

Paul Thiry has been advanced to Fellowship for achievement in design. Decorated by the French Government in 1950 as an Officier d'Academie Française with Palms, Thiry is a leading exponent of modern architecture in his native northwest, and through the excellence of his work on all types of buildings has materially advanced and influenced the standards of contemporary design in the region. He has pioneered in the field of ecclesiastical architecture and his churches of Our Lady of the Lake and Christ the King, both in Seattle, are among the few in the country designed in a straight forward contemporary style.

Born in Nome, Alaska in 1904, Thiry attended St. Martins School in Lacey, Washington, and the University of Washington, from which he received a B.Arch. in 1928. He studied for two years at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Fontainebleau and has traveled extensively. In private practice since 1929, he maintains his own office at 800 Columbia Street, Seattle.

His practice includes the design and supervision of construction covering all classes of structures - industrial, commercial, residential, educational, group housing, religious, medical and public buildings. His creative design, his expertness in selection and use of materials, good taste capabilities in solving utilitarian aspects of architectural problems, and his clear thinking and forthright planning, have all contributed to the general high calibre of his work. Examples include: Electrical Engineering building, University of Washington, 1947; housing project, Port Orchard, 1944; U.S. Navy Advance Base Depot, Tacoma, 1944; Women's Dormitory, State College, Pullman, 1950; Martin and Eckmann, Seattle, 1949; Museum, Seattle, 1950; Frye Art Gallery, Seattle, 1950; and numerous Seattle residences.

Thiry has been a member of the A.I.A. since 1940, served on the Institute's allied arts committee from 1947 to 1949, and is currently on the education committee. He is vice-president of the Washington State Chapter and has headed various Chapter committees. Other organizations to which he belongs are: American Society of Planning Officials, American Institute of Planners, American Civic and Planning Association, Society of Architectural Historians, Pacific Northwest Academy of Arts.

He has lectured at the University of Washington, University of Houston, Seattle Art Museum, Women's University Club and British Columbia Society of Architects. In collaboration with Richard Bennett and Henry Kamphoefner, he is at present working on a book on church architecture due for publication this year.



WASHINGTON, D. C. -- June 4, 1963 -- Seattle architect Paul A. Thiry, FAIA, has been appointed by President Kennedy to a six-year term on the National Capital Planning Commission.

The commission is in charge of overall planning in Washington, and has responsibility to designate urban renewal areas and approve redevelopment plans.

Thiry replaces architect Alexander C. Robinson, III, FAIA, of Cleveland, whose term on the 13-member commission expired April 30. Thiry becomes one of five members appointed by the President. Other members are ex-officio, representing Federal and District agencies and the House and Senate District Committees.

Thiry has served as chairman of The American Institute of Architects' Committee on the National Capital since 1960. The committee is charged with carrying out the "traditional interest of the Institute in the orderly and proper growth and development of the National Capital with due regard for its fundamental character, its characteristic plan, and its continually expanding requirements." In January, the committee sponsored an issue of the AIA Journal devoted entirely to Washington. Thiry served as guest editor for the issue.

Born in Nome, Alaska, Thiry attended the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris and the University of Washington. He has been a practicing architect since 1929. He is a former chairman of the Seattle Planning Commission and member of the Puget Sound Regional Planning Council. He was chief architect of the Seattle World's Fair.

Paul Thiry FAIA 1904-1993

Paul Thiry, known for his contribution to the architecture of the Pacific Northwest since the mid-1930's, for his city and regional planning in the early 1950s, and as principal architect of the Seattle World's Fair, died June 27, 1993.

Thiry, born in Nome, Alaska of French immigrant parents, attended the University of Washington from which he received an architecture degree in 1928. His training, in the Beaux Arts tradition, took him abroad on worldwide tours, including a period at the American School at Fontainebleau. Norm Johnston recalls Paul Thiry's report of the strong impression he took from a 1933 visit to the Chicago World's Fair; and of a stay in Japan. In 1929, he opened an office in Seattle.

