

Dear Mr. Distin:

It has been most disturbing to receive your letter of March 4th advising that some photographs seem to be missing from the submission of exhibits of your architectural work which had been filed with your nomination for advancement to Fellowship.

The Jury of Fellows has always been most careful in the handling of these photographs (no members of the staff ever are permitted to sit in their sessions) and they are meticulous in arranging them so that they can be easily re-wrapped for return to the nominees.

This is the first instance where any photographs have been reported to be missing from the hundreds of such submissions throughout the many years of considering and passing on them by The Jury of Fellows.

I have been giving some thought to this to decide what can be done to attempt to locate the missing photographs and can suggest only two possibilities:

- (1) If these photographs should have been included, through error, with packages returned to other architects nominated, no doubt those architects will notify us and return them. There has not been ample time for this possibility to be abandoned, as many of the packages still are being delivered, I feel certain, especially on the west coast and other far western locations;
- (2) I can open and examine all packages remaining on file with the Jury for its consideration at its meeting in 1961, to ascertain if your photos are with any of them through error. There are about 45 of these which were carefully wrapped and stored for this purpose.

Just at the present I am quite pressed for time, but just as soon as I can I shall start the search through the packages we still have to see what, if anything, can be discovered. I sincerely hope the loss of use of these photographs in the interim will not prove a hardship for you.

With reference to the letters written supporting your nomination by some of your clients, I have checked the file and find that all letters
