Employment Record of David Christoph Lange, 103 Spruce St., Audubon, N. J.

June 1911, worked a few weeks for each of the following:

W.L. Stoddard, Archt. N.Y.C. as draftsman @ \$10. per wk.

Slead Iron Works, Jersey City " \$18. "

became employed by Brazer & Robb, N.Y.C., as draftsman @20. & \$25. per wk. until Sept. 1912 when I returned to the Univ. of Penna for my M.S. degree while also having a readership.

June 1913 worked some time for Paul P. Cret, Archt. and then went to Reading, Pa. to work for A.A. Ritcher, Archt. where I remained until May 1914 as a draftsman and delineator at about \$30. per wk. The work for Brazer and Robb and others up until this time dealt with churches courtthpusses, hotels, dwellings, public square layouts, etc.

May 1914 to Sept. I was the Archt. for a school in Audubon and also built some dwellings there.

Sept. 1914 to 15. I was instructor in Arch. and Asst. to the College Architect at Clemson College, S.Car. salary \$1200. for 9 mos. work and during this time one of my students won the Southern Intercollegiate Competition.

9/15 to 12/17 as Instructor and Asst. to College Archt. at Wash. State College, Salary \$1500. plus per year

12/17 to 5/19 employed by U.S. Navy Yard Bremerton, Wash. Classification helper to first class shipfitter at the prevailing wage. Was to some extent doing the work of a production man .

5/19 to 9/19 with F.F. Durang, Archt. Phila. salary about \$40. per wk. as draftsman and designer on churches, schools, hospitals, etc.

9/19 to 9/20 as Instructor and Asst. College Archt. at Texas A. & M. College salary about \$3000. for 9 mos. work.

6/20 to 9/20 with Ballinger & Perrot, Archts and Engineers, Phila. as draftsman on industrial work at about \$60. per wk.

9/20 to 9/21 with F.F. Durang, Archt. and with self as archt for school work at Audubon, N.J.



