proponents believe worthy— Mr. Edmund's accomplishments in the field of design are of such remarkable diversity in
externals, that the attempt to isolate the germ of spirit requires a search below the
durface. With work to consider as far apart as the reconstruction of the Seventeenth

The rules of procedure, quoted below, have not yet been reprinted. They have been modified slightly, particularly the time-requirement in Paragraph 5.

Chapter II, Article 1. General Conautions of removement.

Section 1. Qualifications.

(a) Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects is conferred upon a member who is a citizen of the United States who, in the opinion of an authorized jury of fellows, shall have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession in design, construction, literature, education, or public service.

Section 2. Prerequisite.

(a) Membership in the Institute for not less than ten years' shall be a prerequisite to fellowship.

Section 3. Jury of Fellows.

(a) The Jury of Fellows shall consist of six fellows appointed by the President, two of whom shall serve for periods of one, two, and three years, respectively, and until their successors, are appointed. The President shall appoint the chairman of the Jury, and shall fill all vacancies occurring in the Jury of Fellows by death, resignation, expiration of term of otherwise.

Section 4. Recommendations for Fellowship.

(a) Method. Any group of five or more members may recommend to the Jury for consideration the name of a member whom they deem qualified for fellowship. Such recommendation shall contain a brief statement of the notable service or achievements which, in the opinion of the nominators, justify the nomination.

shall be submitted with full and explicit data to the Jury of Fellows on forms prepared for this purpose. The Jury shall then request from the chapter officials, the Directors of the Institute, and such other sources as it deems necessary privileged communications relating to the qualifications of the nominees. All recommendations shall remain on file with the Jury of Fellows for at least twelve months prior to final action.

Section 5. Rules of Procedure.

(a) The Jury shall formulate rules for its procedure subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

Article 2. Election to Fellowship.

Section 1. Procedure.

- (a) Election. Election to fellowship shall be by the Jury of Fellows. Fellows may be elected at any regular meeting of the Jury of Fellows.
- (b) Method. Such election shall be by ballot. Four affirmative votes shall be necessary to elect.
- (c) Announcements. The names of all fellows so elected shall be announced to the convention.

Article 3. Nomenclature.

Section 1. Nomenclature.

(a) Pellowship in the Institute shall be designated by the initials "F. A. I. A."

Rules of Procedure.

- 1. A meeting of the Jury of Fellows may be held at the call of the Chairman, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, and in any event this meeting should occur at least 60 days prior to the date of the Convention.
- 2. Suggestions to the Jury for advancement to Fellowship may be made as stated in the By-laws.
- 3. The validity of any objection raised to any candidate shall rest solely with the Jury, and all communications shall be considered only as informative data.
- 4. The Jury shall file with the archives of the Institute the original recommendation and a statement of its action with
- the reasons for election in each case. Privileged communications shall not be preserved.
- 5. Proposals for Fellowship must be filed with the Jury of Fellows, at The Octagon, not later than February 1st of any calendar year. All proposals so filed will be considered by the Jury and those selected will be cited for the honor of Fellowship at the second succeeding convention.
- 6. In the event of failure to act favorably upon any recommendation within three years due notice shall be given to the proponents, the recommendation surrendered and privileged communications destroyed. No recommendation so surrendered shall again be presented within two years from such notice:

ARCHITECTURE LEADER DIES AT HOME HERE

James R. Edmunds, Jr., 1 Nationally Known As **Hospital Designer**

James Richard Edmunds, Jr., prominent Baltimore architect, whose work was known throughout the United States, died yesterday at his home, 9 Blythewood road, of cerebral hemorrhage. He was in his sixty-third year.

Mr. Edmunds in the course of an active life, did much to change the face of the city, and the buildings he designed include many of the t best-known and most-used in Baltimore. He was nationally known chiefly as a designer of hospitals, in which he excelled.

Born In Baltimore

He was born here in 1890, the son of the late James Richard Edmunds and Anna Smith Keyser Edmunds. In 1912 he took his B.S. in architecture at the University of Pennsylvania, and traveled and studied in Europe as well.

His European trips took him abroad in 1911 and 1923, and in 1919 and 1920 he traveled in the Far East. From 1923 to 1928 he was the Baltimore correspondent for the Beaux Arts Institute of Design.

