He was the Architect, in partnership with Ernest Grunsfeld, Jr., for the notable Rosenwald housing project in Chicago, known as the Michigan Voulevard Gardens, one of the pioneer large-scale housing developments which stands today as a definite achievement in advanced planning.



PROPOSAL

The purpose of this presentation is to outline the basis for the selection of Eugene Henry Klaber of the Chicago Chapter for a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects.

This recognition is based on the broad foundation of his -

Achievement in Architectural Design Achievement in Education and Literature Achievement in Service to the Institute, and Achievement in Public Service

Especially noteworthy is his unusual service to the Institute and to the profession in -

- a. Establishing sound principles of planning in the field of <u>large scale housing</u>;
- b. Assisting architects in the development of well-planned projects, and
- c. Educating the public as to the value and desirability of architectural service.

To those who have been in a position to observe these outstanding services to the Institute and to the profession, there can be no doubt that the high honor of Fellowship is fully deserved.

ACHIEVEMENT IN ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN

Mr. Klaber was engaged in the private practice of architecture in New York from 1913 to 1924. During these years his work received

special recognition through an award by the Queensboro Chamber of Commerce for the best designed industrial building erected in the Borough of Queens (the Treo Factory) between the years 1920 and 1925. He also received the second prize in the Competition for Remodelling a Slum Area Block held by the New York State Housing Commission in 1922.

From 1924 to 1933 he carried on a private practice in Chicago, being in partnership with Ernest Grunsfeld, Jr., for the first five years of the period. This firm was the architect for the notable Rosenwald Housing Project in Chicago, known as Michigan Boulevard Gardens, one of the pioneer large-scale housing developments which stands today as a definite achievement in advanced planning.

Other notable buildings designed by this firm were -

Homberg Memorial Infirmary, Massachusetts Institute of Technology,

Jewish Peoples Institute, Chicago,

Stephen A. Douglas Branch, Chicago Public Library,

Whitehall Apartment Hotel, Chicago,

and several fine residences in the Chicago area.

In addition to these accomplishments, reference should be made to his work as a public officer where his studies in economical design and the fundamentals of planning for large scale housing projects have been generally recognized as of great influence on this type of work.