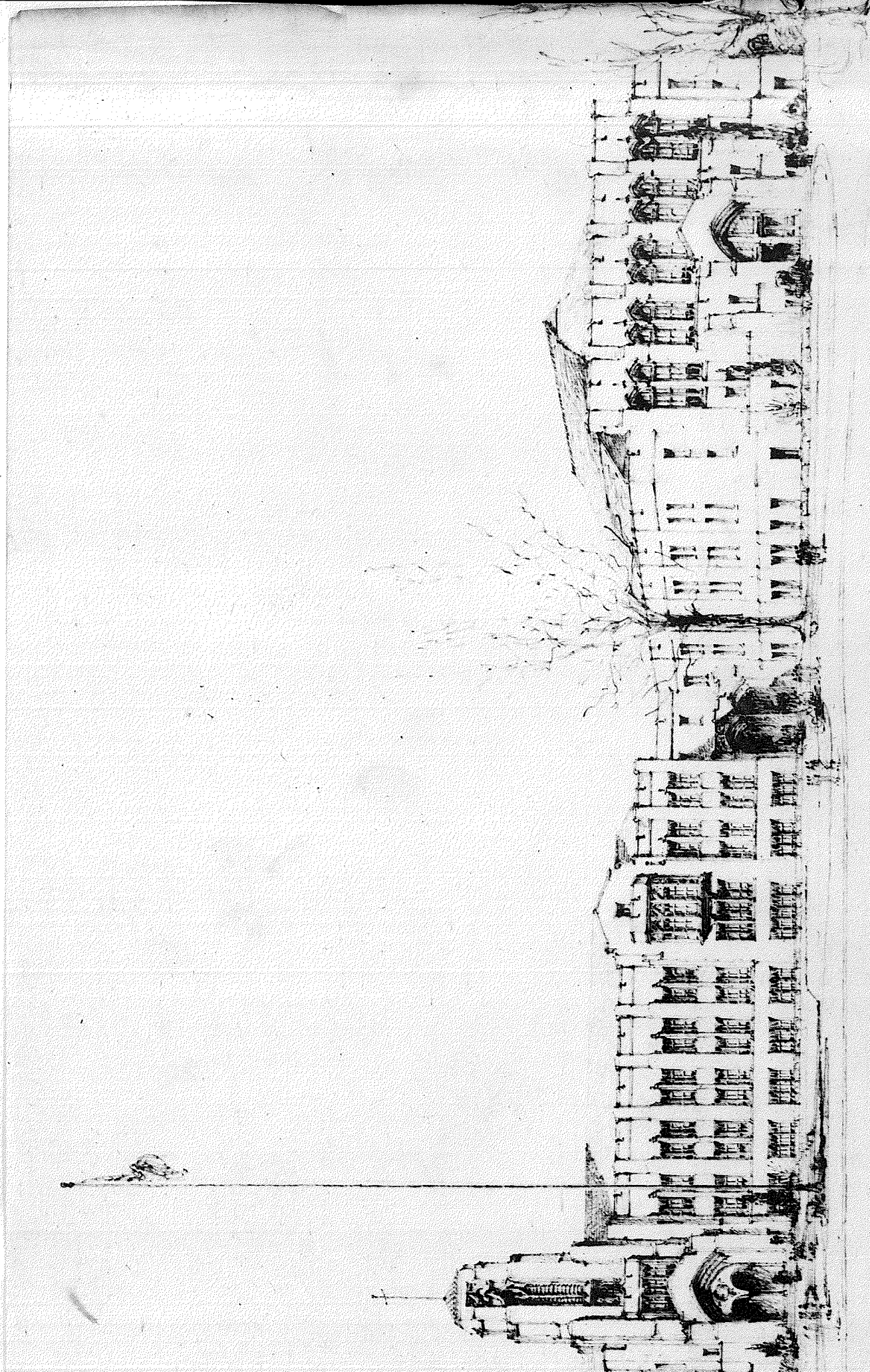

I am and have been since 1913-14 registered as a architect in New Jersey and have at various times been registered in other states. I was at one time a member of the A.I.A.