Much of his early work was residential, in a formal language associated with the European Modernists, particularly Le Corbusier, whom he met briefly while on a world tour in 1934. Thiry gained an international reputation in the 1950s with his design of the US Embassy Residence in Santiago, Chile, and for his contribution to the planning and preservation of the US capital as a member of the Capital Planning Commission in the 1960s. He was also the architectural consultant to the Army Corps of Engineers in the design and planning of the Libby Dam on the Kootenai River in Montana.

Among his local buildings are the Museum of History and Industry, the Frye Art Museum, Mercer Island Presbyterian Church, St. Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church, Washington State Library in Olympia, the Washington Mutual Building at 2nd & Spring, several buildings at Portland's Lewis and Clark College, and the Seattle Center Coliseum. Known for expressing his strong opinions, Thiry will be remembered by many for his contributions to the urban planning of Seattle. An outspoken critic of the City Planning Commission, he opposed its plans to erect the elevated freeway blocking views of and access to the waterfront, and resigned from the commission in protest. His active interest in professional affairs continued throughout his life.

AIA Seattle's President in 1951-52, Paul Thiry became a Fellow of The American Institute of Architects in 1951, serving as Chancellor of the College of Fellows in 1962. In 1965, he received an AIA citation for his work in community design. In 1984, along with Paul Hayden Kirk, he was the first recipient of the Seattle Chapter Medal -- the highest honor AIA Seattle can bestow upon an architect. In May 1993, Paul Thiry attended a meeting of the AIA Seattle Senior Council, recognized along with the two other former Chancellors from Seattle, Robert L. Durham FAIA and Jane Hastings FAIA.

PAUL THIRY + + 1904 - 1993

With the death of Paul Thiry on June 27th, the American Institute of Architects and the College of Fellows lost not only one of their oldest members but a most distinguished architect. Born in Nome, Alaska, but spending most of his life in Seattle, he graduated from the University of Washington with a Bachelor of Architecture degree in 1928. Study in Europe (Fontainebleau, France) and a leisurely round—the—world trip added to his preparation for a professional career that was notable for its range and quality: residences, churches, libraries, residence halls, schools, war memorials, hydroelectric dams, and exposition pavilions that firmly established his national and international reputation. He was one of the innovators in his introduction in the 1930s to the Pacific Northwest of the modern design idiom in architecture at a time when it was only just emerging in the United States.

As principal architect for the 1962 Seattle World's Fair, he guided the site planning for that major civic effort and was the architect for several of its most innovative buildings. As planning consultant for the campuses of both the University of Washington and the Olympia State Capitol and as a member of the Seattle City Planning Commission and later of the National Capital Planning Commission in WAshington, D.C., he was noted for his visionary talents as city and regional planner and urban design critic. At the time of the construction of Interstate 5 through Seattle, his was a lone voice for building a lid to unite the two sides of the city across its alignment, an idea rejected at the time but in recent years being realized by the construction of Freeway Park and the Washington State Convention Center.

Both he and his projects have been the subject of articles in local, regional, national, and international publications as well as being recipients of numerous professional and institutional awards citing outstanding design achievements. A active member of the American Institute of Architects since 1940 and Seattle Chapter president in 1951-52, he was elected a Fellow in the College in 1952, becoming its Chancellor in 1962. It was during this tenure that he founded and was the initial donor to the College of Fellows Fund, today the College's principal service program. He is survived by his two sons, Paul A., Jr., AlA, and Pierre. P., both residents in the Seattle area.

Paul Thiry will be especially remembered by a large number of Seattle architects who worked for him as part of their own professional progress and the lessons he taught by his example of dedication to architecture and the design standards he emulated. At his request, a Paul Albert Thiry, Sr. AIA Scholarship Fund is being established for students in the College of Architecture and Urban Planning to assist them in preparing for their architectural careers.
