

2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

## University of California at Los Angeles:

Austin, Field & Fry has designed four buildings for the Westwood Campus; Home Economics, Humanities, Business and Faculty Club. Buildings are in harmony with the general over-all program of the Campus Master Plan. The Humanities Building has a "U" shape plan allowing for expansion of both three and five story wings. An "Award Citation" in the category of Education was received in the Design Award Program of 1954 by Progressive Architecture for this building.

## St. Vincent's Hospital:

Designed by firm's senior member in 1927. Modernization and additions by Austin, Field & Fry since World War II. In 1952 a five story Nurses' College added, embodying the use of Architectural Concrete, both decoratively and structurally in the exterior walls. In 1956 a five story unit added to the existing hospital, (Estelle Doheny Wing), housing the Radiology and Maternity Departments and Eye Foundation. Wing shows interesting method of joining a new structure of contemporary design to an existing building.

## Compton College:

Founded in 1927, shared the campus and buildings of the Compton Senior High School. In 1951 an approximately 84 acre site was acquired and a master plan developed for enrollment of 2500 day students with a larger number for evening and extended day. Initial construction completed in 1953 with subsequent facilities added the following years, all by Austin, Field & Fry.

## North American Aviation, Inc.:

The company's general office building designed after a competition with other firms is a three story, pre-stressed, lift-slab, windowless, air conditioned structure with exterior brick masonry walls. In 1963 a new wing and roof heli-stop facility was added. Heli-stop involved extensive design and research due to sound and vibration requirements.

### California Electric Power Co.:

Facilities consist of a two story office building and one story transportation and warehouse structures. Office building is of pre-stressed, lift-slab construction, air conditioned with interesting colored ceramic tile panels on the main facade. A harmonious color scheme is a feature of this project.

## First Federal Savings & Loan Association:

Master plan concept provides for a twelve story office building, a multi-story department store, hotel and garage facilities. The office building, initial part of the program completed, along with the garage facilities in 1959. It is of steel frame with floors of "Q" decking, designed with light weight aluminum curtain wall of anodized metal and concrete wall panels at each end. Sunset red granite provides a facing on the lower story, entirely around the building with sun shades serving a dual purpose for sun control and protected walkways for window washing. Plans completed for the Department Store with early construction scheduled.

### Western & Southern Life Insurance Co.

A five story structure with three levels of corkscrew, ramp-type floors for parking below grade. Texas sunset red and Minnesota carnelian polished granite used on street facades. Spandrels of main facade on Wilshire Boulevard are of embossed, porcelainized steel mounted in five foot modular units. A distinctive feature is the decorative fountain with stainless steel basins and pool, surmounted by a sculptured terra cotta group of three eagles in flight.

## Shell Development Co.:

Facilities include those for Agricultural Research and Small Animal Research. Initial construction of first unit completed in 1957 and second unit in 1962. Combined laboratories are considered one of the most outstanding industrial agricultural research centers in the United States. Office and laboratory structures fully air conditioned and have brick masonry exterior walls and metal window walls in color. Lobby has a shell pattern inserted in the terrazzo floor while the walls are of Bouquet Canyon stone.

## Mt. San Antonio College:

A public community college established in 1946 on an approximate 400 acre site, utilizing facilities then in existence. After the Korean situation, Austin, Field & Fry were selected to prepare a re-development plan with consideration for enrollment of 10,000 in the day division and 14,000 in the evening division, projected to 1970. Buildings include science, engineering, agriculture, administration, physical education and library. The library building is a two story, air conditioned, limited windowless structure with the upper level projecting slightly over the lower supporting floor walls, which are of concrete and painted, while the upper story walls are rose ruffled Norman face brick with pre-cast inserts.

Project was displayed this year at the American Association of School Administrator's Convention in Atlantic City, and the National School Boards Association Convention in Houston, Texas. Other campus projects are in the design stage and under construction.

## Alhambra High School:

Initial school occupied in 1905 with all subsequent structures but one constructed prior to the Southern California earthquake of 1933. Since buildings did not meet present codes or educational standards they were scheduled to be removed. The new 2500 student school replaces the old facilities on the same site and was accomplished through careful planning and scheduling of the building program in order to maintain a full student program. New school includes two story, air conditioned classroom and administrative units, a 1500 seat auditorium on one floor with a 50 foot wide proscenium and tilt-up panels for exterior walls, pre-cast railing panels for two story units, folded plate design for roof of the Cafeteria building, interesting Moorish design for the curved auditorium facade and forecourt, harmonious color scheme and a pre-cast student bridge connecting the main campus with the physical education field.

## Thiokol Chemical Corporation:

Administration and Solid Propellant Research Facilities located in Brigham City, Utah for which construction was completed in 1960.

## Jet Propulsion Laboratory:

A complex of 26 buildings completed with distribution systems, roads, etc., completed in 1963 and located at Edwards Air Force Base, Edwards, California.

In order to provide the proper security, safety and supervision of students of Alhambra High School attending physical education periods at the site of the Athletic Field separated from the main campus by a principal city street it was necessary to erect a facility suitable for this purpose. Design involved a curved pre-cast concrete structure, lifted into place by heavy-duty equipment.