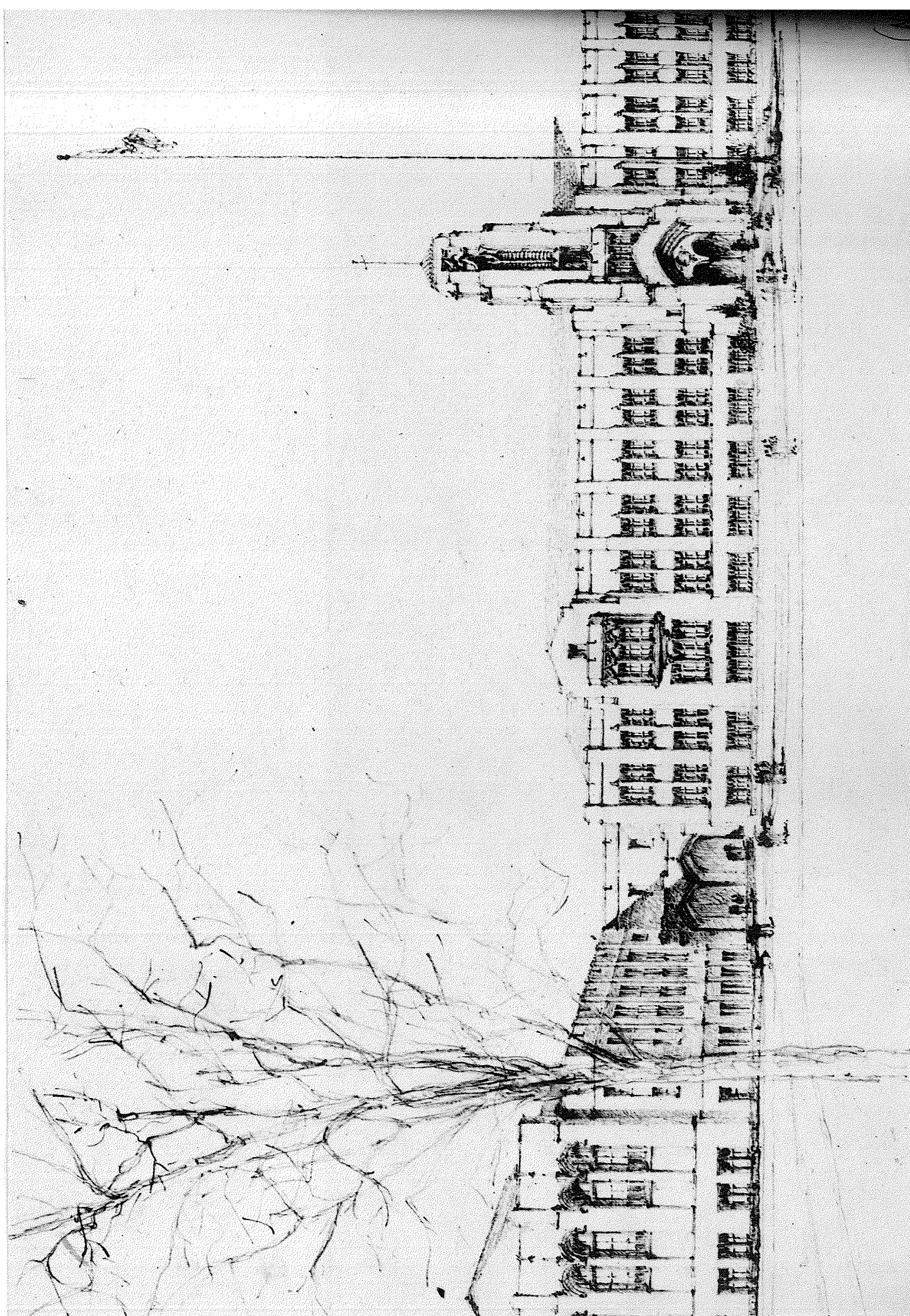




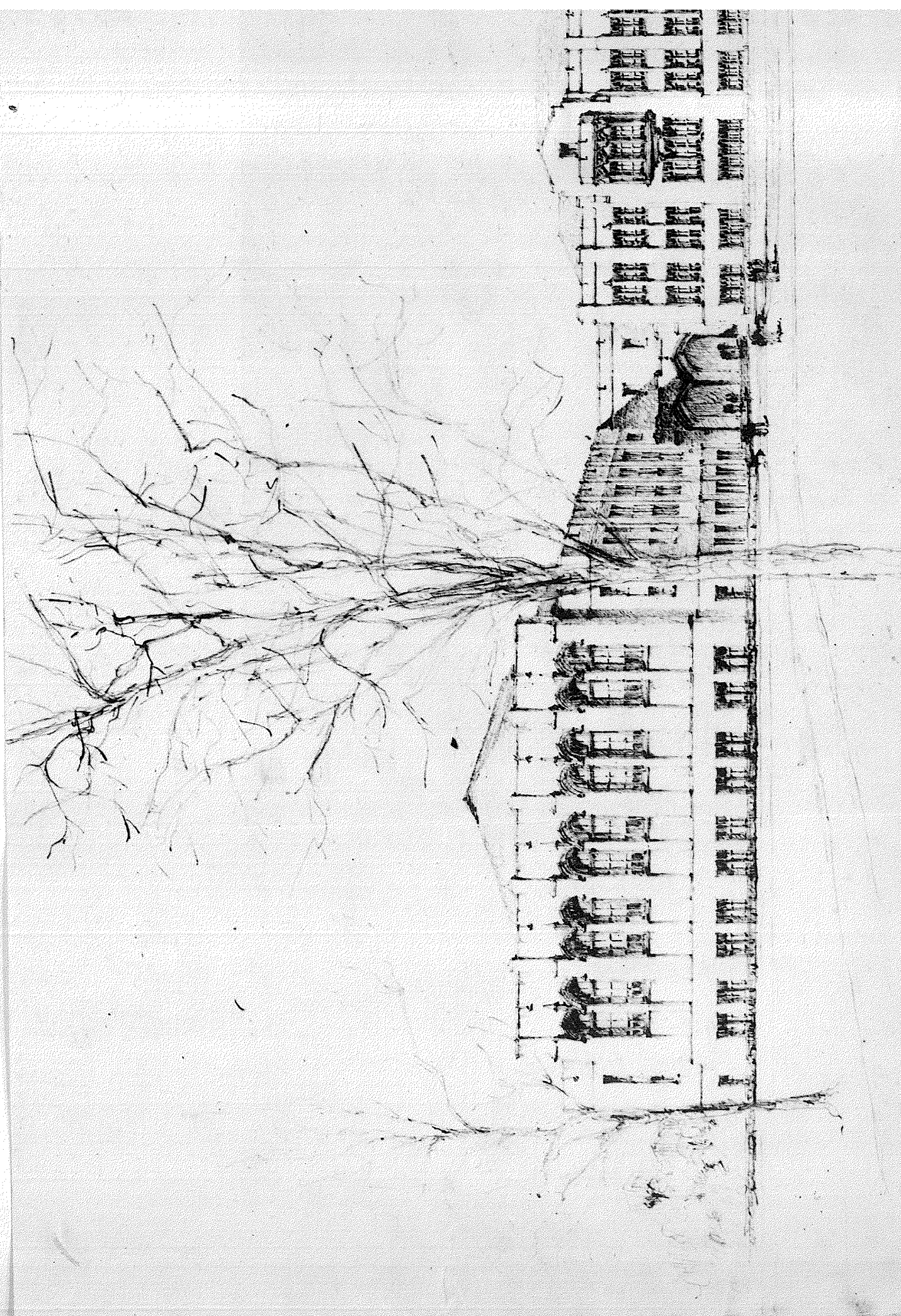

