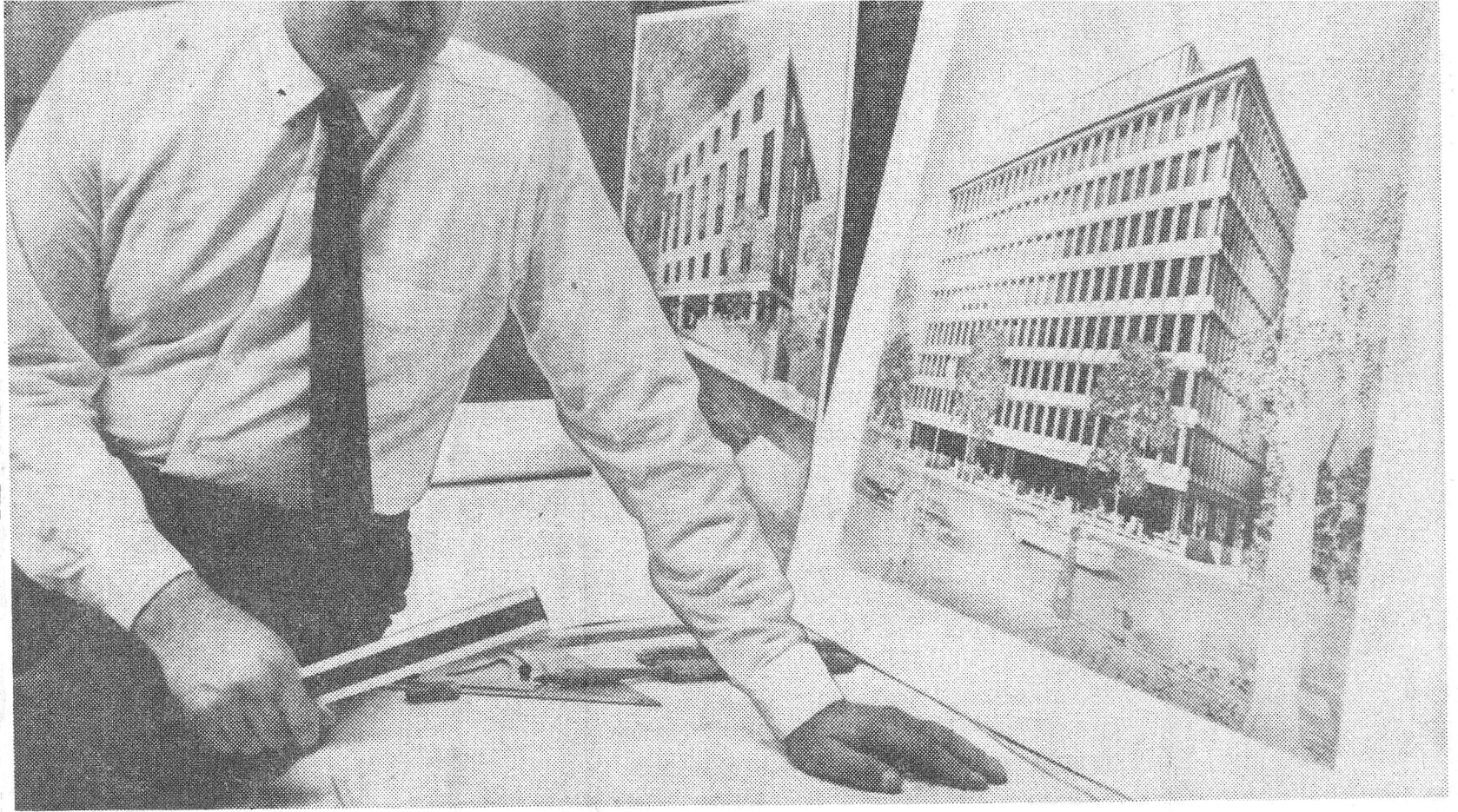

Is Our Skyline In a Strait Jacket?

Is Our Skyline In a Strait Jacket?

Vlastimil Koubek is a big man—both in stature and in success. And he says and does what he believes in.

It was just 15 years ago that he fled the Communist regime of his native Czechoslovakia, where he studied architecture. After a three-year stay in England, he came to the United States.

Now, as one of the most successful architects in the Washington area, he has

designed more than 25 new office buildings. Quite naturally, his experience has given him some definite opinions about the look of the Nation's Capital—especially about the height of its buildings.

"Washington is basically a well-planned city," he says. "We have wide avenues with trees, and open spaces in the heart of the city. But that doesn't mean that taller buildings would ruin this. I think

they would enhance it. We should break the roofscape monotony with towers. Tall buildings give interest to a skyline, and variety is of great importance."

Removal of height restrictions in some areas of the city, a proposal under study by various Government agencies, could accomplish two things, says Mr. Koubek. It would permit a greater return on a landowner's investment,

and this would make better designs practical—such as free-standing buildings.

"So far, only in a few instances were architects able to design free-standing buildings and face them alike on all four sides," Mr. Koubek says. "A good example of this is Stuart Bernstein's new Jefferson Building at Nineteenth street and Jefferson place. It is surrounded by two streets, an alley and a set-

back from the adjacent property, and we used the same materials on the back sides that we used on the street fronts. Here was a client who wanted to do something better for himself and for the city."

Mr. Koubek adds that a building should be judged on its architecture, not on the building materials alone. He disagrees, for instance, with

the critics of glass in this
manner:

"I don't think Washington
should be concerned about
glass buildings. It should be
concerned about bad archite-
cture. Glass is modern and
relatively new. It is the most
durable and practical of ma-
terials. It delights, diffuses,
reflects light, moods of the

city. It can be colored, tex-
tured, small, big clear, ob-
scure. It's relatively inexpen-
sive. Properly used, it is
without question the best
building material."

Mr. Koubek has 10 new
buildings on his drawing
boards, including a major
office complex on Pennsylvan-
ia avenue and a five-building
project in the Rosslyn area of
Arlington. His future depends
on Washington's growth. But
he makes this observation:

"Washington is the most
conservative city I've ever
lived in. It's a beautiful city,
but somehow it's provincial.
It lacks the spirit of a great
metropolis. It needs a master
planner with vision—and
courage."
