My dear Sir:

Yours of the 6th inst. to hand regarding the nomination of Mr. Faville for Fellowship.

It was the sense of the Chapter, from your communications of September 14th and October 21st, that the names of Messrs. Schulze and Mooser were under consideration at the same time. The action of the Chapter at the meeting of October 21st was confirmatory of the nominations and we are of the opinion that no further action on the part of the Chapter is necessary toward confirming the names which were then voted upon. The names of Messrs. Schulze and Mooser would certainly not have been presented for consideration had the members any idea that they were merely tentative.

Mr. C.H. Whitaker was present at this Chapter meeting and probably can confirm this.

We are duly appreciative of the deserved honor conferred on Mr. Faville and this is to advise you that the action of the Chapter at the October meeting was really a ratification of Mr. Faville's candidacy for Fellowship.