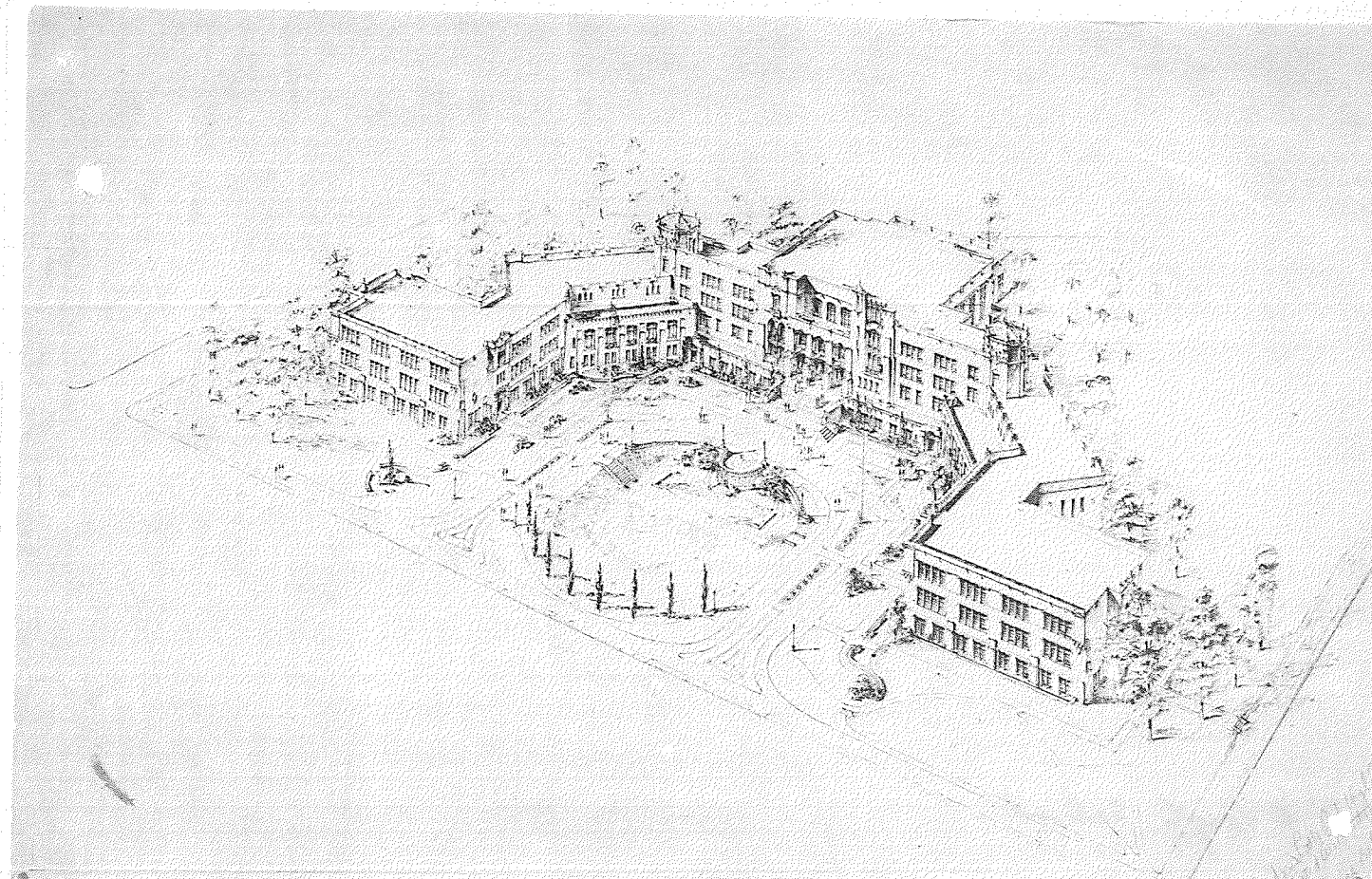


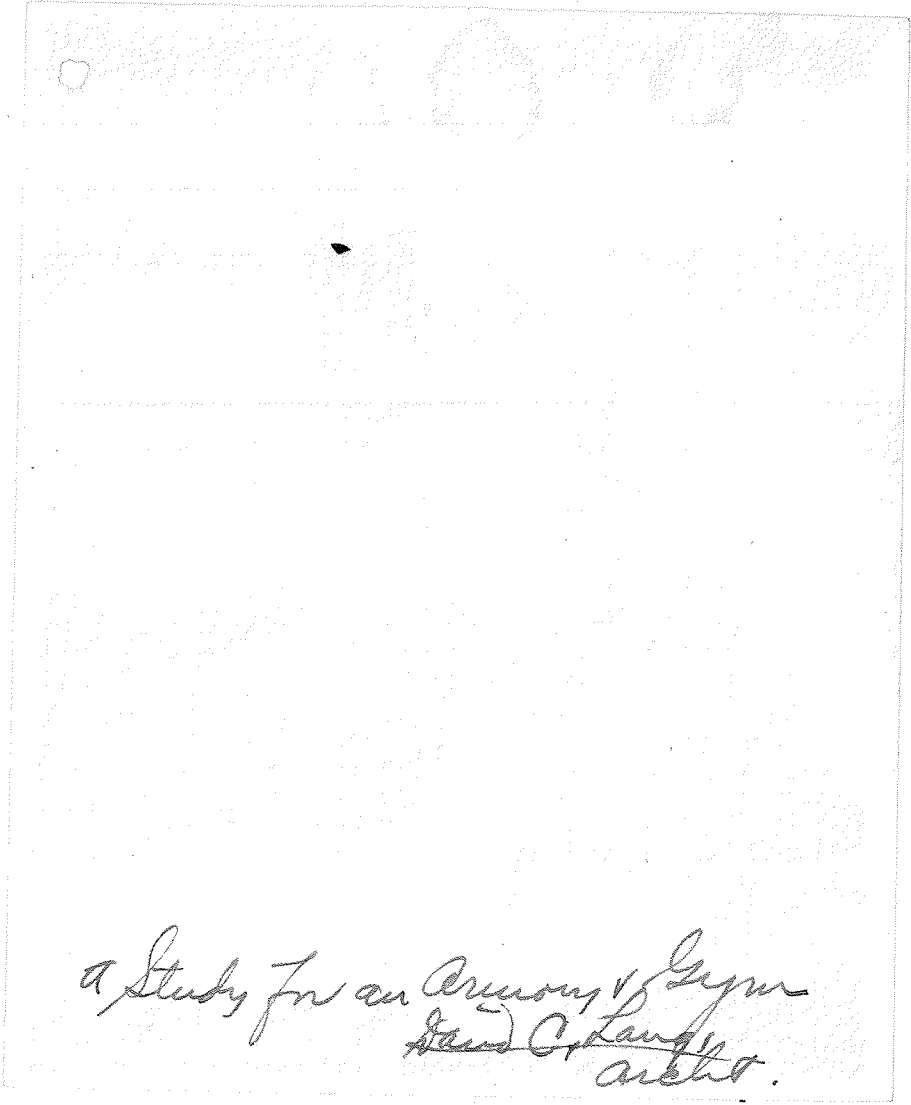




