Dear Miss Gervais:

This letter is to accompany a group of nominations for fellowships which have been proposed and recommended by the Honors and Awards Committee of this Chapter and approved by a majority vote of the Chapter Board at a meeting held on October 21, 1958. Mr. Isidor Richmond is Chairman of the Honors and Awards Committee.

The specific purpose of this letter is to remind you that in previous years when nominations have been submitted by us in this manner you have called our attention to a rule of the Jury requiring signatures of all members of a chapter "Accutive Committee", which is normally a small group. As I have pointed out before our Chapter Board has twenty-seven members scattered throughout the eastern part of the state and it is impossible to assemble the entire group at any one meeting, to allow time for circularizing, or to be certain that in such a large group every member would concur in the recommendations of the Honors and Awards Committee.

As your Jury has previously accepted nominations in this form, and with a majority of Board signatures as now submitted, it is hoped that this reminder will clarify the procedure and spare you the necessity of requesting further signatures.

The firm of J. D. Leland & Company, later Leland and Larsen, was formed in 1919. From the time of its inception, Maurice Feather has been a partner and in virtual control of design. His contributions to the design involved in the solution of his firm's problems have been a premier factor in his firm's enviable reputation and success. His sense of proportion, his ability in composition and his nice discrimination in the choice of materials have all been manifest in the outstanding quality of his firm's work. Added to this, his skill at perspective rendering in a variety of mediums is of the highest order.

Moreover, in the days when the thorough study of problems by the architect and the younger men in his employ resulted in the drafting room partaking of the character of an atelier, many architects performed the dual role of employer and mentor. Maurice Feather fell into this category, but his influence on the younger men did not cease with the drafting room. He gave unstintingly of his time and energy to the atelier classes at the Boston Architectural Center, being active in the work for many years, serving on the Education Committee and as critic. For seven years (1927-1934) he gave the long midwinter analytique problem and brought to the task never-failing interest and enthusiasm, qualities seemingly communicated to the students if their response and standing in the joint competitive problems is a proper guide. During these years the classes, composed exclusively of young men prevented by insufficient means from attending an architectural school, steadily grew in size and performance to place the Club training on a high level of prestige. Many able students were developed during this period of the Club's life. Some - perhaps many - have achieved national recognition. It was a time of ferment marked in its later stages by the onset of the international style and was consequently a challenging period to critic and student alike. It is hoped that there are many who recall those years, recognize their worth and prize the memory of these strenuous and constructive - if draughty - midnight sessions.

The firm of J. D. Leland & Company, later Leland and Larsen, was formed in 1919. From the time of its inception the Applicant has been a partner and in virtual control of design. His contributions to the design involved in the solution of the firm's problems have been a premier factor in the firm's enviable reputation and success. The Applicant's sense of proportion, his ability in composition, his nice discrimination in the choice of materials, have all conduced to the outstanding quality of the firm's work. Added to this his skill at perspective rendering in pencil, pen and ink, watercolor and nearly any required medium is of the highest order. The use of this ability to clarify early sketches, check the look of a design during development and finally to depict the finished creation is of inestimable benefit to his firm.

Your letter of November 6th arrived this morning.

In the main your statements are correct. Mr. Maurive Feather's nomination for Fellowship will be considered in 1959 and, if not acted upon favorably at that meeting, will be considered for a third time in 1960.

However, if he should not be elected at either of those meetings, he would be eligible for nomination again as of November 1, 1961 - which actually is only one year after the third consideration.

The By-law covering this reads as follows:

"If a nominee for advancement to fellowship fails to be advanced by a vote of the Jury, he shall not be disqualified for advancement and his advancement shall not be prejudiced thereby, until and unless his advancement has been balloted on and refused at three separate duly called meetings of the Jury, but such prejudice shall not extend beyond a four-year period from the first nomination of the candidate."

Application of Maurice Feather Re: for Fellowship

During my early formative years as a student and an apprentice in the field of architecture, it was my good fortune to come under the influence of the applicant, one of Boston's most respected architectural designers. Unless a similar experience was shared by others it becomes difficult to comprehend the tremendous impact made upon a young mind by this extraordinary personality. For here was no ordinary architect, but rather one who has been blessed with all of the many requirements which make for great designers.

Those were days when most important offices were like huge ateliers, when enthusiasm for fine work ran high and every little manner and ability of the strong forces in the office were watched and studied with imitative tendencies and eyes eager for learning.

In the applicant I found an encyclopedia of ability. A superb draftsman, he was equally at home doing preliminary studies, sketches, working drawings, 3/4" scale elevations, full size details, designs, renderings in all media, charcoal renderings and studies in the grand manner, and an eloquence in English and conversation that I shall never forget.

Of his many talents the one that stands out foremost is his great facility for delineation in whatever medium was required. His pencil and pen and ink renderings are, in my opinion, second to none, and I am mindful of the national scene when I advance this contention. The broad crisp studies of wrought iron and charcoal are so incredible in their freshness and knowledge of the medium that in most cases they emerge as respectable works of art.

This influence was not confined to me alone, but to many others in the greater Boston area. He taught at the Boston Architectural Center and was responsible for developing many fine students. Many of us in the Boston area are compelled by a sense of obligation to advance this applicant for Fellowship, for, in so doing, we discharge our debt to one who has done so much for so many. His own deep sense of modesty and selferfacement might otherwise prevent these facts from ever being made public. For here was a man whose influence was not in architecture alone - great as that has been - but one whose devotion to high principles and ideals lifted and inspired all with whom he came in contact.

His best achievements in design were possibly executed at a time when concepts of architecture were at variance with the contemporary tendencies of today. Yet the applicant's recent work shows no tendency to stylistic reaction. Rather does it disclose rare discrimination in the appreciation of the worth of the current design principles an ability to add thereto. It has been stressed that sound design is timeless. Therefore, a just appraisal of architectural ability requires calm judgment and objectivity. Such an appraisal of the achievements of Mr. Feather will stamp his work as of consistently high quality.


