My dear Mr. Kushne:

Mr. Kemper forwarded to me your inquiry of the 14th, together with copy of his reply.

I am very glad to give you my views on the question you raise, which is in a sense, an hypothetical one.

Let us review the situation as it might develop rather than in its immediate innocent aspect. As long as human nature is human nature it is quite conceivable that the fact that you are a stock holder in a lumber yard might become generally known among your local contractors, even/you made every effort to keep the fact secret. Just as soon as that fact was known it would be only human for the contractors striving to gain favor with you to see that the particular lumber yard in which you were financially interested was favored and any disclosure of such favoring coming to the ears of your clients quite possibly brought by "rival lumber concerns" would at once place you in an awkward position.

It is true that your specifications could not very well show discrimination in favor of the concern in which you are financially interested, but nevertheless the fact that financial interest in any building material or device is an insidious danger was recognized by the framers of Article 8, to which you refer.

I am not undertaking to advise you as to participation in the affairs of the Company but am pointing out the possibility of danger.

Your notice in the November OCTAGON, not received until December, caught us in a difficult position. We had been planning to nominate Mr. Hugo F. Kuehne for Fellowship when he unexpectedly had to go to the hospital for a major operation. He is only just out.

Because of the overloaded mails and express at this season we are still further reduced in time in order to ship his exhibition of work to reach The Octagon before December 31, 1943.

A further handicap has been the fact that he had sent most of his best photographs to Washington, in connection with his selection for government work, and they have not been returned. We have made up this deficiency as best we could. However, our main basis for his nomination is his splendid public service. We have included Design also because we feel that his work is outstanding for this region. The local conditions under which the nominee's practice of architecture has been conducted should be understood. One of the earlier architects in a locality then practically devoid of good architecture, the quality of his design produced a definitely beneficial effect on the architecture of the community in both civic and domestic work, raising the standards and creating a demand for good architecture previously non-existent.

Many of the Texas architects who would gladly have written you approving of his nomination, men such as Ralph Cameron, Carleton Adams, etc., are now in the service and cannot be reached.

Personally I have known Mr. Kuehne more than fifteen years and have found him an earnest member of the Institute, quietly undertaking all work given him in the Chapter and performing it most efficiently. I believe him to be the ranking architect of this community, certainly the most civic minded, absolutely ethical, and through his consistently fine service an honor to the profession.

### Austin Project Is Nation's Girst

The Housing Authority accepted Santa Rita as substantially complete June 24, 1939—which marked the completion of the first project in the country under the USHA program. Rosewood was accepted as substantially complete September 1, 1939; Chalmers Court, December 2, 1939. A total of 40 dwelling units, or 142 rooms, for Santa Rita were constructed at a cost of \$104,023.28, or a construction cost of \$2,600 per dwelling unit or \$733 per room. This includes the cost of everything which went into the buildings and the development of site, excluding only the cost of landscaping, carrying charges, administrative costs, and preoccupancy charges. A total of 60 dwelling units containing 196 rooms for the negro families were constructed at a cost of \$149,060.28, or a cost of approximately \$2,485 per dwelling unit, or \$761 per room. Chalmers Court, to house 86 white families in 321 rooms, was constructed at a total cost of \$239,833.31, or \$2,788 per dwelling unit, or \$784 per room.

### Labor Shares in Construction

Up to January 1, 1940, the contractors on the Austin Housing Authority projects had worked Austin laborers for a total of 301,427 man-hours giving them a total pay roll of \$229,953.98. Of this amount, \$46,990.92 was paid to unskilled workers, while \$182,963.06 was paid to skilled and semi-skilled workers.