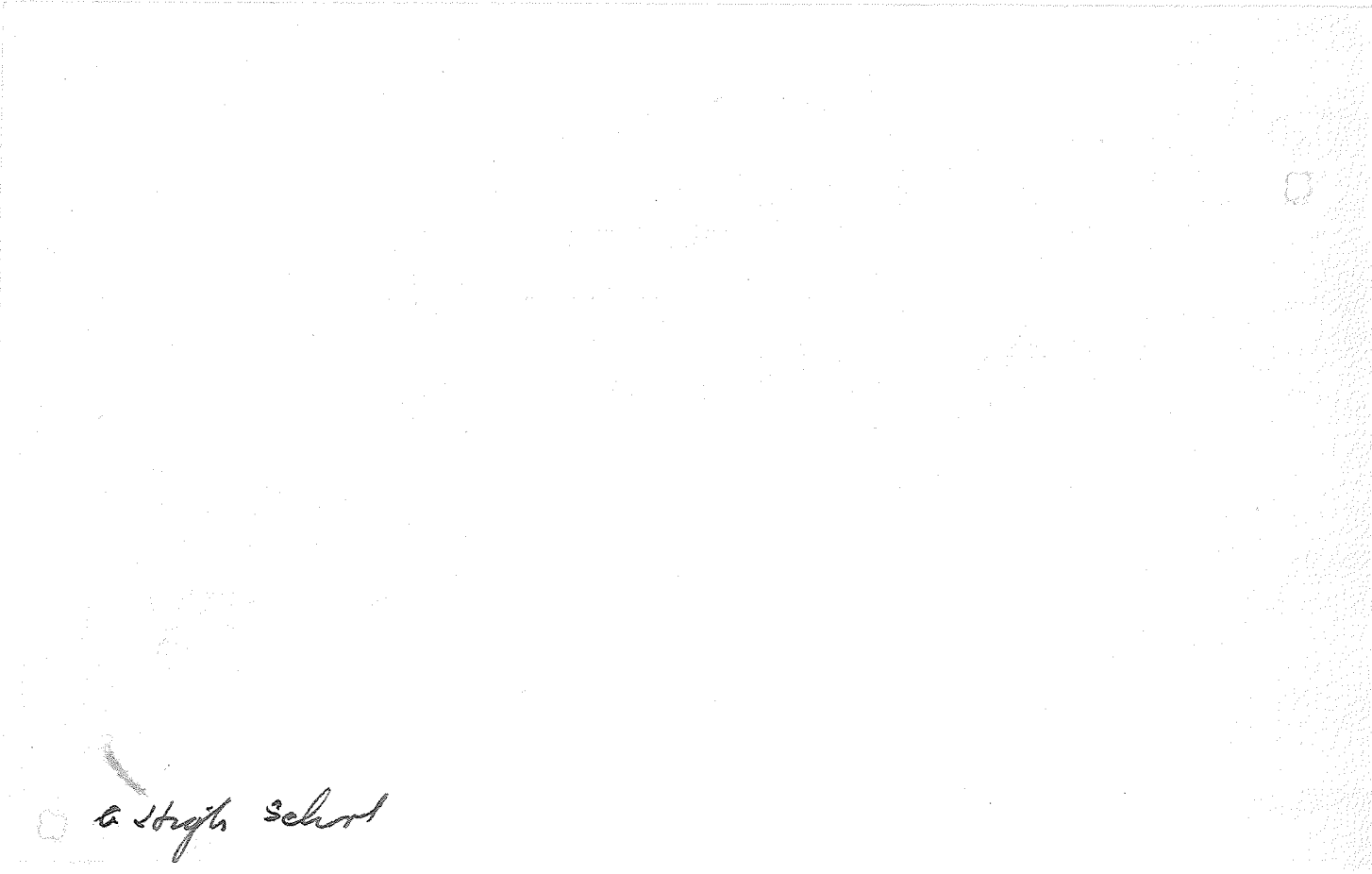






