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

Bishop Frederick W. Keator, President of The Annie Wright Seminary, summarizes his letter as follows:

The Annie Wright Seminary is the realization of an ideal conceived by the Right Reverend John A. Paddock of Washington Territory, in the early '80's, and was made possible by an endowment of \$100,000 by Mr. C. B. Wright of Philadelphia.

The School was named as a memorial to Mr. Wright's daughter. It was established 39 years ago and has always been self supporting.

SECURITY

These bonds are to be secured by a closed first mortgage on the new site and buildings and equipment of the Seminary, to be constructed having an appraised value of \$550,000. After a liberal allowance for fixed charges and current expenses, it is conservatively estimated that earnings will be over $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the total interest charges. This includes the revenue from the \$100,000 endowment fund, which will be applicable to the payment of principal and interest on these bonds.

PURPOSE

The continued progress and increase in demand for a school of this character in the State of Washington has caused its present site and buildings to be grossly inadequate. The capacity of the present school has long since been reached and applications for admission frequently have to be refused.

The funds received from the sale of these bonds, together with the liquidation of the present holdings of the Seminary will be used to construct a new school.

The new site has already been purchased and consists of a broad and picturesque slope of 10 acres situated between North 8th and North 10th Streets on Tacoma Avenue.

The new buildings as planned will be in Tudor style, of red brick with stone trim, and of a design having singular grace and charm. Thoroughly modern in construction and equipment, they have been planned with special regard to rendering them safe from fire.

Gentlemen:

Referring to the \$350,000 First Closed Mortgage 6% Gold Bonds of The Annie Wright Seminary, I take pleasure in giving you the following information regarding its history:

It was established in 1884 and has grown steadily until The Annie Wright Seminary is recognized throughout the entire Northwest as one of the foremost educational institutions. The sphere is its influence has extended throughout the State of Washington and into Oregon, Idaho, Montana, California, British Columbia and Alaska. Its graduates will come well into the hundreds and its pupils into the thousands. By means of a liberal endowment, a gift of Mr. Charles B. Wright of Philadelphia, the school has been self sustaining from the beginning. Its consistent aim all along has been to provide the best and most thorough education under the direction of trained teachers. In anticipation of the demand for a new school the Trustees have guided the Seminary's progress so that considerable financial gain has been made.

The present building is both outgrown and outworn. The present site, while well located, does not provide sufficient ground for outdoor exercise, which is so essential to a properly equipped school. The present capacity has long since been reached. Applications for admission are in excess of its capacity. After careful and deliberate consideration, the Trustees of the Seminary concluded that the proper administration of their trust required that they proceed to build a new and larger school, properly constructed and equipped to meet the present needs and to enter into the splendid future which it is confidentially believed awaits it.

To this end a new site was purchased on Tacoma Avenue between North 8th and North 10th Streets embracing 10 acres. This will provide sufficient room both for the school buildings and for playgrounds sufficiently seeluded to promote the welfare of the girls. Architects, after careful study of all the needs, have produced a plan which it is believed will give us a school without a superior on the Pacific Coast.

THE BUILDINGS

The new buildings as planned will be in Tudor style, of red brick with stone, trim, and of a design having singular grace and charm. Thoroughly modern in construction and equipment, they have been planned with special regard to rendering them safe. By fireproof walls, the building will be divided into sections, each having its separate staircase and exit. Where corridors pass through these walls, the openings will be guarded by fireproof doors, which will automatically close in the event of fire. Both heating plant and kitchen will be wholly enclosed by concrete walls.

MODERN EQUIPMENT

In equipment the new Seminary will be a model of completeness. Careful studies of the finest and most modern schools throughout the United States have been made by the architects and Trustees, to the end that nothing essential to the comfort, convenience and general welfare of pupils and teachers may be overlooked. Heating, lighting and ventilating systems of the newest and most scientific design will be a distinctive feature of the building.

ASSETS

The present available assets of the school, outside of the endowment of \$100,000, which is a permanent fund, amount to \$200,000. The proceeds from the sale of these bonds will be used entirely in part payment of the new buildings.

EARNINGS

The estimated income of the school, based upon a new and enlarged equipment and at a charge for tuition, board and extras which is lower than that of similar institutions in the East and on the Pacific Coast, will be over $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the interest on the school's maximum bonded indebtedness. These figures are conservatively estimated after a liberal allowance has been made for depreciation, overhead and operating expenses.

MANAGEMENT

The Principal, Miss Adelaide B. Preston, is a graduate of Smith College. She is assisted by a corps of teachers who are specially trained for the work of their departments.

OUTLOOK

Shortly after the new school is completed and in running order it is confidently believed that a sinking fund can be established to be used in reducing our bonded indebtedness, through an annual call by lot of a portion of the bonds, as provided for in the mortgage securing them. Purchasers will obtain a first class obligation, backed not only by the value of the property, but the credit of the school and its moral obligation, both of which are of the highest standard. In addition they will be providing funds which will enable an institution with an honored name and a wide influence to build up and carry on its splendid work in the great Northwest.
