In 1918 he was instrumental in helping organize the Kansas Society of Architects, which, in 1921, became the Kansas Chapter of the A.I.A. 1. In 1918 shortly after Mr. Schmidt established his practice in Wichita, he was largely instrumental in organizing the Kansas Society of Architects, which in 1921 became the Kansas Chapter, A.I.A. He was elected president of the Kansas Society of Architects for two terms, of the Kansas Chapter A.I.A. for three terms and has been a charter member of the Institute since 1921. He has served on various committees of the Institute, was the first chairman of the National Exhibits Committee, and is currently Regional Director of the Central States District. He was instrumental in organizing the Kansas Builders Forum, an organization comprising architects, contractors, and suppliers of building materials. This group meets annually to discuss problems of mutual interest to the entire building industry.

In 1945 he succeeded in organizing the Wichita Association of Architects and served as its first president. The Wichita Association includes Institute members, draftsmen, and craftsmen interested in the various building trades and related arts. Mr. Schmidt has been very active and in a large measure is responsible for obtaining an architects' registration law in Kansas. For several years he was chairman of the Chapter's Committee on Registration and at the last session of the Kansas Legislature, after a thirty-year struggle, Mr. Schmidt and the committee were finally successful in obtaining an architects' registration law in his state.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

He has often been a guest speaker at dinner meetings of civic groups; for three years was chairman of the Wichita City Beautification Committee; and is currently chairman of the Wichita Building Industries Committee. For more than two decades he has been active in Boy Scouts work and was president of the Wichita Council for two terms. In recognition of his outstanding work with the Boy Scouts project, he was awarded the Silver Beaver.

For the past fifteen years Mr. Schmidt has worked cooperatively with the juvenile courts in giving council and guidance to delinquent boys. SCHMIDT, LORENTZ, F.A.I.A., Wichita, Kansas

Lorentz Schmidt has been advanced to Fellowship for service to the Institute. Despite a serious physical handicap, Schmidt worked his way through school and college and became an outstanding citizen of his community. He led an effort to raise architectural standards in Kansas which culminated last year when an architectural registration law passed the legislature after a thirty year struggle. He was largely instrumental in organizing what ultimately became the Kansas Chapter of the A.I.A. and is currently Regional Director of the Institute's Contral States District. Through his high ethical and professional standards, his lifelong interest in the welfare of students and young people, and his coaseless activity in municipal and state affairs, Schmidt has been an inspiration to the young practitioner and to those with whom he has been associated.

He was born in Clyde, Kansas in 1884 where he went to high school. He attended Kansas State College in Emporia for two years, and the University of Illinois for five, receiving the degree of B.S. Architecture in 1913. He is a member of the firm of Lorentz Schmidt, McVay and Peddie, 1832 Fest Second Street, Wichita.

In 1918, shortly after establishing practice in Wichita, Schmidt was one of the founders of the Kansas Society of Architects, which in 1921 became the Kansas Chapter of the A.I.A. He was president of the society for two years, and of the Kansas Chapter for three and chairman of the Chapter's Committee on Registration. He has served on various committees of the Institute, was first chairman of the National Exhibits Committee, and was made regional director of the Central States district in 1948. He helped organize the Kansas Builders Forum comprised of architects, contractors and suppliers of building materials, who meet annually to discuss problems of mutual interest.

He organized the Wichita Association of Architects in 1945 and served as its first president. The Association includes Institute members, draftsmen, and craftsmen interested in the various building trades and related arts.



Lorentz Schmidt, Architect, Dies

THE WARREST WARRANT TO SERVICE AND ADDRESS OF THE PARTY O

At 67 Had Planned Many Local Buildings

Lorentz Schmidt, widely known Wichita architect who designed many of this city's largest buildings, died at his home, 3619 Elmwood, Tuesday afternoon, of can-cer. He was 67 years old. A resident of Wichita since 1915,

Mr. Schmidt planned many buildings which have become city land-marks. These include the Allis

hotel, Brown building, Central Christian church, East high school, Fabrique grade school, Hillcrest apartments, W. H. Isely grade school and St. James Episcopal church.

Mr. Schmidt specialized in schools, churches, hospitals and commercial buildings. Outside Wichita, he planned schools at Iola, Junction City, McPherson and Newton. Under construction at the present time is the Great Bend high school, new Blessed Sacrament church, St. Mary's hospital at Enid, Okla, and the Wichita air force

Active in civic work, he was a director of the Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the building industries committee of that organization. He was the first president of the Wichita Society of Architects and Associates.

Mr. Schmidt was the only prac-Mr. Schmidt was the only practicing architect in Kansas ever elected to a fellowship in the American Institute of Architects. He received this honor in May, 1951 for "outstanding professional achievement in design, in public service and in service to the pro-fession."

Active in Profession

A member of the Lorentz Schmidt

McVay and Peddie firm, Mr. Schmidt led an effort to raise architectural standards in Kansas which culminated in the 1950 legislature's passage of an architectural registration law.

He organized the Wichita Association of Architects in 1945 and served as its first president. He helped organize the Kansas Builders forum and served three times as president of that organization. He recently completed a three-year directorship of the central states district of the American Institute of Architects.

Mr. Schmidt was a member of St. James Episcopal church since its beginning as a new parish in

Wichita and is a past member of the vestry of the church. He established annual scholar-ships at Kansas State and Kansas university, served with the Wichita planning commission and was active in Red Cross, Salvation Army, Community Chest and Boy Scout work. He had received the Beaver award in scouting.

Planned War Housing
During World war II Mr.
Schmidt's office did the architec-Schmidt's office did the architectural work for war housing projects at Great Bend, Independence, Junction City, Liberal, Pratt and Victoria, Kan., in addition to Hillton Manor and Planeview in Wichita.

Born in Ciyde, Kan., April 25, 1884, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernberdt, Schmidt, who came to Amer-

hardt Schmidt who came to America from Denmark, Mr. Schmidt attended high school at Clyde and then worked his way through Kansas State college at Emporia and the University of Illinois. He re-ceived the degree of B.S., archi-tecture, in 1913 from the University of Illinois.

After college Mr. Schmidt worked in Chicago for two years before coming to Wichita. He married the former Gladys E. Magill on May 6, 1919, in Wichita. Mr. Schmidt's wife survives him.

In addition, he is survived by two children, Mrs./ Howard F. Harris, children, Mrs. Howard F. Harris, 5224 Plaza, and Lerentz Schmidt, Jr.; four grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Dora Hunt, Riverside, Calif., Mrs. C. P. Christian, and Mrs. George Smith, both of Clyde; four brothers, Chris Schmidt, of Clyde, Louis Schmidt, Glasco, Carl Schmidt, Hill City, Kan, and Enoch Schmidt, Morganville, Kan.
