Edward P. Simon, widely known architect and former Federal Housing Administrator for Eastern Penn-

sylvania, died yesterday at his summer home in Brant Beach, N. J. He was 71.

Mr. Simon designed the Municipal Stadium in South Philadelphia and the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Bullding, in addition to other central city structures, He was

graduated from Central High School in 1896 and four years later from Drexel Institute of Technology, where he was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Science and Commerce for outstanding contributions to his orofession.

Mr. Six on received additional training in architecture and engineering in the offices of Dull and Coates. In 1903 he began his career as a member of the firm of Caldwell and Simon.

His other works include the 69th Street Terminal, Drexel Institute of Technology, Van Rensselaer Dormitory for Women, Curtis Hall of Engineering, the Meade Memorial at Washington, D. C.; the First Camden National Bank and Trust Co. building, Camden, N. J., and the office building of the Baldwin Locomotive Works at Eddystone. During his lifetime he designed buildings valued at more than \$150,000,000.

He served as trustee of Drexel Institute since 1927; was a member of the executive committee; chairman of the committee on buildings and grounds, and chairman of the committee on library, museum and art gallery.

He also acted as consultant at Eaglesville Sanatorium, St. Luke's and Children's Medical Center and St. Luke's Hospital, in Bethlehem,

Mr. Simon was a Mason and a member of the American Institute of Architects, Architectural League of New York, the American Society of Professional Engineers, and the Pennsylvania and New Jersey Societies of Architects. He lived at the Sheraton Hotel.