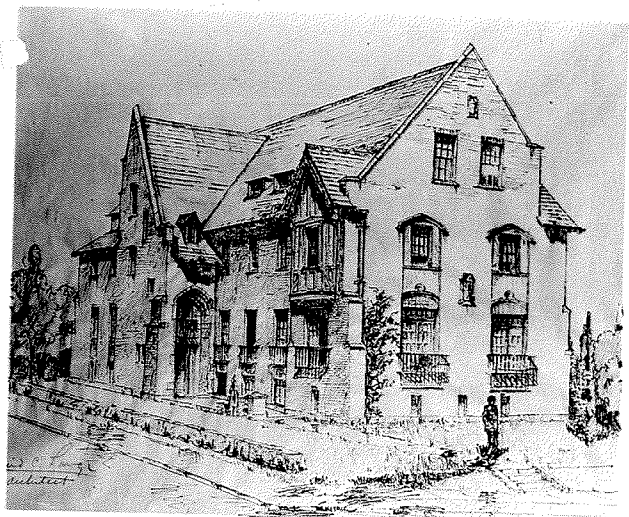
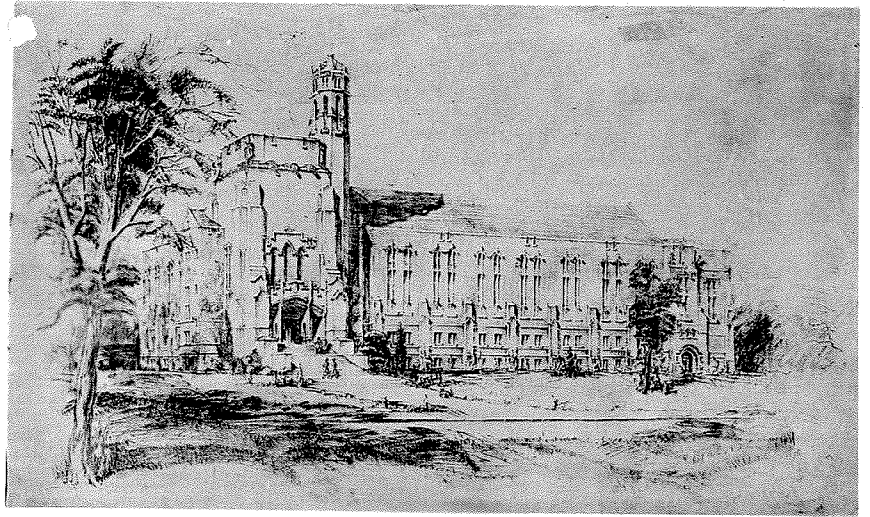


