Dear Mr. Flints

Please note that in acquiring schievement in "Service to The Institute," serving as officers or on committees is not, in itself, sufficient to advance a san to Fellowship, except where such services are "rendered so faithfully, efficiently, and strikingly, that they become outstanding and inspiring."

Pacts in regard to service of this type, or in Public Service, should be very detailed and explicit.

We request that this requirement be complied with and that letters of endorsement be prepared by each of the members of the Executive Committee, the sponsors, who have not already done so, and sent to The Jury of Fillows, A.I.A., 1735 New York Avenue, N.W., Washington 6, D. C., Attention of Miss Florence H. Gervais.

Mr. Flint was nominated for achievement in Design, as also were Massrs. Frazier and haftery. Mr. Rebori was nominated for achievement in Design and Education.

We also request that the nomination of Mr. John Cromelin, A.I.A., be completed by submission of supporting letters, as described above; and by submission of exhibits of his executed work. The Chapter has this in mind, we are sure, and it is mentioned here for the sake of the records.

Further, with regard to the exhibits furnished on behalf of Andrew Micholas Report, A.I.A., the Jury asks that you and the other sponsors of his nonination procure a more carefully selected exhibit, exercising the greatest discrimination in the examples selected. The Jury felt that the exhibit submitted did not exemplify Mr. Rebori's ability in design to the best advantage.

These exhibits also should be sent to The Jury of Fellows at The Institute, as indicated above.

NOEL L. FLINT DIES; ARCHITECT WAS 60

CHICAGO, Nov. 22 (AP)—Noel L. Flint, architect, died Sunday. He was 60 years old. Mr. Flint's works included the Grill Room at the Pierre Hotel in New York, the Pump Room at the Ambassador East Hotel here, the Wilshire Store in Los Angeles, the Crenshaw and University Hill Store in Denver, The Alexander Hamilton Memorial here and the Famous-Barr Store in St. Louis. Mr. Flint retired from active practice in 1959. He was a consultant for Alfred Shaw, architect here, for the last five years.

He was born in London in 1903, was brought to the United States in 1909 and became naturalized in 1914.

Mr. Flint attended the Illinois

Mr. Flint attended the Illinois Incitiute of Technology from 1922 to 1925 and the Massacl'usetts Institute of Technol o/y from 1925 to 1927. He was elected a fellow in the Amenycan Institute of Architects.
