Dear Mr. Eldridge:

This is the first opportunity to acknowledge your remittance on account of Institute dues, and to thank you for the same.

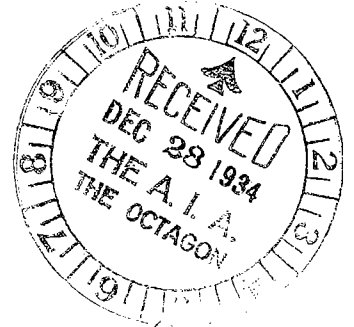
