois Department of Transportation, the Office of Mies Van De Rohe, and the Illinois Central Railroad on the interface between commuter rail and the community.

List significant work of the nominee in the areas relating to the category of nomination.

2.3.4 **R/UDAT**

1975-present

The nominee has been active in the R/UDAT Program in a variety of roles and currently serves on the NAIA R/UDAT Task Group. He has served as evaluator, chairman, team member, and as an assembler of teams.

2.3.5 Regional and Urban Design Committee

The nominee has been a participant in the activities of the AIA Regional and Urban Design Committee since 1975 and has served as a leader, a policy maker, and a worker.

Chairman

He was chairman of the committee in 1975 when the focus was growth management.

Quest Program

The nominee was a principal in the formulation of the program and organized and led the first effort which took place in Minneapolis in 1981. This program was a feature at the 1981 AIA National Convention.

Urban Design in Action

He served on the task force which guided this publication and was a contributor to its content. The document was published in 1985.

Steering Committee

He was an active member of the Steering Committee in 1980 and 1981.

Vision 20/20

The nominee currently serves on the Vision 20/20 Task Force, and is a steering committee member and team member for the forthcoming publication, 'Transforming Suburbia."

List significant work of the nominee in the areas relating to the category of nomination.

2.3.6 Llewelyn - Davies International

1975-1976

The nominee was Director of Operations for the Gulf (Arabian) Region posted in Bahrain.

He was responsible to the Board of Directors for all projects undertaken in the region including the Bahrain Crash Housing Program. The project had two parts, assisting Bahrain in establishing a housing production capability and the programing, planning, design, and construction of five small communities on a "crash" basis to alleviate severe shortages.

The housing production capability part of the work included the design of prototype housing which could be manufactured in Bahrain and and utilize components suitable for fabrication in small shops utilizing simple technologies. Cultural understanding was critical.

This work was under the direct supervision of the nominee.

2.3.7 Llewelyn - Davies Kinhill

1977

The nominee was Project Director for the New Communities Develop—ment Strategy Study for the Government of New South Wales, Australia. He reported to John De Monchaux FAIA, Principal for the project.

The Study was aimed at helping the Government and the project staff develop a sound strategy to attract people living in the eastern sea coast cities to move inland to an urban complex including a new town and three existing small cities which were to be preserved and enhanced. The goal was to help minimize sprawl around the eastern cities, especially Sidney.

The nominee lived and performed the work at the project location and worked daily with the staff in order to understand their capability and their culture.

List significant work of the nominee in the areas relating to the category of nomination.

2.3.8 Internal Security Forces Housing Project 1981 – 1985

The nominee was the Project Director for International Associates, A joint venture of CRS Group, Doxiades, Gilbert Commonwealth Inc., Ziyad Zidan, and Ismail Aba Boutain.

The Joint Venture was formed to undertake the Project which in—cluded some 12,000 housing units, shops, mosques, schools, clubs, health centers, infrastructure and other community facilities in sixteen new communities throughtout Saudi Arabia. In addition to the planning and architecture, the Joint Venture carried out interior design and furniture selection and procurement for the Project.

He was responsible to the international Associates Steering Committee for the programming, planning, design, construction documentation, and construction supervision. He directed an in-country multi-national staff that peaked at over 400 persons and maintained liason with joint venture offices in Athens, Houston, Philadelphia, London, Jeddah, and Riyadh.

He worked directly with the Saudi Ministry of Interior Project Director in performance of the project.

2.3.9 Sarasota County Design Charette 1993

The nominee assisted the Florida House Foundation in organizing the event, played a major role in team selection, and chaired the Design Assistance Team.

The event centered on helping the County look at its future and ways to achieve a more livable and sustainable community.

2.4 Describe how the nominee's work may be considered notable and how it has advanced the profession of architecture.

General:

The nominee's work has long been focused on improving the living environment. It is characterized by his ability to assemble and lead multi-discipline teams, attention to the natural environment; and above all, the persistance and leadership to get the job done while maintaining a high level of quality.

2.4.1 Jonathan

Jonathan This work is notable in several areas. The careful integration of the natural environment with new development set a high standard for other large scale projects that followed.

The integration of the recreation and pedestrian systems together with basic infrastructure formed a "matrix" or framework that guides development and provides efficient linkage and service within the community.

Social, Physical, Economic, and Environmental elements were integrated in a truly "Comphrehensive" Plan.

A broad range of housing types, provided for a broad range of income levels.

The Development Corporation work maintained a high standard of design excellence. The urban design work of the in—house Design Group together with that of outside architects and landscape consultants was commended. Hammel Greene & Abramson, Hodne Stageberg, John Cuningham, Ralph Rapson and other excellent Minnesota architects carried out Jonathan projects. Bailey Associates, consultant for the design and installation of the pedestrian way landscape, received numerous awards for the work.

This work advanced the profession of architecture by demonstrating how planning, process, and design can create an improved living environment.

2.4 Describe how the nominee's work may be considered notable and how it has advanced the profession of architecture.

2.4.2 Jonathan Housing Corporation

This work was based on the concept that a family or single person need not move from place to place as their space requirements change over their life cycle. The premise is they become a valuable member/resource within the neigh—borhood and by staying add stability. The demonstration product was a modular house easily expanded or contracted with modules owned by the Housing Corporation. The approach also provides a better match between income and space requirement over the full life cycle.

This project demonstrated a new approach and at least for a while, expanded the thinking of code and labor officials.

2.4.3 Park Forest South

This work was notable for an intensive year long citizen participation process that brought together local govern—ment, citizen activists, the developers, Governor's State University, and HUD after multiple disagreements had brought the project to a standstill.

