Cell Block Building No. 1

This cell block including 68 cells on two levels is connected to the main prison with a covered secured passage and is provided with independent mechanical installation and it is a medium security unit.

Eastham Farm

Huntsville, Texas Texas Dept. of Corrections

This is a completely new modern facility at Eastham Farm. It has 9 cell blocks in which 900 individual cells are provided and 5 miscellaneous trusty dormitories and special trusty dormitory wings, will house 1,650 prisoners. It includes a complete self-contained power plant communicating with the building through an underground tunnel through which all services are distributed throughout the entire facilities. The heating, power, dining, kitchen, water supply, and sewage disposal were planned to take care of 2,300 men in the future. There is a chapel, hospital, library, hobby shop, gymnasium, dining room facilities to seat 800 prisoners at one time. Dining facilities are furnished for security forces, complete kitchens, hospital facilities, isolation cells, fences, and fence lighting, fence pickets, gate houses, wells, pumps, ground storage tanks, etc. Full provision has been made in the new facility for rehabilitative influences such as religion, education, vocational education, recreation, and welfare, so that these factors may contribute their part in fitting inmates to become law-abiding citizens upon release.

Cell Block Building

This is a small cell block building containing 68 cells. It is a medium security unit.

Administration Office Bldg.

These alterations and additions pertained to the executive offices of the administration building where a general modernization program was carried out including the introduction of air conditioning, etc.

Construction Office Bldg.

This building was built for the administration office for the executive assistant in charge of construction and includes facilities for such engineering, purchasing, coordinating and control as is incidental to the construction program. Cell Block No. 2

In 1957, Governor Daniel recommended and the Legislature approved, among other monies for use by the Department of Corrections, the \$1 million requested, thus providing for the completion of the facility and enlarging its normal capacity to 1,650. Because of crowded conditions, there are actually 1,675 men housed in the original facilities and 800 men in the addition, making a total of 2,475.

George Kassabaum, Chancellor of the College of Fellows of the American Institute of Architects has informed us that you are interested in collecting information on an American architectural firm which can trace its business direct to a practice that was started before World War I, and has remained in business continually until today.

Please be advised that this office has roots which go back to the turn of the century, with the original Dallas firm of Hubbel & Greene, later becoming Herbert M. Greene, then Greene, LaRoache and Dahl, then LaRoache and Dahl, then George L. Dahl, Inc., Architects and Engineers, and finally evolving to Dahl, Braden, Chapman, Inc.

more specific

George L. Dahl, who is still active with the firm as a senior consultant, began his career in 1926 with Herbert M. Greene. Mr. Greene's practice goes back to the early 1900's. George L. Dahl inherited the records of Herbert M. Greene, and subsequently achieved practice under his own name in 1943. Dahl, Braden, Chapman had its beginning via a corporate merger in 1973.

Although we still have many of the early drawings made by various people in the firm, the burden of record storage became too great a number of years ago and we no longer retain drawings over 10-years of age (the statute of limitations in Texas) unless we consider them of unique historical value or having definite re-cycling possibilities. We are pleased to forward you this information as per the interest expressed in Mr. Kassabaum's letter.
