Dear Mr. Purves:

We are this date sending a bid to the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Branch of Buildings and Utilities, to perform architectural services on Project No. ABU-Ph-9 which is a medical center for Gallup, New Mexico.

There is no question in our minds but what this is a pure and simple bid for this work and we know that other firms in this area are submitting bids simultaneously to the Albuquerque office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs. We understand to our great amazement and concern, that this policy has been condoned and approved by the American Institute of Architects.

There is no doubt that bidding of this nature tends to reduce the quality of service offered by the profession, inasmuch as any reductions in fee must result in reductions of quality of service if those engaged in reducing fees are to remain continuously in business. Our quotation to the Bureau of Indian Affairs on this proposed project is less than 50% of the fee which we would normally suggest that any reasonable client spend for these services. We do not think we have a chance of getting this work because we have competitors in this area who continuously have bid such a low standard of service that even a 50% fee would be reasonable compensation. Our effort on this particular project is to find out for ourselves and our own amazement, how low a fee and how sub-standard a service the taxpayer is actually paying and getting on this work.

We consider ourselves to be a firm dedicated to upholding the high standards of the profession and meeting all requirements of the Institute and even though we know that this policy is condaned by the Institute, we still feel morally obligated to notify you that we are engaging in this practice of bidding on this particular project.

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of October 15th relative to alleged practices of the Bureau of Indian Affairs of the Department of the Interior.

The architectural activities of this Bureau have been of considerable concern to The American Institute of Architects over the past year or more and have resulted in a series of conferences with Bureau heads and the Assistant Secretary of the Interior, D. Otis Beasley. Mr. Beasley appeared before and met with The Institute's Board of Directors at its meeting in March held in Washington this year.

We are rather surprised at your letter in view of a report in the NEMO of January 16, 1956, issued by The American Institute of Architects to all members and in light: of subsequent correspondence and conferences with Mr. Beasley and in light of the Department's letter to us of March 14, 1956. Therefore, your charges that the policy of bidding for work has been condoned and approved by The American Institute of Architects would appear to be the result of a misunderstanding.

Dear Max:

The Institute's committee structure has become so cumbersome and complicated that not only were we functioning inefficiently but also the financial burden of supporting the committees prevented us from engaging in other needed services to the members. The Board therefore had a study made for the purpose of streamlining our organization. This study recommended a number of changes which have been put into effect. These changes included the abolishment of some committees and reductions in personnel in others.

The Committee on School Buildings has now become a standing vertical committee of only five members. The reduction naturally entails disappointment to those loyal and devoted members who have not been designated to continue on the committee. Personnel decisions were difficult in the extreme, as virtually without exception all members of committees have made substantial contributions to the welfare of the profession and prestige of The Institute.

Selections of those to continue was made by The Board by ballot - in many instances only after prolonged balloting.

Although you have not been selected to continue, The Board has requested me to convey to you its deep gratitude for the service you have rendered and expresses the hope that in the not too distant future further opportunity will be given to call upon you again.


