The coveted AIA Community Service Award was presented to two persons this year-- both architects--fortheir outstanding contributions to the South Florida area.

for the interior of the Stewart Medical Group office at Mercy Hospital,

Charles M. Sieger, AIA, and Mark J. Spector for their joint-venture in designing Spec's Music Shop at Dadeland.

The AIA Student Award to the most outstanding fifth (final) year student in the University of Miami's Department of Architecture was won by Pasquale Papaianne.

Charles Harrison Pawley, AIA, chairman of "Architectural Week," said the highlight of the week's activities will be the Sixth Annual Urban Workshop of Community Leaders aboard the S.S. Monarch Sun sailing Friday (Nov. 21) and returning Monday morning, Nov. 24th.

Tallahassee -- Long-time Miami Architect Robert M. Little, FAIA, has been presented with the Gold Medal by members of the Florida Association of the American Institute of Architects.

The highest award presented by the architectural profession in Florida, the Gold Medal recognizes Little's distinquished leadership and service to the Association over an extended length of time and the outstanding effort he has contributed to the advancement of the achitectual profession throughout the state.

Little was presented with the Gold Medal at the FA/AIA annual Fall Conference in St. Petersburg last month.

During the ceremony it was pointed out that most architects in the Miami area who got their start in the late 1940's and 1950's began in one of three architectural firms. One of those firms was Robert Little's.

A native of Uniontown, PA, Little studied under the Beau-Arts System of education in Philadelphia and moved to Florida in 1925. He opened his office in Miami in 1932 and became president of the Florida South Chapter of the AIA in mid-1940. He served as president of the FA/AIA and in 1960 was selected to be a member of the College of Fellows by the AIA in the category of design.

Considered by his peers as one of the leading design architects in South Florida, Little has always been noted for his willingness to share his knowledge with young architects, always expressing his deep concern for quality and professionalism.

Little is only the ninth architect in the state to be presented with the Gold Medal since it was first presented in 1964.
