 - 1. From 1921 to 1927 developed the so-called "Mediterranean Type" of design, blending Spanish, Italian, Moorish and kindred designs into an entity, one of which is a residence, the photograph of which is included with this Nomination.
 - Traveled abroad during this period in an endeavor to study the various types of architecture first hand. The nominee was cited for his interpretation of this type and received many mentions relative to same.
 - 2. Designed the Municipal Building for City of South Miami and this is the most pretentious building in this City at present and is furnishing a precedent for buildings of more advanced design in this rapidly growing portion of Greater Miami.
 - 3. During the nominee's tenure on the Coral Gables Board of Supervising Architects, gave freely of his time in an endeavor to uphold the established design standards of this nationally known city.



Dear Miss Gervais:

Conforming with your footnote on copy of letter to Wahl Snyder dated February 5, 1958, attached hereto is a clipping indicating results of the election in South Miami, February 11, 1958.

On the socalled "Dark Side of The Picture", I came within 37 votes of being elected but, while I conducted a clean and dignified campaign befitting an Institute member, two of my opponments who were elected worked day and night with much unfavorable and questionable advertising, etc.

On the "Bright Side" since the election is over, are the following affiliations which would not be possible if I had been elected to the City Council.

- 1. The City Manager of Coral Gables has contacted me, asking if I would again serve on the Board of Supervising Architects starting July 1, 1958 and I have accepted.
- 2. The City of South Miami is arranging to set up the office of "Planning & Zoning Consultant" and I have also agreed to serve in this capacity, starting about April 1, 1958.
- 3. We have a new form of "Metropolitan Government" which includes all Cities in Dade County and eventually the majority of functions of said Cities will be perfored by the Municipal setup. The Chairman of the "Board of Commissioners" has contacted me relative to serving on the main "Planning and Zoning Board" and I have accepted same.

So, although at first I was a little disapointed at not being elected to the South Miami City Council, this disappointment has passed and I am now free to participate in Municipal affairs in an advisory capacity without the aggravations associated with an elective office.

Your kind letter of January 20, 1958 with attached copies of correspondence in year 1923 received and frankly, I am ashamed of the conditions existing at that time, which resulted in confusing my status as a member of the Institute. I was a very poor business man at that time.

I appreciate your kindness and consideration in checking Chapter records in an endeavor to clarify this matter but, since my offuce records were destroyed by the 1926 hurricane, I depended on my memory for events occuring 34 years ago and humbly extend my applicacy for this misunderstanding and assure you it was not intentional or deliberate on my part.

I called Mr. Wahl Snyder, President of Florida South Chapter, A.I.A. and his Secretary stated they would write and request that you change the dates of 1921-29 to 1921-23 under "NOM-INEES ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVUCE TO THE INSTITUTE" and thus conform with the records.

Aside from the above, I was honored by being nominated as a candidate for office of Councilman for City of South Miami and, since I have the support of the leading citizens and business men, have a good chance to be elected on Feb. 11, 1958. If I am successful, will be the first Member of the Institute holding an elective Municipal Office in the South Florida area.

I have known the candidate for over twenty-five years and have knowledge of his service to the Institute and his achievements in Public Service.

Service to the Institute
Period from 1921-1929: His record shows nothing outstanding.

Period from 1929-1945: No contribution whatever.

Period from 1945-1958: Became active in local chapter affairs. Was secretary of Florida South Chapter for four years and served on several committees. As secretary he was methodical, wordy and dull. After the four years in this office there was a noticeable lack of enthusiasm about electing him to other office. He delayed action for over a year on two chapter nominations for fellowship through mismanagement of his office as secretary and as one of the directors.

It is my opinion that many others have accomplished much more for the Institute and that his record is anything but distinguished.

Achievements in Public Service

1922-1923: It is claimed he helped layout Miami Bayfront Park as a member of the City Planning Board. Perhaps his contribution of time is noteworthy, but the layout for the park is not.

1924-1927: It is claimed that as first architect for the City of Coral Gables he assisted in laying out streets. This is true, but the credit for the overall planning must be to architect Phinias Paist and Denman Fink.

1928-1942: There do not seem to be any achievements in public service during this period. Many architects who will never be nominated for fellowship have had a continuous record of some kind of community service.

1946-1950: The writer has no direct knowledge of the candidate's work with the Optimist Club of Coral Gables.

1950-1957: The candidate has the habit of donating architectural services without remuneration. It would have been better to make personal donations and charge for the services. Free services in the South Miami area could have had some connection with the commission for the City Hall and other work which the candidate received.

In conclusion it seems that the candidate's record of achievement in public service may show one or two bright spots, but it is in no way outstanding.
