The Committee here does not emphasize large work or monumental work, in fact the average project, such as a small residence, or store, or school or church, is entirely acceptable. The purpose of the exhibits is merely to show that the architect is rendering the proper measure of service to his client.

The exhibits should consist of photographs or camera pictures of two buildings, and working drawings of each sufficient in quantity to show how the drawings are turned out. The material can be taken readily from the architects' files and it will be returned safely and promptly.
