STANDARDS OF ARCHITECTURAL SERVICE

PREFACE

Planning, technical guidance, advice and counsel — rendered in verbal, written or graphic form — constitute the service of the architect. In order to protect the building public against incompetent or unscrupulous practitioners the law permits no one to practice architecture nor to use the name "architect" in North Carolina until he has fulfilled the qualifications fixed by the State Board of Architectural Examination and Registration.

The architect may associate professional engineers or other experts with himself but he must remain in control; one of his major duties being that of coordinating all design, structural and mechanical parts of buildings.

The North Carolina Chapter of the American Institute of Architects endeavors to maintain within the profession the highest standards of practice and conduct for the benefit of clients and the public generally. Therefore, the members of the Chapter adhere to the standards of professional practice established by the American Institute of Architects.

As the architect's compensation for service is derived solely from his client in fees, it is necessary that such fees be fixed at levels that will permit proper service. The schedule of minimum fees recommended by the North Carolina Chapter embodies charges which it considers reasonable and adequate under normal conditions to enable the architect to perform competent service.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

Mr. Lashmit was President of the North Carolina Chapter AIA in 1948. During his term of office he completely changed the type of chapter meetings and activities from informal catch as catch can procedures springing from the whim of the moment to organized, well thought out programs of committee work with regular reports to the executive committee and the membership. This has led to great progress and has, we believe, been instrumental in the development of the N. C. Chapter into one of the best in the Institute. By example, the effect of this program has been reflected in many of the other chapters in the South Atlantic Region.

Mr. Lashmit was also instrumental in the formation and development of the Architectural Foundation for the then newly organized School of Design at N. C. State College. This Foundation raises funds by subscriptions from architects and the building industry to supplement state appropriations. This has made possible the development of the school into one of the best in the nation, with very definite beneficial influence on the quality of design and architectural practice in this area.

As Chairman of the N. C. Chapter's Office Practice Committee since 1953, Mr. Lashmit has been very active. Two documents developed by him are submitted in the exhibits enclosed. One, entitled "Office Techniques" was developed to help our members conduct their offices in a more business like manner, with orderly forms suited to architectural practice in this state. This document, besides being used by older firms in the chapter, is presented to all new members and has proved very helpful to them in organizing their practice. The second, entitled "Standards of Architectural Service" has been continuously in use since 1945 and is, we believe, the best of its type in the Institute. Both of these documents were recognized by the Institute as "Document of the Month".

Mr. Lashmit has had three appointments to the Office Practice Committee of the Institute, the current appointment extending through 1962. He has had a significant part in the committee's review and development of aids to professional service, notably the 1958 edition of document No. J-330, The Standards of Architectural Practice, the new Owner-Architect Agreements and the establishment of a basis for Letters of Intent, the latter appearing in the June, 1961 edition of the AIA Journal.

At chapter level he has been mentor to younger practitioners in pointedly relating their problems to Institute policy in such matters as client requests for multiple interviews, pressure for advertisements from publication media, non-competitive fee situations, and similar problems that trouble the inexperienced practitioners.

He has carried the principles of the Institute into his community appointment as Chairman of his City's Committee on Codes and Ordinances, as architect member of the City's Board of Architectural Review for Historic Areas and as architectural advisor to the local organization which is spending \$3,000,000 in the restoration of the 18th century Moravian Village of Salem.

When the new architecture came along, Lashmit had the good judgment, intelligence, flexibility, and humility to draw into his office younger men also of competence. The newer buildings that are shown in this exhibition of his work have been done with the collaboration of some of the younger men working under his direction and quiding hand, and we believe that all of the work of his office, past and present, carries the advice, counsel, and personal criticism of Lashmit.

His office received a Chapter Honor Award four years ago with Paul Rudolph and Robert McLaughlin as jurors, and one of their schools an Honor Award two years ago with Louis Kahn, Arthur Q. Davis, and

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STANDARDS

Planning, technical guidance, advice and counsel—rendered in verbal, written or graphic form— constitute the service of the architect. In order to protect the building public against incompetent or unscrupulous practitioners the law permits no one to practice architecture nor to use the name "architect" in North Carolina until he has fulfilled the qualifications fixed by the State Board of Architectural Examination and Registration.

The architect may associate professional engineers or other experts with himself but he must remain in control; one of his major duties being that of coordinating all design, structural and mechanical parts of buildings.

The North Carolina Chapter of the American Institute of Architects endeavors to maintain within the profession the highest standards of practice and conduct for the benefit of clients and the public generally. Therefore, the members of the Chapter adhere to the standards of professional practice established by the American Institute of Architects.

OFFICE TECHNIQUES

A CLIENT IS ENTITLED TO THE BEST POSSIBLE HANDLING OF THE INTERESTS HE ENTRUSTS TO HIS ARCHITECT. IN THE CLIENT-ARCHITECT RÉLATIONSHIP THE ARCHITECT ASSUMES AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY AS DESIGNER, TECHNICAL EXPERT AND ADMINISTRATOR.
