

Entered practice of Architecture as an individual under the firm name of Edwin H. Lundie, Architect, in 1920. For a period of approximately three years the practice of the office was in the field of Religious and Institutional Architecture, and occasionally in Domestic Architecture. Following that period the practice, with only occasional exception, has been Domestic Architecture, varying in scale from cottages to country estates and town houses. Practice has included Interior Architecture, Furniture Design and Decoration, and on occasion, Garden Design.

Mr. Lundie does not maintain a large office. Every drawing issued from his office receives his personal attention, and many of them are drawn by him. He will not undertake a project until he is able to give it his personal care and attention from the first conference to the completion of construction. During the past fifteen years he has had many clients who have waited two or three years to have him design houses for them.

Mr. Lundie is not a slave to any tradition; he is neither a dusty copiest of old things nor a follower of glib modernists. He is a creator of order, utility and beauty, using his fertile native abilities enriched by many years of careful and painstaking work and study. He is never satisfied with anything less than perfection. He has learned much about many crafts, especially wood working, metal working and masonry, and is an accomplished designer in these fields.

While his work is widely varied, it all bears the imprint of his personality and creative imagination. Often those who know his work will recognize an unfamiliar piece of work as being his. Mr. Lundie's own summer home is on the North Shore of Lake Superior. Although it is off the highway and is reached by a narrow side road, it has become known as a place of rare charm, and receives many visitors. Mr. Lundie has been heard to remark that he can count those who have been there in his absence, and even identify some of them by examining the nose prints left on the windows by those seeking a glimpse of the attractive interior.

DULUTH, Minn. (P)—A St. Paul architect who started in the profession as an unpaid office boy was honored Friday night as the Minnesota Society of Architects ended its annual meeting here.

Edwin H. Lundie, 70, was the subject of a "This is Your Life" presentation for a career that had found him designing structures stretching from the North Shore of Lake Superior to Palm Beach, Fla.
