

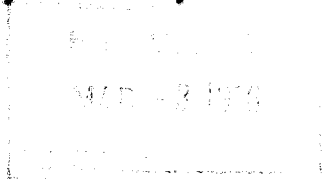

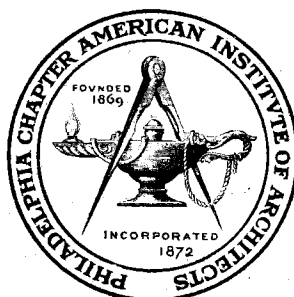

Dear Mr. Kemper:-

The Annuary for 1916 includes in the list of members of the Philadelphia Chapter, the name of Edward Langley as having been assigned to this Chapter by order of the Forty-ninth Convention. On March 1st, 1916, by direction of the Executive Committee of this Chapter, I wrote to Mr. Langley advising him that it would give the Philadelphia Chapter very great pleasure to greet him as one of its members and stated that in order that the formalities might be complied with, I was sending him a copy of application blank for membership; stating at the same time that if he would be good enough to merely sign and return same, it would be placed before the Membership Committee with an explanation of the circumstances and that his election to this Chapter would be treated merely as a formality. It was further stated that the Executive Committee had adopted a resolution waiving the payment of the Chapter initiation fee under the circumstances and that his dues as a member of the Chapter would be \$5.00 per year. A copy of this letter was forwarded to you on March 1st, similar letters having been sent to Charles Henry Muhlenberg of Reading, and Henry A. Macomb of Philadelphia, both of whom immediately took steps to affiliate with this Chapter. It is

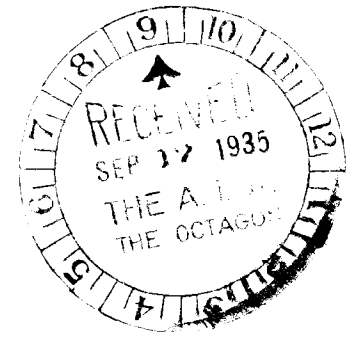
This is to inform you that the name of Mr. Edward Langley is to be taken off your subscription list.
