- a) Frithjof Martin Lunde has made contributions to the development of contemporary architecture through achievements in integration of architectural practice with environmental consulting, systems building, landscape analysis and regional planning, energy research and development, landscape architecture, tourism studies and public policy studies.

As an architectural generalist and practitioner, he has contributed in design collaboration, administration, management, site and landscape design to the many significant buildings and projects executed by his firm, Warner Burns Toan Lunde, and to its substantial international practice. He served WBTL as President of its Townland System Housing subsidiary company, an Operation Breakthrough Winner.

Frithjof M. Lunde is considered to be one of the early proponents of environmental awareness in the architectural profession and is also prominent in the group contributing to development of Institute and public policy relative to energy in the built environment. He was a founder and first chairman (1965-66) of the Natural Environment Committee of the New York Chapter of the Institute. This Committee is believed to constitute a first such effort in this direction within the Institute.

Lunde is the Chairman-designate for 1977 of the Institute's Regional Development & Natural Resources Committee and has served on the Committee since 1971, chairing its sub-committees on Surface Mining & Energy (1973-74) and working on other Institute position papers, including Environmental Ethics.

He served on the A. I. A. Task Force on Energy Conservation in Buildings and represented the Institute in planning the A. S. C. E. 1973 Henniker Conference on Energy Research and Development Policy. In interprofessional service, he currently serves, as an individual, on the American Society of Civil Engineers' Environmental Impact Assessment Research Council and the Coastal Zone Management Committee of the Marine Technology Society.

Lunde was instrumental in 1970 in forming a consortium corporation of 12 environmental consulting firms, including WBTL, broadly ranged through environmental design, the natural and earth sciences, sociology and economics. He has been President of it, TEG International, the Total Environment Group, since 1970 and involved in its multi-disciplinary team projects which have included national parks planning, environmental impact assessment, new community design and international tourism development studies.

In public policy studies, Lunde has served on the Task Group on Land Use and Natural Resources of the Hudson Basin Project (1974) and contributed an analysis of geothermal development on the built environment for a technology assessment by the Futures Group under contract to the National Science Foundation.

Lunde has participated as architect/planner in tourism studies for the Governments of Honduras, El Salvador and Nicaragua.

Lunde has been an early exponent and leader in the profession for environmental concern in architecture. He was instrumental in Founding the Natural Environment Committee of the New York Chapter and it, in turn, submitted a resolution (annexed) passed by the 1967 Convention which further focused environmental awareness within the Institute. He has authored several position papers which have become Institute policy and transmitted Institute attitudes to the U. S. Council on Environmental Quality and the United States Mission to the U. N. Environmental Conference, Stockholm. He is currently working on Environmental Ethics for the Design Profession.

Report of the Resolutions Committee

Resolution #4

Proposed by: New York Chapter
Re: Natural Environment

WHEREAS, the dynamics of population and economic expansion demand the transformation of the natural environment in unprecedented degree and direction, and

WHEREAS, these problems inevitably create conflicts in values between desirable social objectives in the use and conservation of land and other natural resources, and

WHEREAS, the resources of land, atmosphere, and water can no longer be considered limitless reservoirs, and

WHEREAS, these resources are being polluted and degraded through this expansion of man's own activities, and

WHEREAS, there are increasing efforts in the Federal, State, and local governments to develop a basis for total environmental planning which will inevitably affect the architectural profession; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the American Institute of Architects in convention assembled hereby instructs the Board of Directors of the Institute to undertake a study, to be completed prior to the next annual convention, on the proper areas of professional concern in the exploitation of the natural environment; such study to address itself specifically to the establishment of policies on matters of broad public concern wherein conflicts of desirable objectives are found to exist.

The Resolutions Committee moves the adoption of this resolution.

Thank you for your letter of the 24th of November about Fritthjof
M. Lunde. Let me tell you briefly why I endorse Fritz' candidacy

In due course Burns and Lunde broke thru the ceiling of our office
and were on the path of helping to build the splendid firm of
Warner Burns Toan Lunde destined to be well known for their design
and superb professional services. It was to Fritz that I often
referred talent seeking the best outlet. In this way I maintained
occasional contact with Lunde over the years.

A visit to Fritz' office three years ago made it evident that he was
much more than a good designer and an adept merchant of professional
services, but that he was doing much for the profession as a whole.
Energy, resources, the environment and conservation had not really
come into our vocabulary back when I first knew Lunde. It was inevitable

This letter is written in support of the nomination of Frithjof M. Lunde for fellowship in the Institute.

I am very familiar with the work of Fritz Lunde and feel he has made unique and important contributions to the profession. There has been a consistent and long standing commitment in his work and in his attitude as a professional that represents the most important new trends that are now being identified with architecture. He has had an early understanding of the unbreakable links between the built and natural environment. He has been concerned with the complex nature of decision-making that requires the contributions of ecologists, hydrologists, geologists, and representatives of all disciplines dealing with the true nature of our fragile and finite environment, in order to make building decisions that help to reshape this environment for human use. His commitment has been not merely on a pragmatic and self-advancing level, but rather out of a deep concern for the direction of world development and for the architect's role in determining what these changes will entail. It has taken an extraordinary amount of his extra curricular time, resulting in a number of important and creative activities that have benefited the entire profession. He was one of a group that established an effective committee to investigate these matters for the New York Chapter. The outgrowth of the committee's work has included the first systematic investigations of energy use in buildings and has ranged into land use, river valley use, and the implications of the various energy producing alternatives that are available to us. He has worked effectively with citizen's groups and foundations in mapping and identifying important natural resources. He was an effective member of a very broadly based group of experts that studied the Hudson River Basin under a Rockefeller Foundation grant and prepared a thoughtful paper dealing with land use in the river valley.

He has pioneered the establishment of new forms and extensions of architectural practice to include multi-disciplinary groups equipped to analyze complex environmental conditions and prepare reports and plans dealing with the most intelligent ways to use or not use different areas.

In addition to this important new professional avenue that Fritz has opened, he is a key member of a firm that has made noteworthy design contributions to architecture around the world. I am very pleased to support the nomination of Frithjof M. Lunde for Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects.



Mr. Lunde served as the AIA representative on the Conference Steering Committee for the Interprofessional Council on Environmental Design (ICED) meeting at Airlie, Virginia November 28 - 30, 1972. The purpose of the Conference was to develop a "Positive Interprofessional Approach to the Environmental Impact Statement." The members of ICED are all thirteen of the professional design societies. Environmental Research

Correspondence and Materials on "Mastermapping", the Environmental Analysis Technique of Frithjof M. Lunde

Note: The history of "mastermapping" is the story of a research proposal originally generated as a citizen's action technique, evolving into a multi-disciplinary investigation of natural and environmental criteria universally understandable to and supportable by the official bodies of many different professionals and sciences and finally into a recognition that value analysis of environmental factors according to standardized scientific and professional criteria is properly the business of the U. S. Government and the International Agencies. It is significant to note that even in 1976 the Federal Government has yet to successfully formulate a mapping technique to quantify Environmental Quality while freely acknowledging the value to national and state land use planning in so doing. (The history of Mastermapping also includes a number of research funding promises which were not kept due to such circumstances as shifts in executive personnel, changes in Federal and Foundation funding levels, etc.)

Subsequently the involvement of a number of environmental and natural science professionals in the Mastermapping Concept Group led directly to the founding of TEG - The Total Environment Group.