a Study for an Armenian Gym

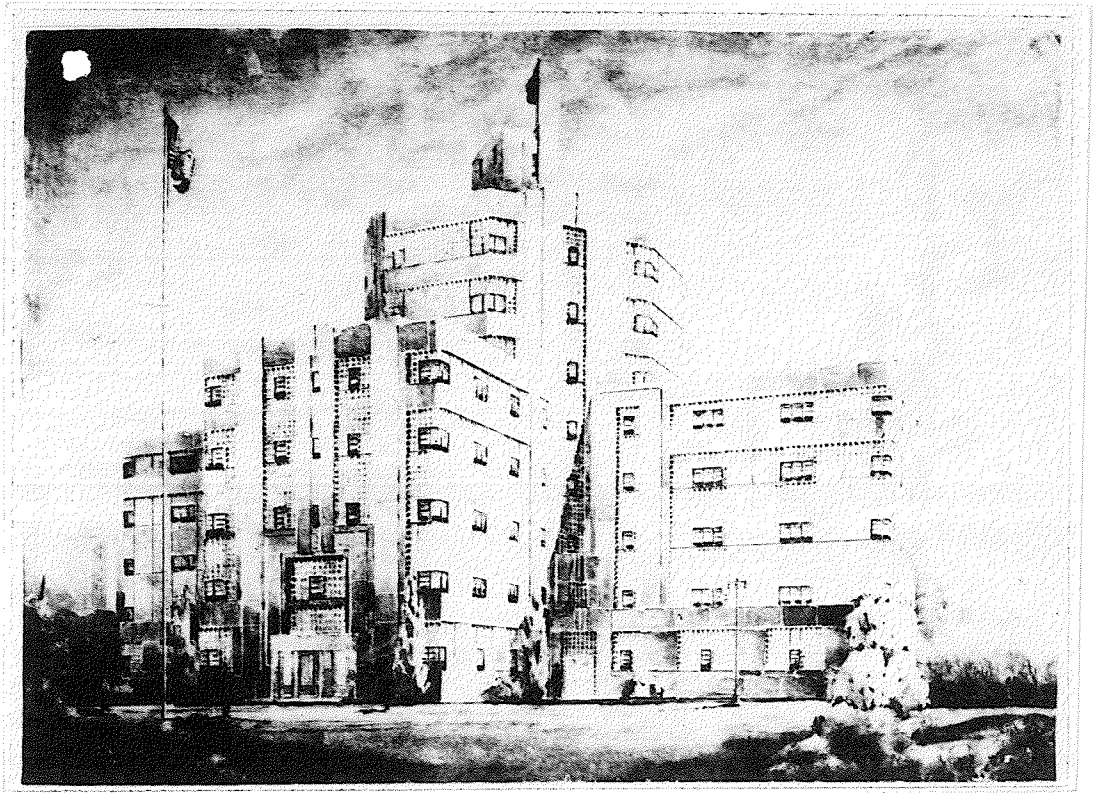

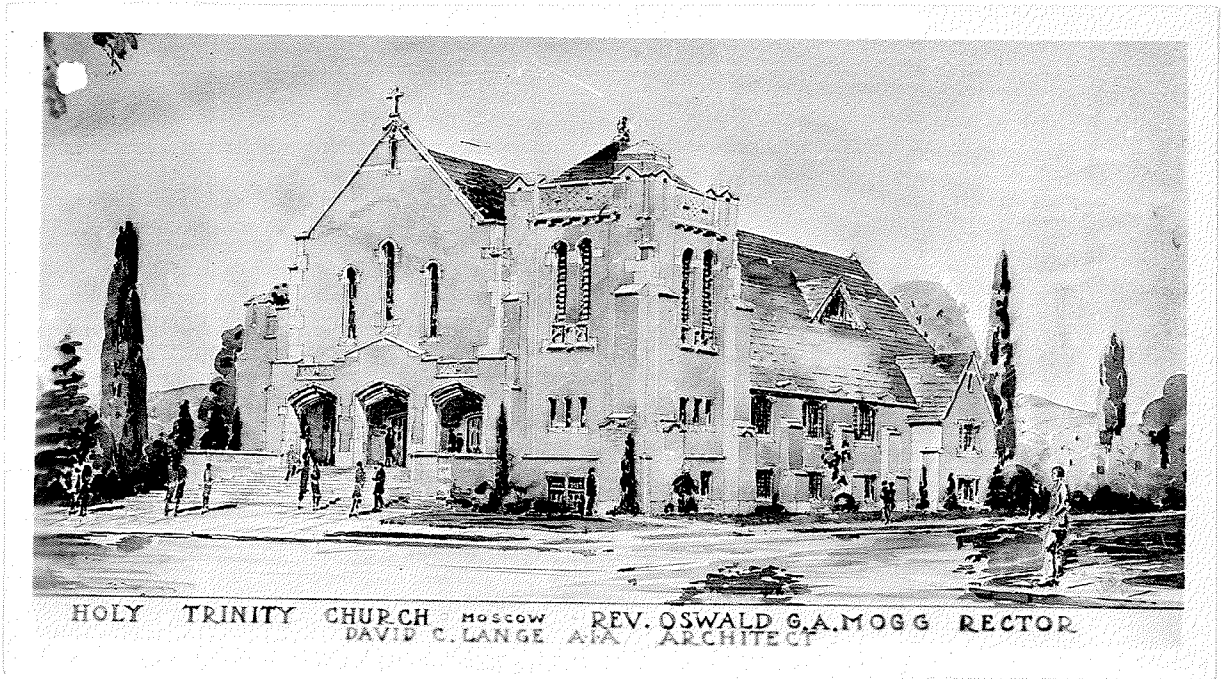
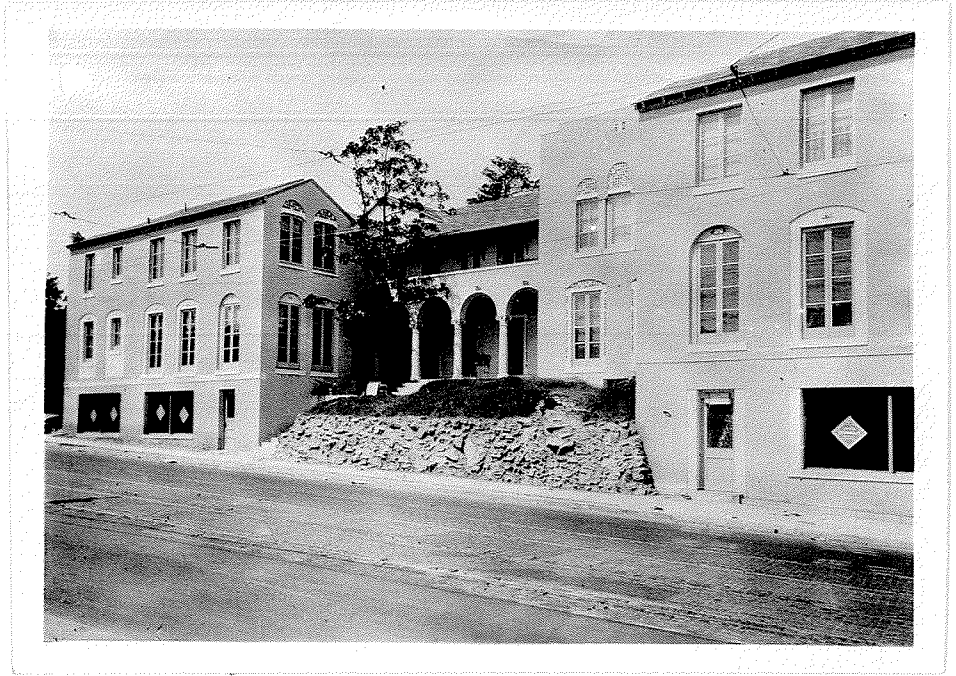






