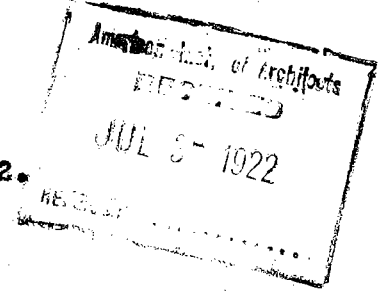

My dear Mr. Schubert:-

It becomes my duty as Secretary to advise you formally concerning the action of the Board of Directors with regard to charges of unprofessional conduct, arising from participation by you in an unauthorized competition.

The case is that of the Philadelphia Chapter vs Constantine Schubert. The findings of the Judiciary Committee were presented at the meeting of the Board of Directors in Chicago on June 6, at which time you were also given opportunity to appear in defense, either personally or by means of a written communication.

Your letter of defense, of May 18, was read in full.

After consideration of this letter, and of the findings of the Judiciary Committee, the Board took the following action:

Resolved, that the report of the Judiciary Committee be received, and that the recommendation of the Judiciary Committee that Mr. Schubert be suspended for six months be adopted.

The period of suspension began with June 6, 1922, and the Membership of the Institute will be notified in due course to that effect, as provided in Rule 7 of the Disciplinary Rules.

Dear Mr. Schubert:-

It was with regret that the Treasurer had to report to the Officers and Directors of the Institute at their last meeting a large amount still in default covering payment of dues for the current year.

The Directors discussed the matter seriously as the money is needed to meet the balance of our obligations for the year and moreover it seemed to them not quite fair that members who have paid their dues are not only meeting their own obligations, but assisting to pay the cash expense necessary to supply the Journal, etc., to those members who have not paid their dues. The Directors passed the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that those members delinquent for more than one year on January 1, 1924, be given until February 1, 1924, to make payment in whole or to reach some agreement with the Treasurer as to future payment. Otherwise the Institute membership of each delinquent coming under this resolution shall be terminated on March 1, 1924, upon notice to him from the Secretary to that effect.

I am sending you this as an appeal to make a remittance to the Treasurer of \$40.00, including the dues for 1923 which, as you know, were payable eleven months ago.

I trust that you will write me promptly and also frankly if for any reason you cannot pay all or any part of the amount at the present moment.

Hoping that you will do your part to help the Treasurer make a better report at the next meeting of the Board of Directors, I remain,

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My dear Mr. Waide:-

I am replying to your letter of recent date relative to the payment of delinquent Institute dues.

This is a reminder of a very disagreeable incident - perhaps you will recall the action of your Board of Directors in a case of alleged unprofessional conduct in June 1922. This incident gave me much concern at the time.

I must confess to a sense of apathy, since that time, toward my membership, and also a careless indifference to my obligation induced by the neutral attitude of the Board and the impression conveyed by its action that a member's reputation could be assailed by newspaper rumor and heresay statements.

The curt endorsement of the "findings" after my appeal to your Board from the unusual, appetent, and unjust "findings" and on the question of professional and ethical policy submitted to it received but a terse confirmation sustaining the recommendation of a pseudonymous (judiciary) committee.

Your letter has dispelled my apathy and as it required a reply these lines are expressive of how keenly I felt on the subject at the time. While this does not extenuate my remissness in the payment of my dues I am not impressed by a membership hearded by supine shepards.
