

You will recall that Mr. Antonio diNardo was one of the four candidates for fellowship in The Institute from Cleveland this Spring and that later you returned his documents to him at the request of Mr. Joseph Ceruti, the then Secretary of the Chapter.

Tony diNardo died a few days after those documents were returned and the point came up in a meeting of the Chapter Executive Committee whether or not a fellowship was ever awarded post-humously.
