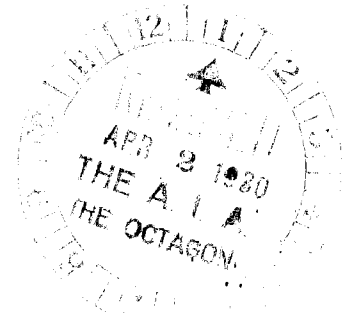

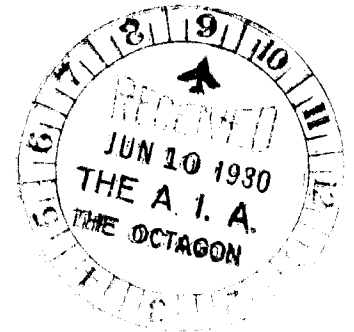

The situation is purely a local one, and I have promised to meet members of the local committee to discuss the matter, so that if my resignation has not been acted upon, you may withhold action until you hear from the local chapter.

There seems locally, to be rather a superabundance of petty annoyances and I have become somewhat impatient at their continuance. Inasmuch as the local chapter seems to be of almost no value to the Institute or itself, I finally concluded to sever connections. I did so with a great deal of regret, because many years ago I hoped that I might be a useful member of the Institute. Matters have now dwindled until it would appear that I am the only Baltimore member whose name does not appear on the Committees of the Local Chapter.

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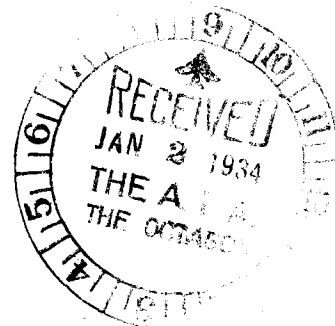

Dear Mr. Friz:

We have received your letter of December 29th, and wish to thank you for your check for \$25.00 which accompanied it. It was credited as payment of dues for the year 1933.

It is noted with much regret that you are planning to resign your membership in the Institute and it has occurred to us that in view of the plan proposed by the Officers and Directors to lighten the past and future dues burden of its members you might give favorable consideration to the continuation of your membership. At this critical time the affiliation and support of every member of the profession is badly needed by the Institute.

You have, no doubt, received the letter of January 1 from President Russell to the members, outlining the proposed plan for the reduction of future dues and the adjustment of dues for 1931 to 1933, inclusive, under certain conditions. For your ready reference a copy of that letter and of the statement which accompanied it are enclosed.

In the hope that it may be possible for you to continue, we point out that under the proposed plan your Institute dues for the year 1934 will be \$15.00, but you will have a credit of \$5.00 making the net payment \$10.00 for 1934. Thereafter, credits will be allowed each year as indicated on the statement.

At that time I had paid the full Institute dues for many years, extending up to the date of my resignation. At the time I applied for reinstatement, I was informed that, according to the method followed by the Institute, my dues were paid for some time in advance. I trust that this is true as I feel I should have the same consideration as other members of the Institute.

Mr. Kemper:

Mr. Friz wishes to be readmitted to Institute membership and to have his credit on account of the adjusted dues plan applied to his account.

Is Mr. Friz entitled to:

\$50.00 credit - which would be applied at \$5 a year for 10 years beginning with the year of readmission, or

\$30.00 credit - which would be applied at \$5 a year beginning with the year of readmission. Credits which were due beginning with 1934 to 1938 - \$20, not applied, or

no credit?

The following is a summary of his status:

Mr. Friz resigned on December 31, 1933, his Institute dues were paid to that date, so that under the adjusted dues plan established in 1934, the total amount of his overpayment for the years 1931-1933 was \$50.00.

By Convention action, in 1934, the total dues for the three years, 1931, 1932 and 1933 was set at \$25.00; and under a plan of adjustment, those members who had paid more than \$25.00 for those three years were to be credited with the overpayment by annual credit installments of \$5.00, beginning in 1934 and continuing until the credit balance was liquidated.

It would seem that Mr. Friz is entitled to the credits beginning with the year of his admission, but not for the years 1934 to the date of readmission.

*no credit, for his recognition wiped out any claim he had. Credits remained for those who got out. However, I would let him have the full \$50.00 credit, but apply it as fast as you can, not at \$5.00 rates. RB.*

MINUTES OF THE CHAPTER MEETING

A meeting of the Baltimore Chapter was held on December 9, 1942, at 1:00 P. M. at the 14 West Hamilton Street Club. Luncheon was served.

Present were Mr. Jamison, who presided, and Messrs. Lucius White, Fowler, Edmunds, Landin, Miles, Sandless, Julius Meyer, Taylor, Gaudreau, Stone, Glidden, Rodnevitch, Frank, Schroter and Lewis.

The Committee on Measuring Monuments reported through Mr. Edmunds that it proposed a series of some thirty photographs to record the Battle and Washington monuments. They had obtained an estimate of approximately one hundred and fifty dollars for the work. They proposed to approach the Mayor with an offer to share this expense with the City and a motion duly seconded and passed, they were authorized to spend up to one hundred dollars of the Chapter's funds on the project.

Mr. White reported that he had called upon Mr. Clarke, the Building Inspector, to ask that he make formal request to the O.C.D. for advice on protecting the two monuments. Mr. Clarke wrote the letter, but several days later told Mr. White that he had decided not to send it. It was suggested that the matter be approached through Mr. Cobb.

Mr. Landin reported the Committee on the annual meeting had decided to hold it at the Johns Hopkins Club on January 8th and that a charge of three dollars per plate had been tentatively established; also that Mr. Edmunds had been asked to invite Mr. Shreve.

Mr. Edmunds reported that the Nominating Committee would make the following nominations at the annual meeting:

Vice-president -	Mr. L. R. White, Jr.
Secretary -	Mr. R. E. Lewis
Treasurer -	Mr. L. W. Jamison
Director -	Mr. W. D. Landin
