

Paul Dietrich FAIA

Paul Dietrich FAIA died in June. Paul was a founding partner of Cambridge Seven Associates. He was active for nearly 40 years in Cambridge civic and cultural affairs and was personally involved in many issues having significant impact on the quality of life in this small, densely populated city. Born in 1926 in Hammond, Indiana, he attended DePauw University. At the War's end, he graduared from the University of Nebraska and returned to Chicago to study for three years at Moholy Nagy's Institute of Design. There he was influenced by such mentors as Harry Callahan, Aaron Siskind, Buckminster Fuller, Charles Eames and Serge Chermayeff, absorbing ideas



which would continue to inform his creative work for the rest of his life. In 1953, he and his wife moved to Cambridge, MA, where he earned a Master's degree in Architecture at GSD. With his wife and their new baby daughter, Paul spent the next two years travelling in Europe, where he worked first for Bernard Rudovsky in Zurich and then in Brussels as an exhibit designer at the US Pavilion for the 1958 World Fair. On returning to the States, Paul worked in Sante Fe with designer and early mentor Alexander Girard. Girard's singular design sensibility and vision instilled in Paul a lifelong love of indigenous design and world cultures. Paul returned to the Boston area in 1960. In Cambridge he worked first for The Architects Collaborative, working with Ben Thompson on the development of the Design Research stores. At TAC he met Terry Rankine FAIA and Lou Bakanowsky FAIA and began the dialogue that would lead to the founding of Cambridge Seven. In 1962 they, along with Peter Chermayeff, Alden Christie, Ivan Chermayeff, and Tom Geismar, founded Cambridge Seven Associates, Architects. Three of their early commissions were the design of the New England Aquarium, the U.S. Pavilion at Expo 1967, and the creation of the original masterplan for the MBTA Station Modernization. Paul's focus on design architecture, graphic, industrial, interior and exhibit design was manifested in his work on a wide range of notable projects including Charles Square in Cambridge, the Boston Children's Museum, the Basketball Hall of Fame, General Cinema's theater prototypes, the Sports Museum of New England, Tempozan Marketplace in Osaka, Porter Square Subway Station, and the New Bedford Whaling Museum. Paul Dietrich was deeply committed to the idea of the architect as public servant. He truly believed in architecture both as a reflection of its society and a vehicle for social change. For 29 years he was a member of the Cambridge Planning Board, serving as chairman for 10 years. He was a founding member of The Cambridge Arts Council and intimately involved in developing the Cambridge Arts Festival and "Arts on the Line", a public arts project in the transit stations. He worked with Habitat For Humanity, volunteering in the Mississippi Delta. He served on the Boards of the Boston Children's Institute, Home For Little Wanderers and the New England Sports Museum. Paul was also extremely involved in outreach and education. He once said, "Design is a part of our lives — it's important that we become more aware of what we use, what we buy and what we live in, how our cities operate. Visual awareness in the context of our daily lives is missing. We have to reawaken people." He taught at Northeastern University and volunteered in the Boston public schools, teaching in the classroom. He remained active at C7A to the end of his life, working with young architects, never tiring in his commitment to integrity, intelligence and delight in design.
