Dear Mr. de Sibour;

I have just received a confidential communication from Mr. Kemper of the Institute advising me of the action of the Board of Directors regarding members who are delinquent in the payment of Institute dues.

It was directed that those members who, on December 31, 1925, were delinquent for more than one year be given until February 15, 1926, to make payment in full or to reach some agreement with the Treasurer as to future payment. Otherwise the Institute and Chapter membership of each delinquent coming under the resolution shall be terminated on March 1, 1926, as of December 31, 1925.

Supplementing the above statement, it is my personal opinion that termination of membership in the Institute would have an adverse effect upon any architect's status with the Allied Architects, inasmuch as membership in the Allied Architects is confined entirely to Institute members. The same may be true of any services connected with the Evening Star Model Houses activities.


Realizing that in some manner the statement of your indebtedness to the Institute has failed to come to your personal attention, I am taking the liberty of advising you of this in order that you may communicate with the Treasurer within the short time still remaining.

I apologize for not having written you about this sooner but my notification of this arrived only this morning.

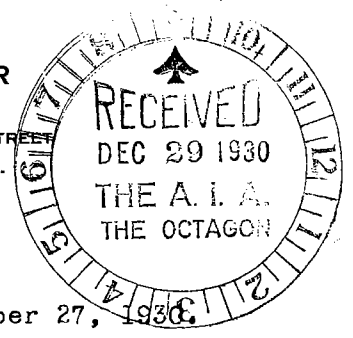
We had a very interesting chapter meeting recently and indications point to several matters of interest which will come up at future meetings.

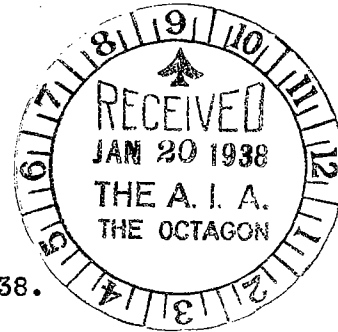

Dear Mr. de Sibour:

In response to your letter of January 19, concerning procedure for reinstatement in The Institute:

You should merely address a letter to The Secretary of The Institute requesting that you be reinstated, and transmitting a check covering any unpaid dues, and an additional amount of \$25.00 for the initiation fee (\$5.00) and one year's dues in advance (\$20.00).

According to The Institute records you owe dues in the amount of \$40.00 for the years 1936 and 1937. Therefore, your letter to The Secretary at The Octagon should be accompanied by your check in the amount of \$65.00, covering unpaid dues (\$40.00), the initiation fee (\$5.00), and one year's dues in advance (\$20.00.)

Upon receipt of such letter at The Octagon further procedure will be initiated with the Washington, D. C. Chapter and with you.

Dear Mr. de Sibour:

This will acknowledge and thank you for yours of March 8 and check for \$40.00 in payment in full for dues to The Institute for the years 1936 and 1937.

In answer to your question: We note that you are now engaged in the construction business and, we presume, on a contingent profit basis rather than on a professional fee basis.

If that is true, we doubt very much if The Board would approve of reinstatement, because one of the fundamental requirements of admission to The Institute is a professional status for the practice of the applicant.

However, we will get a more formal ruling on this point, should you desire.
