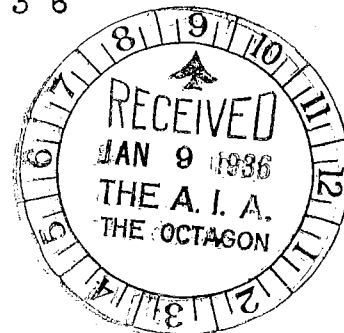

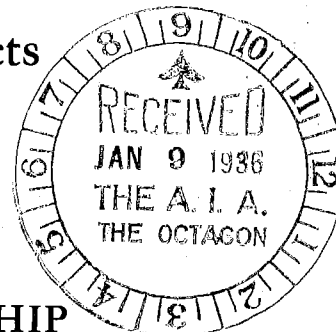

Mr. Foeller's work has been mainly the larger type of buildings, such as churches, schools, hospitals, asylums and prisons. It is not because of the many large buildings he has erected that prompts us to nominate him for Fellowship, but we feel that his qualifications for Fellowship lies in the classification for services to the American Institute of Architects, the profession and the public.

Mr. Foeller was the first Institute member in Wisconsin, other than Messrs. Ferry, Clas & Russel, who transferred to the American Institute of Architects from the Western Association of Architects. All other Wisconsin members joined the Institute ten years later in 1911 when the Wisconsin Chapter was organized. Mr. Foeller was the sole A.I.A. member in Northern Wisconsin from 1901 to 1919 when his partner, Mr. Max W. Schober joined and two years later when Mr. Stephenson joined the firm he also joined the Institute. Mr. Foeller's junior partner, Mr. Edgar H. Berners, and two associates, Mr. Noel Ross Safford and Mr. Clarence John are all associate members of the Wisconsin Chapter, A.I.A. In addition to Mr. Foeller, there are but four A.I.A. members residing north of the City of Milwaukee in Wisconsin at the present time.

For nearly twenty years Mr. Foeller has stood alone in upholding the principles of the American Institute of Architects in Northern Wisconsin. To fully realize what professional sacrifices he was obliged to make during this period to maintain the principles of professional practice of the Institute one would have to know of the chaotic condition of the professional practice in Northern Wisconsin twenty years ago. His high professional ideals have gained for him an enviable position in our Chapter and among the professional men in the Northern part of the state.

Mr. Foeller was one of a small group of A.I.A. members who initiated and, after five years of effort, secured passage of the Wisconsin Architects' Registration law in 1917 and he has served continuously as a member of the Board of Examiners for Architects registration ever since.

Mr. Foeller organized the City Beautiful Committee of Green Bay in 1908 and has been its moving spirit ever since.

Mr. Foeller organized childrens flower and garden clubs in the City of Green Bay.

Mr. Foeller is a member of the Green Bay Business Men's Assn. and the Rotary Club.

BY-LAW PROVISIONS AND RULES OF PROCEDURE CONCERNING
ADVANCEMENT TO FELLOWSHIP.

ADDRESS COMMUNICATIONS TO THE CHAIRMAN, THE JURY OF FELLOWS
The Octagon, Washington, D. C.

BY-LAWS OF THE INSTITUTE.

Chapter II, Article 1. General Conditions of Fellowship.

Section 1. Qualifications.

(a) Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects is conferred upon a member who is a citizen of the United States who, in the opinion of an authorized jury of fellows, shall have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession in design, construction, literature, education, or public service.

Section 2. Prerequisite.

(a) Membership in the Institute for not less than ten years shall be a prerequisite to fellowship.

Section 3. Jury of Fellows.

(a) The Jury of Fellows shall consist of six fellows appointed by the President, two of whom shall serve for periods of one, two, and three years, respectively, and until their successors are appointed. The President shall appoint the chairman of the Jury, and shall fill all vacancies occurring in the Jury of Fellows by death, resignation, expiration of term or otherwise.

Section 4. Recommendations for Fellowship.

(a) Method. Any group of five or more members may recommend to the Jury for consideration the name of a member whom they deem qualified for fellowship. Such recommendation shall contain a brief statement of the notable service or achievements which, in the opinion of the nominators, justify the nomination.

(b) Supporting Data. Names of nominees for fellowship shall be submitted with full and explicit data to the Jury of Fellows on forms prepared for this purpose. The Jury shall then request from the chapter officials, the Directors of the Institute, and such other sources as it deems necessary privileged communications relating to the qualifications of the nominees. All recommendations shall remain on file with the Jury of Fellows for at least twelve months prior to final action.

Section 5. Rules of Procedure.

(a) The Jury shall formulate rules for its procedure subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

Article 2. Election to Fellowship.

Section 1. Procedure.

(a) Election. Election to fellowship shall be by the Jury of Fellows. Fellows may be elected at any regular meeting of the Jury of Fellows.

(b) Method. Such election shall be by ballot. Four affirmative votes shall be necessary to elect.

(c) Announcements. The names of all fellows so elected shall be announced to the convention.

Article 3. Nomenclature.

Section 1. Nomenclature.

(a) Fellowship in the Institute shall be designated by the initials "F. A. I. A."

RULES OF PROCEDURE.

1. A meeting of the Jury of Fellows may be held at the call of the Chairman, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, and in any event this meeting should occur at least 60 days prior to the date of the Convention.

2. Suggestions to the Jury for advancement to Fellowship may be made as stated in the By-laws.

3. The validity of any objection raised to any candidate shall rest solely with the Jury, and all communications shall be considered only as informative data.

4. The Jury shall file with the archives of the Institute the original recommendation and a statement of its action with

the reasons for election in each case. Privileged communications shall not be preserved.

5. Proposals for Fellowship must be filed with the Jury of Fellows, at The Octagon, not later than February 1st of any calendar year. All proposals so filed will be considered by the Jury and those selected will be cited for the honor of Fellowship at the second succeeding convention.

6. In the event of failure to act favorably upon any recommendation within three years due notice shall be given to the proponents, the recommendation surrendered and privileged communications destroyed. No recommendation so surrendered shall again be presented within two years from such notice.

This is a revised copy of the Rules of Procedure of the Jury of Fellows as amended and approved by the Board of Directors at its meeting on November 14, 1930.

I should have attended the Convention of the Institute at Old Point Comfort, but for a curious coincidence which prevented the Board of Examiners of Wisconsin Architects from sending me, as representative, to the convention of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards, at that time, and consequently interfered with my plan. I have also your more recent letter of invitation to appoint some member of the Chapter to serve on another committee. I have asked advice before making reply. I believe I shall suggest a good member. The card attached will go forward promptly.

I shall take advantage of the opportunity presented by Mr. Robert D. Kohn, Chairman of The Jury of Fellows. I have in mind an architect who has served his clientele with credit during a rather long period of practice. I refer to Mr. Henry A. Foeller of Green Bay, recommendation of whom was forwarded some time ago but which has been unavoidably deferred, probably for lack of supplementary evidence. Mr. Foeller's practice has been less conspicuous, due to his location away from the important centers, but is long and creditable.

Finally, I may have opportunity to present a candidate for membership in the American Institute of Architects. This name was offered to the Chapter for unanimous vote.
