

Randolph E. Evans, the architect who designed the buildings that make up the Brooklyn College campus, died of a respiratory illness Tuesday at his home, 50 Park Avenue. He was 72 years old.

Mr. Evans won a medal in the 1934 Better Homes in America competition, largely for his design of more than 100 residential structures in the metropolitan area.

For a number of years Mr. Evans was a partner in Chapman, Evans & Delehanty, designers of many churches and parish houses.

He leaves his wife, the former Noona Bibb; three daughters, Mrs. Florence Semple, Mrs. Ann Price and Mrs. Peyton Bailey; a son, Randolph E. Jr.; a sister, Mrs. Frances Davies, and five grandchildren.
