- The Board of Directors has fixed the annual dues for 1951 at \$40.00 per member.
- Annual dues may be paid in three installments, as follows:
For members paying \$40.00 dues—\$14.00 should be paid on or before March 31, 1951, \$13.00 additional on or before September 1, 1951, and \$13.00 additional on or before December 31, 1951.
For members paying \$25.00 dues—\$ 9.00 should be paid on or before March 31, 1951, \$ 9.00 additional on or before September 1, 1951, and \$ 7.00 additional on or before December 31, 1951.
If each of these installments is paid on or before the time stated, the member will not be in default during the year unless he is under suspension for default of the prior year's dues.
