He created public awareness of the work of the profession by inducing the Chapter to establish an annual House Tour opening Hawaii's best designed residences to the visit of thousands.

He broadened the horizon of Hawaii's architects and the public by persuading the Chapter to establish the Pan-Pacific Architectural Citation conferred annually upon an architect from some country in or bordering the Pacific. The winners come to Honolulu to receive the Citation, lecture to public audiences at the University of Hawaii and exhibit their work at the Honolulu Academy of Arts.

He established standards of architectural values by leading the Chapter to confer Annual Honor Awards to its members for executed work.

He added dignity to the public image of the profession by having the Chapter promote the use of uniform project signs identifying the project architect and stressing membership in the Institute.

He forged a bond of professional fellowship and heightened the public image of the profession by inducing the Chapter to hold an annual formal banquet for the inauguration of officers, the reception of newly registered architects and the conferment of Honor Awards and the Pan-Pacific Citation.

All of the above activities were innovations, milestones of Hawaii's professional growth, first introduced by the nominee then patiently and carefully administered by him until they became part of the Chapter's tradition. By his individual efforts he has infused new life into the activities of our membership.

The nominee has exerted considerable influence as a public speaker and writer. He delivered a memorable address of the Influence of Climate on Architecture at the Pacific Rim Conference of the California Council in Honolulu. He spoke with impact to a public audience at the University of Hawaii on the occasion of the Centennial Celebration of the American Institute of Architects. He authored a brilliant and penetrating analysis of regional influences on design in his "Hawaiian Residential Architecture" published by the Bishop Museum in 1954.

He has occupied all of the offices of the Chapter and at one time or another has chaired most of its committees. What is more important is that he has brought to each of these activities an outstandingly inspired service and has thus established new standards for these posts.

Aside from the Gold Medal, which may be presented to a single architect from any part of the world, Fellowship is the highest honor the Institute can bestow on its members.

Seckel, of 2015 Ala Wai Blvd., was elevated to Fellowship for his distinguished service to the profession of architecture.

The 82 new Fellows bring the number of Institute members using the letters FAIA after their names to 762. There are now 7 architects from Hawaii who hold this distinction.

Investiture of the new Fellows will take place at the annual banquet and ball Thursday, May 18, climaxing the 99th annual convention of the Institute to be held in New York City beginning May 14.

Seckel, 60, in private practice in Honolulu since 1950, was born and educated in New York and Paris. He attended Columbia University, and graduated from the Ecole National Superieure des Beaux-Arts.

The architect has designed numerous residences in the Honolulu area, and has written a book "Hawaiian Residential Architecture" based on these experiences. He is also credited with the design for Manoa Recreation Center.

A member of AIA since 1939, Seckel has held every office of the Hawaii Chapter and has chaired most of its committees. He has been cited by colleagues for inspired service in each of these activities.

Seckel is attributed by his chapter as having significantly elevated the public image of architecture, and he has created a public awareness of the work of architects by having the Hawaii Chapter establish an annual House Tour, opening Hawaii's best designed residences to visitors.
