DIGEST OF THE CAREER AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF

ZEB V. LACKEY, AIA - VALDOSTA, GEORGIA

Zeb Lackey's public service began in 1962 with appointment to the State Examining Board. He was elected President in 1966 and 1967 and his effectiveness prompted reappointment in 1969 and retention as one of its most respected members until 1977. He has served as Acting Board President five of the past six years, and has been an unusually dedicated and effective representative of the Georgia Board at both the State and National levels.

As an officer of AIA Chapter and State Components and as a long term member of the Examining Board, he participated effectively in defeating recurring political cries for stock plans and the establishment of an architectural department as a body of State government. He served as a member of the Joint Committee, State Architects' Board and Engineers' Board, to establish a "Joint Resolution" of guideline principles of practice for the design professions in Georgia.

Zeb Lackey combined these public services with active participation in the affairs of The National Council of Architectural Registration Boards. He served as a member of The Southern Conference NCARB Committee on Incorporation (1965-67), Committee on Examination (1965-66), Committee on Education (1966-67) and the NCARB Committee on State Statutes (1966-67). He was Chairman of the Arrangements Committee for the NCARB National Convention in 1973, and for the last three years, he has been a member of the NCARB Procedures and Documents Committee and is currently serving as Chairman. He served as a Director of the Southern Conference NCARB (1970-72 and 1974), as Secretary in 1973, as Vice-Chairman in 1974 and was elected Chairman for the year 1975.

His dedication was recognized by his AIA Chapter which elected him 1970 Vice President and 1971 President. Three years as a Director of the Georgia Association AIA led to his election as 1973 Vice President and then 1974 President of the State AIA organization. Service as Director of the South Atlantic Regional Council for four years followed service on the Institute's Committee on Licensing, as a Corresponding Member in 1967 and 1968 and as a Contributing Member in 1969. His proven effectiveness in Legislative activity and AIA affairs led to his selection as Chairman of the Institute's Committee on State Laws for the year 1975.

Zeb Lackey's ability and valued experience with AIA, NCARB and governmental matters made him the outstanding choice to chair the 1973 Georgia Association AIA Committee on Governmental Relations. As Chairman, he spearheaded the efforts to draft sweeping revisions to the "Law Governing the Practice of Architecture in Georgia" which the State Legislature enthusiastically passed in 1974. It is especially significant that the approved Georgia Senate Bill (SB-646) may well serve as a guide for the Institute and the NCARB Model Law.

2. Specific Achievements of nominee which have contributed notably to the advancement of the profession in field of service to the profession:

Through activity in the many committee assignments and office positions held at the Chapter and State levels of the AIA, as well as the committee assignments and office positions held in the SC/NCARB and the NCARB, Zeb Lackey has demonstrated a willingness, dedication and capability for leadership role. His ability and valued experience with NCARB and governmental matters made him the outstanding choice of the Georgia Association AIA to serve as Chairman of its Governmental Relations Committee in 1973.

In this position, Zeb Lackey not only accepted the challenge to virtually rewrite the "Law Governing the Practice of Architecture in Georgia", he also set about it in an intense and unselfish manner, giving generously of his time and talent by personally drafting and redrafting a major portion of the proposed revised Law.

He sought a review by NCARB Counsel of the outmoded Georgia Law, and because of Zeb Lackey's efforts, NCARB provided funding for its Counsel to review the Statutes and to prepare suggested guidelines for Statute Revisions. Because of his public service on the State Architects' Board, he was successful in obtaining advice and assistance of the Attorney General's office in legal matters peculiar to the State of Georgia.

The nominee initiated conferences with members of the allied professions to apprise them and to insure their support; he met with Legislators and Legislative Sub-Committees to gain their advice, support and approval; and he met face to face with opposition parties in efforts to convert their thinking and gain support--often rewriting and redrafting in the give-and-take process by which such is accomplished.

As 1974 President of the Georgia Association AIA, Lackey continued his leadership role in the Law revision effort, the end result of which was an overwhelming approval by the State Legislature in 1974, with all opposition having been appropriately decreased.

Largely as a result of Zeb Lackey's leadership and personal effort, the State of Georgia now has a "Law Governing the Practice of Architecture" that may well serve as a guide for the Model Law that the NCARB and the Institute have been laboring to achieve.

In recognition of his accomplishments and Service to the Profession, the Georgia Association bestowed upon him in September 1974 the GAAIA Bronze Medal Award.

2. Specific achievements of nominee which have contributed notably to the advancement of the profession in field of service to the profession.

Long before it became the viable organization that it is today, Zeb Lackey recognized the potential value to the profession of NCARB, and since that time, he has worked untiringly to assist in its development and attainment of its goals.

He was the representative of the State of Georgia at the initial meeting in 1964 to establish the Southern Conference NCARB, and served on the Committee on Incorporation that prepared its Charter. Since that time, he has been one of SC/NCARB's most active members, having served also on its Committee on Examination, its Committee on Education, three years as a Director, one year as Vice-Chairman and one year as Secretary.

