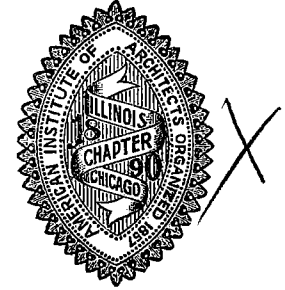

Took the course in architecture in Columbia

University, New York City, and received the degree of Ph. B. in 1894.

Won the Columbia scholarship in architecture in 1896. Traveled and studied in Europe for sixteen months.

Has traveled extensively since then in Mediterranean countries -- Spain, Greece and Egypt, and in 1914 made a journey in reference to architectural work in China. Visited and studied building conditions in China for three months and for some time in Japan.

Began the practice of architecture in partnership with George C. Nimmons in 1898 under the firm name of Nimmons & Fellows, which partnership continued until 1911.

From 1894 to 1900 was instructor in design in the Chicago School of Architecture in the Art Institute.

In 1911 formed a partnership with Dwight Herald Perkins and John Leonard Hamilton under the style of Perkins, Fellows & Hamilton.
