This office, organized in 1926, is engaged in the general practice of Architecture, varying from one room apartments, housing four persons, to country estates. At one extreme is a model hot-dog stand and at the other, a World War II Memorial. The practice includes traditional work, some strictly archeological and it includes contemporary work where freedom of thought is encouraged.

In all cases, a basic assumption was made long ago, which is that the style and conditions imposed do not preclude the employment of skill and experience in design. Proportions, textures and materials are as carefully studied — or almost so — where the client's program is restricting as where the architect is enabled to join with the client in the program itself.
