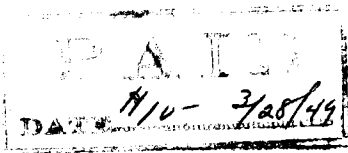

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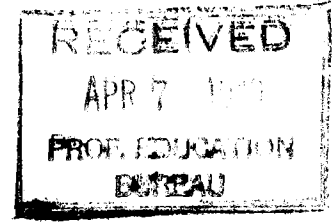



Irving Seelig, senior partner of Irving Seelig & Son, architects and engineers of 153 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, died Tuesday in Hollywood, Fla. He was 73 years old and lived at 854 East Broadway Long Beach, L. I.

Mr. Seelig was born in Brooklyn. He graduated from the Columbia University School of Architecture and served as a first lieutenant in the Army in World War I.

He had been president of the Brooklyn Society of Architects and vice president of the state association.

Surviving are his widow, Selma; two sons, Burton, an architect, and Dr. Jakob Seelig, an engineer; a brother, a sister and three grandchildren.

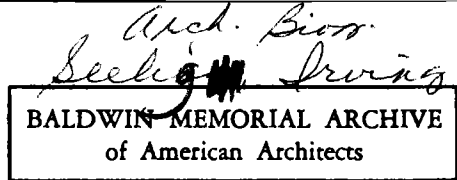