The result was a major revision to the Comprehensive Plan which won the support and ultimate approval of all parties.

The work advanced the profession by showing the architect as a leader, an organizer, and problem solver.

- 2.4 Describe how the nominee's work may be considered notable and how it has advanced the profession of architecture.
- 2.4.4 R/UDAT The nominee's work with the R/UDAT Program is notable for its diversity and length of service. He has worked with many communities to help improve their living environment, and works with the AIA to keep the program strong.

He has chaired R/UDATs in small communities like San Ysidro, and in large cities like Houston. In all cases he has helped to expand the thinking of the citizens and provided direction for problem solving.

- 2.4.5 RUDC The Institute's RUDC plays an important role in helping architects help their cities. The nominee has had a variety of roles within the RUDC to help it carry out meaningful programs. The QUEST program for example sought to document what makes great cities great.
- 2.4.6 Llewelyn Davies International

The nominee's work with the Bahrain Crash Housing is notable in that it brought together the management and technical background of the western world with the culture and crafts of the middle east. The total product improved the living environment in Bahrain. (also taught the nominee)

2.4.7 Llewelyn - Davies Kinhill

The New Communities Development Strategy Study for New South Wales in Australia required the nominee to introduce an American entrepenurial approach to development while maintaining the positive aspects of the existing approach. It shifted the emphasis from a "theme" approach to a "quality of life" approach and introduced the phrase "cash flow" to the project staff. The profession is advanced by bringing American experience to help a new development organiza—tion.

2.4 Describe how the nominee's work may be considered notable and how it has advanced the profession of architecture.

2.4.8 Internal Security Forces

This was above all a leadership problem. The project was complex. The project team was from nine countries and spoke six languages. The project required an understanding of the Saudi culture from the town scale down to how to furnish the bedroom. The architecture and landscape design is excellent, and as a by—product, 12 young Saudi architects and engineers were given a intensive course in large project design and leadership.

The people who live in these communities have a vastly improved living environment.

2.4.9 Sarasota County Design Charette

The event focused on a sustainable future for Sarasota County.

As chairman of the design team, the nominee kept the effort focused not only on what a sustainable future might be, but also on how to get there.

The profession is advanced by helping a community to to understand it's past and it's future.



4.2 THE MATRIX

This framework on the site is perhaps best symbolized by the "matrix", an irregular network of continuous road and open space systems. The road system is based on existing "givens" and future traffic distribution requirements; the open space system, as previously described, follows natural ravines and undeveloped land as a continuous pedestrian-oriented system connecting all elements of the plan. Because they coincide for the most part with the natural drainage system, these rights-ofway are also utilized as corridors for the primary sewage system serving the site. Location of the other utilities through these corridors is desirable in some areas, and the possibility of maintaining ownership in order to minimize effects of regulations regarding future private utility systems is being studied. Public institutions, such as recreation and school sites, will operate off this framework as well. The network thus formed becomes a structure for future growth, defining cells and delineating corridors for future development.

4.3 THE VILLAGE

The village is the basic living module and is conceived as a community of approximately 7,000 persons housed in a variety of units covering all price ranges and including most density types. The village will include its own internal road system, elementary schools, required municipal facilities and a village center designed to provide convenience services. The village center would be structured to serve the daily needs of local residents. It is intended to provide the inhabitants with convenience shopping facilities, a local post office, a medical clinic, and office facilities. Elementary schools may locate at or near the village center off the open space system.

Village centers are located with respect to access to residential areas, to the town center and other neighborhood centers, and to natural features of the terrain. It is planned that the village institutions and center facilities will be of sufficient interest and diversity one from the other that a large degree of interchange between villages will take place.


In many places, rapid urbanization has imposed a modern grid, serving the automobile, but in conflict with both the scale, and the natural communication patterns of the town's people. The arbitrary division of the community into isolated cells surrounded by vehicles is especially destructive to extended family relationships which are part of Saudi Culture. The integration of the automobile with Saudi Culture, is perhaps the most difficult task for the designer.




As in other parts of the world, a confrontation exists between nature and new development.

The advent of modern earth moving equipment has made it possible to alter the natural topography with ease and at an alarming rate. In a country with limited rainfall, the visual relief provided by natural changes in ground contours as well as the "green" that appears in the water course or wadi is most welcome.

The preservation of natural systems is basic to the design approach.


The tent of the Bedouin Tribesman, offering shade from the sun, but admitting the cooling breeze, has been an effective response to the climate for hundreds of years. In a time of energy concerns it is easy to overlook simple devices which make the urban spaces of the community more pleasant.

The provision of shade, and recognition of the prevailing winds are fundamental to Design in this climate.

Man and the environment interact in such a way that each is modified by the influence of the other. The history of the Arabian Peninsula demonstrates man's ability to adapt to a severe and hostile environment. The evolution of adaptive responses to the climate has had the effect of continually expanding the habitable threshold, thus allowing new regions to be populated.

Urban design which is optimally responsive to the desert climate will not only reduce construction and operation costs but will ensure functional continuity in the event of system failures. Through the merger of traditional design and current technology, the Community will emerge as a modern entity, in harmony with its environment and the Arabic culture, yet able to meet the demands of changing life-styles and standards of living.

There is ample historical precedent to demonstrate that compact urban design, while evolving from related to function rather than the climate, is very effective in producing micro-climates which moderate the effects of the desert climate. Typical features of these compact urban forms are narrow winding streets and walks lined with buildings and freestanding walls which provide shade, buffer prevailing winds and reduce reflected sunjohr.