In June of this year, the nominee's dedication to NCARB was recognized by the ten states and two possessions of the Southern Conference jurisdiction, by their election of him to serve as Chairman of the Southern Conference NCARB for the term June '75 - June '76.

Zeb Lackey's in depth knowledge of NCARB methods and policies and his willingness to participate effectively in their constant improvement resulted in his 1973 appointment to the National NCARB Committee on Procedures and Documents. His valued contributions during the term June '73 - June '74. resulted in his re-appointment for the term June '74 - June '75 and his selection as Chairman of this important four-man committee for the term June '75 - June '76.

As a long time member of the Georgia State Board for Examination, Qualification and Registration of Architects, Zeb Lackey has been the primary motivating force responsible for the change of Board attitude to a more sympathetic understanding of the problems of the practicing profession. He has worked earnestly and diligently for the successful establishment of the rapport that now exists between the State Architects' Board and the State AIA organization.

Consistently for years, he has been the representative (more often than not, the lone representative) of the State of Georgia at not only the Regional level, but also the National level of NCARB in inter-action among the various State Boards. By so doing, he has been the instrument responsible for the recognition, by other state and national organizations, of the progressive leadership of the Georgia Board in its committed field of endeavor.

In response to the joint plea of the Georgia Association AIA and the CEC of Georgia, Zeb Lackey spearheaded the efforts of the two Registration Boards to establish rules of conduct for Architects and Engineers in the State of Georgia.

The nominee was the author (with only minor committee modifications) of the "Joint Resolution", executed in March 1973 by the State Architects' Board and the State Engineers' Board, to establish guideline principles of practice for the two professions.

The "Joint Resolution" has served to moderate practice infringements of the two professions, and has acted as a catalyst in melding respect and appreciation of the Boards, each for the other, in specific duties and responsibilities to the professionals under each jurisdiction.

Gentlemen:

My association with Zeb Vance Lackey, AIA, dates back more than ten years: our first efforts together were when he, as a Registration Board member, and I, as the State AIA representative, attempted to update the Georgia Architectural Registration Law. Although unsuccessful at the time, his dedication to a total revision was heightened to almost evangelical proportions. It was my privilege as a Regional Director to nominate Zeb Lackey for membership on the Institute's Committee on Licensing; he served on that committee from 1966 through 1969 and took its work most seriously as he did the work of several NCARB committees on which he served. Although then-Governor Lester Maddox declined in 1967 to appoint Zeb Lackey for a second term on the Registration Board because of his political convictions which were contrary to the Governor's, when Lackey's replacement abruptly resigned after serving only two years, the Governor did not hesitate to reappoint him to the Board in 1969 and he continues to serve in that capacity.

In 1973 he made a concerted effort again to have the Law revised: this time he organized a very thorough evaluation team which even included NCARB's attorney from Boston, Massachusetts: Carl Sapers. With consummate skill he shepherded a very complete revision of the Law through both houses of the legislature - patiently answering questions and masterfully parrying challenges - and the result is a law which is considered by many to be very nearly a model one. Zeb Lackey continues his dedicated service to the profession and the public in his devotion to the duties of the Registration Board and to the several committees of NCARB to which he has been appointed.



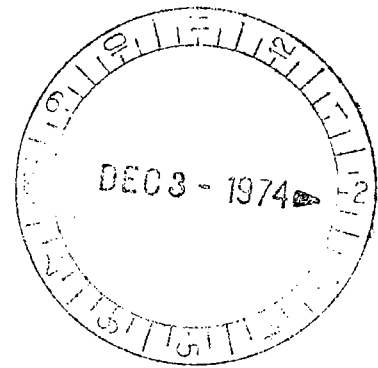

Dear Mr. Smith and members of the Jury of Fellows:

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to write in behalf of Zeb V. Lackey's nomination for advancement to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.

Zeb Lackey's achievements and his service to the profession deserve the respect and commendation of his fellow practitioners. During the last five years, Zeb Lackey and I have been closely associated in the many facets of local, state and regional AIA endeavors. It was during my tenure as President of the Georgia Association, AIA in 1973 that Zeb Lackey served as President Elect of the GAAIA and chaired the Governmental Relations Committee. This Committee was charged with maintaining effective relations with the State Legislature and reviewing the many pieces of legislation concerning the profession and physical environment coming before that body. In addition, The Law Governing the Practice of Architecture in Georgia had been under study since 1970 with very limited progress made towards effective revisions to the law. So it became a specific charge to the Committee to move forward in this area.

Mr. Lackey's many years of experience on the State Board for Registration and Qualification of Architects in Georgia provided him with the necessary insight to the problems, restrictions, and general archaic composition of the Georgia Law. So in December of 1972, the strategy was formulated to rewrite the law incorporating the NCARB's guideline recommendations, which were prepared by Carl Sapers, Legal Counsel to NCARB.

Concurrent with the drafting of the proposed bill, steps were taken to acquire a sponsor in the Legislature and Senator James Tysinger, an engineer from Atlanta offered his assistance.

