

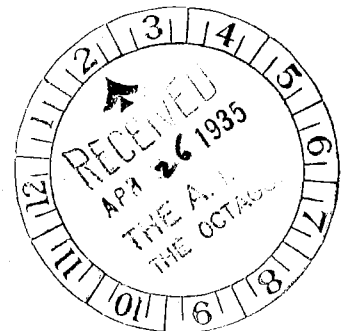

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

1. Heyward Singley became a member of the South Carolina Chapter of the Institute in 1935 at a time when the Chapter was in a weak and struggling condition and ever since has devoted much of his abundant energy and enthusiasm to its continued expansion and usefulness to the profession in this state.

He has served for many years on the Executive Committee of the Chapter, As Secretary-Treasurer 1939-1940, as President 1941-46, all during World War II when the most active members were away on military service and a greater burden was placed on the president to keep the Chapter operating.

He has served as a member of the State Board of Architectural Examiners from 1939 through 1954 and as Chairman of the Board 1952-1954. This was much more than routine service as considerable effort and initiative was required to secure the appointments of qualified members. This was accomplished and the standards of the Examinations constantly raised.

In 1947 he served as Professional Advisor for the Mayor and City Council of Charleston in conducting a competition for the design of the Terminal Building for the Municipal Airport. This was one of the rare instances in this state where public work was awarded through an A.I.A. sponsored competition.

At the present time he is serving on the National Joint Cooperative Committee of the A.I.A. and the A.G.C and has accomplished much in maintaining a well adjusted working relationship between the Architects and the Building Industry in this state.

He is generally well liked, but uses his popularity for the good of his profession.

He was one of the two "founders" who twenty years ago took an atrophied chapter and brought it up to a very live chapter which is responsible for having improved the status of our profession in the state. Mr. Singley has spent many days in the legislature in behalf of the profession and has been a force on the Board of Registration.





Gentlemen:

The South Carolina Chapter experienced a "time of troubles" from about 1925 to 1929. Officers failed to call meetings and members lost interest in the organization. Business competition became ruthless and bitter. A few stubborn spirits devoted to the Institute and the honor of their state struggled on as a mere corporals guard. In 1934 we discovered a few young architects just starting their practice in rural communities. With these juniors a new Chapter was eventually organized free from old antagonisms and with the optimism of youth. One of the most spirited of these young men who became a member of the Institute in 1935 was Heyward S. Singley. Heyward always radiated good nature and people liked him before he cracked his teeth. He served the Chapter as Secretary-Treasurer from 1939 to 1940 and as President 1941 - 1946. No one ever possessed a more intuitive sense of good public relations nor exercised it in a more needy cause than for our struggling chapter.

As a member of the State Board of Architectural Examiners he exerted himself to push this body out of the deep rut in which it was mired. When time came for the appointment of new members he was able to secure the ear of the governor and recommend appropriate appointments.

In the endless struggle to put some teeth into our registration law he has spent countless hours with politicians and left them better disposed towards our profession.

In some other Chapter under other circumstances Heyward Singley might have shone only as a congenial companion, but the South Carolina Chapter needed his particular gifts and abilities very urgently during a great many years and he gives his services cheerfully and with great effectiveness. Today this Chapter is an unusually friendly and harmonious group. Something of that was imparted to them when Singley began telling them about the Institute.

In his private practice he has consistently avoided the banal and commonplace and has endeavored to serve his clients according to better standards of design than had been previously available. He has by his efforts definitely improved the status of our profession in South Carolina.