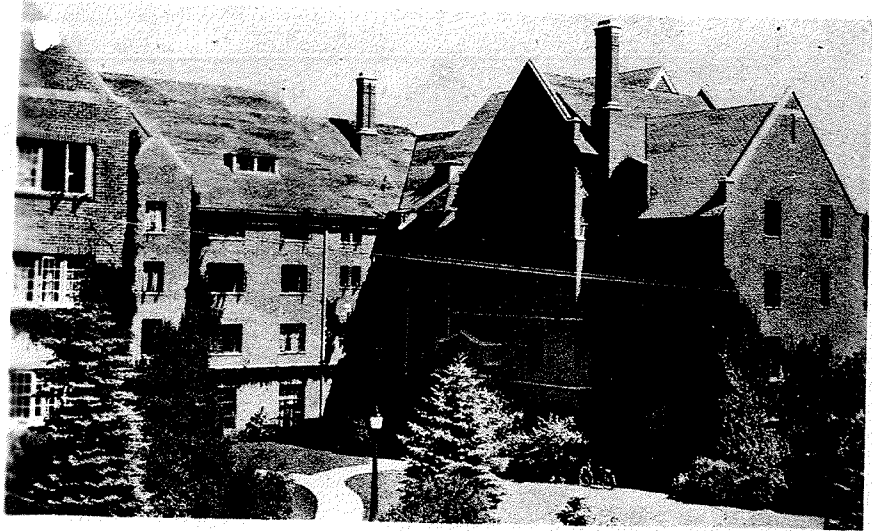
A Univ. Army & Navy under

Navy yard.

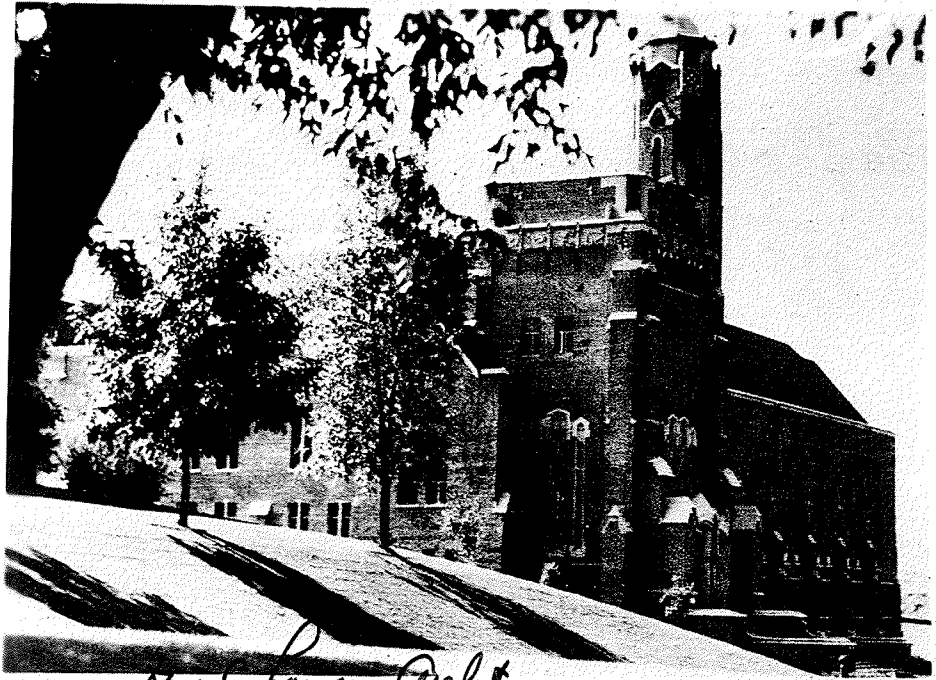
