

Dear Mr. Taylor:

About a year ago I wrote to you when I was planning a lecture tour of Architectural Schools. You gave me some good counsel then; so I am coming to you for some more.

I have given careful thought to Mr. Klaber's letter and your note. It sounds like a worthy project but I am quite hesitant to use the Memo as a vehicle for promoting a lecture tour of this kind. There are, undoubtedly, many other members particularly in the colleges who would like to do this very thing.

I think Mr. Klaber's best bet would be to write chapters in addition to schools to see whether, as you suggest, he cannot raise his fee sufficiently to cover his travel expenses. I guess my reaction is that I don't see much reason for promoting this particular lecture tour over others that might come our way and, in any event, I would want to know a lot more about the material Mr. Klaber is going to present. If we did promote the tour in the Memo, it would be almost the same as Institute sponsorship of it, and I don't think we're prepared to do that.

This certainly is not very helpful to you, and I'd be glad to talk about it if you think we can come up with any better suggestions.

Dear Mr. Klaber:

We write in reply to your letter of April 20th. We have discussed in staff the question of how we might assist in the promotion of your series of lectures.

The Editor of Memo has considered the possibility of announcing the series in Memo but this is not considered appropriate since we do not have a definite policy or program for promoting lectures by members or others. This Department has assisted in the planning of lecture tours for Sir Patrick Abercrombie and Mr. Willem Dudok by special directives from the Board of Directors.

The A.I.A. has at this time no funds to subsidize such a lecture tour. The Langley Funds were at one time available for research projects by advanced scholars and practitioners but are now limited to aid to undergraduate students.

My only suggestion at this time is that you communicate with the secretaries of the chapters of the Institute suggesting that they collaborate with the nearby school in communicate with the secretaries of the chapters of the school to increase the stipend. I enclose a list of the current chapter officers.

I am very sorry that I cannot be of further assistance. We should be interested to learn how the itinerary works out. One school in the Middle West has written requesting our advice and we have told them of your extensive experience and qualifications and have unofficially endorsed your appearance.
