In this capacity he has served the public, the profession and the city since 1946 and has given an abundance of his personal time in ironing out the thorny problems for which the Housing Appeal Board acts as a final governing body. His full understanding of the problems of the construction industry place him in an excellent position where variances to a specific code will allow a greater planning and design elasticity. His impartial attitude in judging the honest merits of each particular case presented to the Housing and Appeal Board is, I feel, one of the important reasons why John Landon should definitely be elevated to Fellowship in the Institute.