From 1912 to 1915 he was draftsman to Edward L. Palmer, Jr., Wyatt & Nolting, a Baltimore architectural firm, and from 1915 to 1917 he practiced here under his own name. In 1920 he joined the office of Joseph Evans Sperry and in, 1923 became a partner in the

Housing Authority Official

In 1930 he became a partner in the firm of Crisp & Edmunds, and from 1939 until the time of his death was principal of the firm.

Mr. Edmunds has a great love for his city, and with his great but unobstrusive, energy and civic consciousness, contributed much to the city's life.

He served as chairman of the Housing Authority, Baltimore City, from 1937 to 1941 and was chair man of the Board of Architectural Review, Baltimore city. Since 1946 he had been chairman of the Lexington Market Authority and since 1949 a member of the Architectural Board of Review, Department of Public Improvements, State Maryland.

He was also a director of the ridelity Trust Company, president of the Children's Rehabilitation Institute, and had been a member of the board of governors of the |1 Baltimore Country Club, which he designed, for many years.

Designed High Schools

The long list of buildings in and around Baltimore which Mr. Edmunds designed includes both East ern and Western high schools, the General Hospital and Psychiatric Institute of the University of Maryland, and all the recent work at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, especially the new Surgical and Re-li search Building search Building.

Among buildings he designed which are either under construction, or have yet to be built are Baltimore county's new high school (Continued on Page 20, Column 2)

He also designed a number of commercial buildings, and was responsible for modernizing the downtown stores of Hutzler Brothers and Hochschild, Kohn & Co. in Baltimore, and for the modern stores recently built by those companies in Towson and Belvedere.

A Hospital Architect

Outside his native state, Mr. Edmunds was known chiefly as a hospital architect, and the list of the hospitals he designed includes the Tennessee Baptist Hospital at Knoxville, Tenn., the Lancaster General Hospital in Pennsylvania, and the Veterans Administration hospitals in Tallahassee, Fla., and

He also designed the Nemours
Foundation building at Wilmington, Del., and the University of Pennsylvania Physics Building at Philadelphia, was one of the three architects associated with the Veterans Hospital in Maryland and acted as architectural consultant on the airport terminal building

at Friendship Airport.

Knowledge Widely Recognized

His wide knowledge of his profession was recognized nationally and internationally. Mr. Edmunds was not only a registered architect in eight states, but he also was an honorary member of the Royal Institute of British Architects.

at Catonsville, the People's Court struction Advisory Council of the Building and the Jewish Medical United States from 1948 to 1949, and became president of the American Institute of Architects, whose membership increased greatly during his period of office.

Mr. Edmunds opposed the school which thought membership of the Institute should be confined to leaders of the profession and pressed for the admission of all reputable and qualified architects when he was elected to the presidency of the Institute in 1945.

The Institute appointed him in 1948 to head its committee which studied the effects of atomic energy on design.

Funeral Services Friday

Mr. Edmunds is survived by his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Eddington Campbell Edmunds, and three chil-dren, James R. Edmunds 3d, of Ruxton, Page Edmunds, 2d, of Riderwood, and Mrs. Frances Campbell Ketcham, of Wilmington, Del.

His brother, the late Charles K. Edmunds, a former provost of the Johns Hopkins University and president of Ling Nan University, Canton, China, died in 1941, but three sisters survive. They are Mrs. Helen Robinson of London, and Mrs. Harry F. Perkins and Mrs. Carl C. Rutledge, both of Burlington, Vt.

James R. Edmunds, Jr., whose sudden death occurred yesterday, was so modest and unassuming that even friends who imagined they knew him well will no doubt be surprised when they read the long list of his achievements.

As an architect he stood high in his profession both locally and nationally. His most prominent monuments in the city are the Eastern and the Western High Schools and the University Hospital. Hospitals were his specialty. He did most of the recent work for the Johns Hopkins. His imprint is on a number of hospitals in other parts of the country. He also was consultant to the Surgeon General. In matter of design he adhered to no particular school. He was distinguished rather more for his scope, which extended from the conservative to the modern.

Public spirit was a conspicuous attribute. He gave generously of his time as a consultant on architectural matters to both the city and the State. As president of the American Institute of Architects he labored diligently and effectively for his profession.

Those outside his profession as well as those within it loved him for his graciousness, his unaffected sincerity and the abounding hospitality. His bassing leaves a void that will be hard to fill a


