2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

Any refugee from Hitler's Germany has had to face more stark facts than his American contemporaries. HENRY KLUMB in this role, armored with a disciplined professional education in which architectural design and engineering were early fused, has come up the hard way. Circumstance and gifted intelligence have moulded his career into an entity, wherein design competence has been rationally balanced with early exposure to official responsibilities - on Planning Boards, Housing Authorities, Public Works offices - until finally and happily engaged as Consultant on an imposing succession of positions close to the ears of the young Puerto Rico Commonwealth.

An early commission - the Church of San Martin de Porres - reveals awareness of the climate and its necessity for catching the slightest breeze through sidewall baffles without mechanical air-conditioning.

A hotel, La Rada, also shows ingenious forms designed to the same end, with its open, convector-like central court.

But it is a long series of structures for the University of Puerto Rico (over 20,000 students) which are consistently stamped with excellence: very direct planning solutions, a variety of methods of sun control and air movement, economy in construction result in an almost indigenous expression,

Finally, the Parke-Davis Plant betrays a powerful expression of this candidate's superior knowledge of structure and utility handsomely combined.

This nominee is urgently recommended for Advancement to Fellowship in Design.

Although the sponsors of this Candidate preferred to nominate him for Advancement in Design, nevertheless his Achievement in Public Service (mostly as a paid Consultant) is notable, as evidenced by the attached APPENDIX B - PLANNING WORK, for he has served his Government and Community in a most constructive manner.

To be remembered is the fact that Puerto Rico has grown phenominally from the status of a Territory under the U. S. Department of the Interior to that of a Commonwealth, with its own Parliament and Supreme Court. In his early days in Puerto Rico, the candidate stood virtually alone as a talented and experienced architect in a land where traditionally the engineer performed the functions of our profession. It is to his everlasting credit that he won the trust of his new government, resulting in a most notable contribution to the orderly advancement of the profession, by which his experience, his talent and effectiveness has borne a rich harvest in his community.


Dear Miss Gervais:


