

Dear Mr. Southey:

In Mr. Baldwin's absence from the city, I am acknowledging receipt of your letter of August 26th addressed to him on the matter of publishing a brochure of your work.

As the Board of Directors on recommendations of the Judiciary Committee - whose recommendations are based on the findings of the Committee on Practice - has final action on cases involving unprofessional conduct, it is impossible to state in advance what that action might be.

I am enclosing herewith a copy of the May, 1931, issue of THE OCTAGON on page 34 of which appears an article by the Secretary which we understand covers the points raised in your letter.

You will note from the action taken by the Board of Directors, as indicated in this article, that the objection is not to an architect publishing a brochure of his work but to having that brochur supported by advertising.

For more specific advice, it is suggested that you communicate with Mr. John P. B. Sinkler, 1908 Architects Building, 17th and Sansom Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who has succeeded Mr. Abram Garfield as Chairman of the Committee on Practice.


