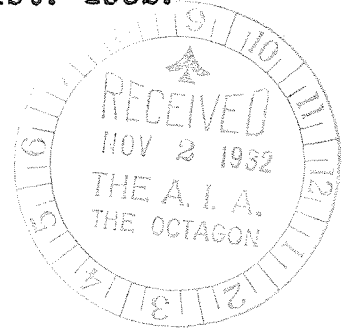

Dear Mr. Krimmel:

We wish to thank you for your letter of October 31st, and the certificate of your graduation from the University of Pennsylvania, which is in entirely acceptable form - in connection with your application for membership in The American Institute of Architects.

Dear Mr. Bergstrom:

It is much to my regret that I cannot send you the money for delinquent dues. While I have a contract with the government for the designing of a housing project on which drafting is nearly completed, fees advanced to date have gone to draftsmen which, I think you will agree, is as it should be. Out of the fees paid to date, \$5,500., for constant work since September, my associate and I have drawn but \$350. The balance has gone to meet payrolls. All draftsmen and expenses are paid to date. Immediate payrolls on this and other work I am doing make it impossible to release funds for other items at this time.

If the Institute cannot agree that the regular payment of draftsmen is of prime importance today and cannot wait until I enjoy my profits I am afraid that you must drop me as a member of the Institute. I will meet my past obligations as soon as fees pass my expense account which should be within the next ~~three~~ or four weeks.

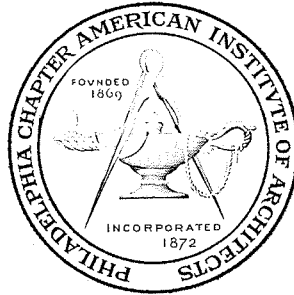

State May Get Estate In Litigation Over Will

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania may get the estate of the late Mrs. Harry T. Porter in the event that probate of her will is not sustained. It was disclosed yesterday.

Mrs. Porter, who lived at 318 W. Johnson st., Germantown, died last Aug. 20. She was 89. Probate of her will naming Provident Trust Co. as executor has been appealed in Orphans' Court here by Mrs. Lella M. B. Smith, of Tucson, Ariz., a niece and heir of Mrs. Porter's deceased husband.

INFLUENCE CHARGED

She alleged that Mrs. Porter lacked testamentary capacity and that her will was the result of undue influence by Miss Helen Birmingham, her companion for 20 years, to whom Mrs. Porter willed \$100,000 of her husband's \$2,000,000 estate and \$300,000 of her own estate. Mrs. Porter, income beneficiary, had a power of appointment under her husband's will.

Disclosure of the contest was made during the audit of Porter's estate before Judge Harold Saylor.

Mrs. Smith's attorney, former Judge Grover C. Ladner, who filed her appeal, told Saylor Mrs. Porter had no nearer relatives than three or four cousins. Therefore, if the will was lawfully executed, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania would have an interest under the Act of 1917.

FUND RETAINED

"There is a grave question," said Ladner, "whether the relatives will ever get the estate or not, because the moment I file the petition, I will notify the Commonwealth and they will step in."

Pending outcome of the contest, Judge Saylor ordered the trustees to retain the \$100,000 fund bequeathed to Miss Birmingham.

Should the contest prove successful the one-third shares awarded to Mrs. Smith, Isaac T. Porter and Harry P. Porter, 2d, nephews, would be enhanced by \$101,000.

In that event, Miss Birmingham would be the chief but not the only beneficiary, unless similar provisions in a previously made will were found valid.

HOSPITAL WOULD LOSE

Children's Hospital of Philadelphia would lose a gift of Mrs. Porter's home, valued at \$387,750.

Cash bequests that would be void would include \$5000 to Children's Hospital, and \$5000 each to American Mission to Lepers, New York, and Whosoever Gospel Mission, 101 E. Chelton ave.

Other cash bequests that would be invalid would be \$5000 to Mrs. Porter's daughter Robert Stewart, \$5000 to William Thurman, a part-time employee, and \$1000 to "Alice," a bondmaid.

A bequest of \$1000 to Mrs. Porter's friends, Mr. and Mrs. Howard A. Feder, also would be void.

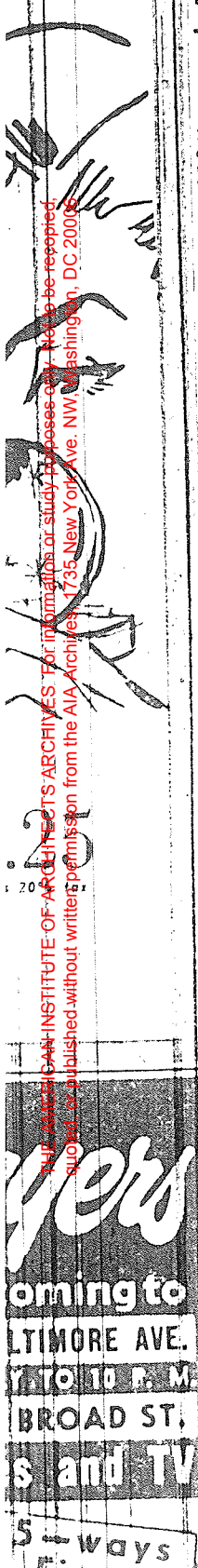