The design and installation of pre-cast masonry railings at Alhambra High School for the second floor balconies of the classroom structures involved considerations for minimum warping of the masonry panels and anchorage to the cantilever balcony slabs. The panels are of pebble finish on the exterior surface and combed finish on the interior. Panels are 5' wide X 6'-3" high and 3" in thickness and project 3'-8" above the balcony floor and 2'-7" below. A 2" separation has been provided between each panel.



## 1966 AIA Convention Denver, Colorado June 26 – July 1

FOR RELEASE MAY 14, 1966

WASHINGTON D.C., May 14, 1966 -- Seven California architects are among 60 architects in the nation; advanced to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects. The AIA announced 1966 recipients of the lifetime honor today.

The state residents are Rex Whitaker Allen of 750 Lovell Avenue, Mill Valley; Roy Morse Drew of 8371 La Jolla Shores Drive, La Jolla; Arthur Froehlich of 836 South Beverly Glen Boulevard, Los Angeles; Charles Eugene Fry of 1265 South Orange Grove Boulevard, Pasadena; Donald L. Hardison of 1415 Vista Road, El Cerrito; Howard H. Morgridge of 2973 Meyerola Lane, Pasadena, and Gin Dan Wong of 4536 Don Valdes Drive, Los Angeles.

The 60 new Fellows bring the number of Institute members using the letters FAIA after their names to 698, representing only 3.8 percent of the more than 18,000 architects who are corporate AIA members. California now has 107 Fellows, more than any other state.

Investiture of the new Fellows will take place at the annual banquet and ball, Friday, July 1, climaxing the 93th annual convention of the Institute to be held in Denver, Colo., beginning June 26.

Allen, Fry and Hardison were elevated to Fellowship for service to the profession of architecture; Morgridge for service to the profession and for design; Drew, Froehlich and Wong for design.

Rex Allen, 51, has been a principal of his own firm, Rex Whitaker Allen and Associates of San Francisco, since 1953. He is known for his design of many hospitals and nursing homes in California, and his views on design of medical facilities have been widely published.

His 18 years of activities on behalf of the architectural profession culminated in his election to the national vice presidency of the AIA for a second term in 1965. He had earlier served several terms as an officer of the Northern California Chapter and member of the board of the California Council AIA. He received his arts and architecture degrees from Harvard University.

Roy Drew, 53, is a partner in the firm of Robert Mosher and Roy Drew of La Jolla. A Stanford University graduate with an architecture degree from Yale, Drew has designed banks, schools and other institutional buildings in La Jolla and San Diego. His La Jolla Federal Savings & Loan, Bank of America and San Diego Trust Savings Bank designs have been honored with awards from the San Diego Chapter AIA.

A member of the Institute since 1948, Drew has been active in chapter activities and served as president of the San Diego Chapter last year.

Arthur Froehlich, 57, heads the firm of Arthur Froehlich & Associates of Beverly Hills. He is registered to practice in 10 states, and he has designed projects in Canada, Mexico, New Zealand, Central and South America. He has been cited for pioneering the use of post-tensioned and precast concrete design.

The architect has designed several award-winning race tracks, among them the Roosevelt and Aqueduct Race Tracks in New York and the Hipodromo Nacional in Caracas. He has also designed senior citizens housing in Oceanside, a parking structure for UCLA, the Union Bank Data Center and the Fidelity Bank in Los Angeles.

Charles Fry, 60, has been a member of the Los Angeles firm of Austin, Field & Fry since 1946. The firm has designed hospitals, college buildings, industrial and business centers throughout California.

A graduate of the University of Southern California, Fry served seven years as an officer with the Army Corps of Engineers and the Army Air Corps. He holds the rank of Colonel.

Active in committee work and as an officer of the Southern California Chapter AIA and the California Council for the past 18 years, Fry was instrumental in reorganizing the Council in 1953 and establishing its new offices in San Francisco.

Donald Hardison, 50, member of the Richmond firm of Hardison and Komatsu, established a general practice in the San Francisco Bay area in 1948 following his wartime employment as naval architect with the Kaiser Company. His design of a student center for his alma mater, the University of California, has won several national design awards.

He has also received honors for design of Easter Hill housing in Richmond and the town's Memorial Youth Center. President of the California Council this year, Hardison has been a member of national Institute committees on schools and housing. He conducts seminars annually to introduce the practice and scope of the profession to high school and college students.


Howard Morgridge, 47, has received state and national honors for design of such projects as Corona Del Mar Elementary School, Santa Monica City College, Carver Elementary School and buildings for Pomona and El Camino Colleges. He is a graduate of University of Southern California, and a member of the firm of Smith, Powell & Morgridge of Los Angeles.

As president of the Southern California Chapter AIA, he headed a vigorous campaign to save the Dodge House; he was director of Pasadena Beautiful in 1965, and this year he serves as vice president and president elect of the California Council. An accomplished painter, he has had five invitational one-man shows in California.

Gin Dan Wong, 43, a native of Canton, China, received his architectural training at the University of Southern California. He became associated with the firm of Pereira & Luckman in 1950, and since 1958 he has been president of William L. Pereira & Associates of Los Angeles. Among his award-winning designs are the Union Oil Center at Los Angeles, Santa Fe Springs Library, Ventura Savings & Loan, and headquarters for Hunt Foods & Industries and Occidental Life Insurance Company.

The new Fellow has been cited by his colleagues for his significant contributions to university architecture, as evidenced by buildings he has designed for the University of Southern California.
