



This will acknowledge receipt of the application of Mr. George W. Seaman for readmission to membership in The Institute and the Central New York Chapter, together with his check for \$10.00 and the Favorable Recommendation of the Chapter.

Mr. Seaman's membership in The Institute terminated on December 31, 1935 for the non-payment of Institute dues. He owed dues as follows: \$25.00 for 1931-1933, \$15.00 for 1934, and \$15.00 for 1935, making a total of \$55.00.

As you know, under the by-laws a former member may not be reinstated while he is indebted to The Institute or any of its chapters. When such former members apply for readmission, they must pay for back dues unless such dues are remitted by action of The Board.

In unusual circumstances, and upon recommendation of the chapter, The Board often is agreeable to the remission of back dues, provided the chapter remits any dues for the chapter for a like period; and provided the former member applies for readmission.

Also, former members are not entitled to the reduced dues now in effect for new members, and their applications for readmission must be accompanied by payment of \$25.00 - \$5.00 for the admission fee and \$20.00 for the current year's dues - in advance.

Your letter of May 12th received, and it is my pleasure to report that the Executive Committee of the Chapter has reported in favor of the remission of the dues in arrears of applicant George W. Seaman, of Syracuse, New York. While the voting was favorable, it was not unanimous; there being one decending vote.

I might add in passing that there seems to be some opposition among the Syracuse group on the letting down of the bars for admission or readmission to The Institute on new and old members. This has shown up in the name of Miss Marjorie Wright, whose application is now pending in Washington. Miss Wright's application was voted upon and approved in a regular executive session. There was some opposition based on the grounds that she is not registered. President Wassdorp brought to the attention of the Executive Committee at that time your letter of April 17th.

I personally regret this attitude as it does not appear to be to the good interests of The Institute, particularly as efforts are made to increase the membership, and it also hurts the Unification problem.