After many months of revising and refining the draft on the part of Mr. Lackey, Carl Sapers, Senator Tysinger, and the Committee, the proposed revisions were circulated to the State's six component AIA chapters and also to other members of the design profession for review and comments. Following this review, appropriate revisions were made and a final draft prepared.

We are all aware of the tedious process involved in the passage of legislation, and our bill did not prove to be an exception. Senator Tysinger referred to the bill as a "Housekeeping Bill", but the mechanics remained the same, and

following the bill's introduction in the Senate, it was referred to Committee and subsequent hearings were held.

Although Mr. Lackey and his Committee had attempted to keep all parties informed, certain factions of the engineering profession voiced concern as to the wording of certain sections which they felt were infringing on their profession. Zeb Lackey, through careful negotiating and compromise with these individuals prevented what might have turned out to be a less than meaningful piece of legislation. Resolution of these questions provided clear passage early in 1974 of the Law Governing the Practice of Architecture in Georgia where it received almost unanimous approval in both the House and Senate.

The above brief history of how the 1974 Georgia Law came about, reflects a momentous amount of time, energy and dedication on the part of Zeb Lackey. The law's significance goes beyond the State of Georgia as it will serve as a model for other states needing similar revision to their respective laws.

The success of Zeb Lackey's efforts in regard to Governmental relations were further expanded during his Presidency of the GAAIA this year with the refinement of the Sub-Committee Legislative Action Group which has plans to sponsor meaningful legislation in addition to its responsibilities of reviewing proposed bills.

In September of this year, at the South Atlantic Regional Convention AIA, I had the privilege of presenting to Zeb Lackey the Georgia Association AIA Bronze Medal for his efforts and accomplishments on behalf of the profession. His leadership and participation in the component, State, and Regional levels of the AIA; his service as a member of the Board for Registration and Qualification of Architects in Georgia; his active involvement in the affairs of NCARB; all reflect a dedication and personal commitment to further the goals of the American Institute of Architects.

I solicit your support in the advancement of Zeb V. Lackey to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.



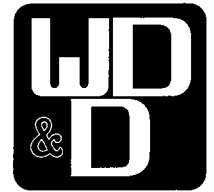

Per your November 7th request I am submitting the following information in behalf of the subject nominee.

Acquaintance began in 1965 when the nominee was appointed to the State Architectural Examining Board.

During my tenure as president of the Georgia State Association in 1965 (and as director in '66) I was impressed by the nominee's activity, via AIA Committee, to successfully overcome political efforts to establish a "Stock Plans" policy for all State financed buildings. This was a biennial theme song until 1971 when a State Building Administrative Board was established with good results.

In 1972 while chairman of a State AIA Committee reviewing services and practices among the design professions, I conferred with the nominee on several occasions regarding the attached draft of a State AIA/CEC joint resolution which had been adopted in final form earlier in that year. The nominee, as Acting President of the State Board of Examination for Architects, authored the requested "Joint Statement of Policy", cleared with the Attorney General and obtained acceptance of the Engineers' Examining Board.

The Joint Statement, issued the following Spring, provides both Boards with a set of guidelines to enforce... "Rules of Conduct" for Architects and Engineers registered in Georgia, to fix responsibility for design and to deter fraudulent or unethical "plan stamping". I consider this to be a significant accomplishment to protect the public.

The nominee's decade of public service on the Examining Board, the equivalent term of his service to NCARB and concurrent service to the profession at Chapter, State and National levels are, to me, clear endorsements of dedication.

A RESOLUTION

BY THE GEORGIA ASSOCIATION OF THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTS
AND THE CONSULTING ENGINEERS COUNCIL OF GEORGIA JOINTLY

WHEREAS these two organizations affirm and understand that the learned professions of Architecture and Engineering are legally recognized in the State of Georgia to promote the public welfare and safeguard life, health and property; and

WHEREAS, it is a matter of public interest that the preparation of Plans and Specifications and the furnishing of allied services related to projects containing buildings and structures, other than those currently exempted by law, be accomplished by these professionals with such fidelity to their clients and to the public as to warrant the utmost confidence; and

WHEREAS, that in order to assure the public trust these professionals must restrict themselves and be restricted to providing services in only those phases of a project in which they are demonstrably competent by reason of their education and experience; now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Georgia Association of the American Institute of Architects and the Consulting Engineers Council of Georgia do hereby recommend and respectfully request that the Georgia State Boards of Registration for Architects and Engineers prepare and issue a Joint Statement of Policy to establish "Rules of Conduct for Architects and Engineers licensed in the State of Georgia", which Statement shall include guideline criteria for enforcement thereof; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that such Statement be so devised as to parallel similar Resolutions and Implementation Policies issued jointly by the Architecture and Engineering Boards of Registration in Florida, Mississippi and Arkansas during 1971; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said Joint Statement of Policy be distributed in printed form to: All architects and engineers registered in Georgia; all State Departments and Authorities; all County Commissioners and Building Officials; all Mayors, City Councils or Boards of Aldermen and City Building Officials.


