Although this nomination is for other categories of significant achievement, the nominee's work in research fields leading to solutions for special problems has been outstanding. General design techniques were developed during the development of the American Red Cross Communications Building which were experimental and unusual for a communications structure. Similar technical design developments were necessary in the Royal School Laboratories.

Of special significance, the nominee was responsible for the solution of a particular design challenge in the renovation and restoration of one of the McKim, Meade and White buildings on the grounds of Mr. Jefferson's University of Virginia. This work was handled with great sympathy and skill and preserves an historical building adjacent to the original Jeffersonian grounds. The nominee has been a consultant to the University on many occasions and has benefited the University with his design judgment and high level of professional competence.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

1. State fully the nominee's signal service to The Institute, his chapter, or his state organization, or to the profession, which the nominators believe has notably contributed to the advancement of the profession, and list the offices in architectural organizations occupied by the nominee and the period of each.

During 1951-53 the nominee served as President of the Virginia Chapter AIA, during which time he was personally instrumental in building up and revitalizing the chapter membership. During his period as president, he developed the Joint Cooperative Committee Program between AIA, AGC and VSPE. This committee developed a statute of limitations covering the responsibility for design and construction of buildings in the Commonwealth of Virginia. As a result of his personal efforts, the General Assembly of Virginia in February, 1964, adopted a 5-year statute of limitations covering the liability of architects, engineers and contractors on all construction project.

Following his period as president, the nominee served on chapter committees as a continuing effort. In addition to his activity with the Joint Cooperative Committee, he was Chairman of the Committee on Governmental Relations; Chapter Affairs; and Industry Relations. Through his efforts on these committees as chairman, he inaugurated many new programs between the Architects-Engineers and the construction industry. These programs have included such things as:

- a. uniformity in bidding procedures
- b. realistic deposits and refunds for drawings and specifications.
- c. a four hour bidding plan
- d. uniformity in fee charges on change orders.

The nominee has continued his activity with the Joint Cooperative Committee since its inception to date.

During the period of 1956-57 the nominee served on the National Mid-Atlantic AIA Regional Judiciary Committee. As a member of this committee, he served on important judiciary hearings covering a 2-year period. Several difficult problems involving the architects in the Mid-Atlantic region were resolved during this period.



NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

This nominee was appointed by the Judge of Corporation Court as one of a three man Board of Assessors and Appeals for the City of Charlottesville, Va. During this term of office the nominee was primarily responsible for recommendations leading to the establishment of a new municipal department for approval and assessment of real and personal property, with a citizens committee to hear appeals.

1946-56

HE WAS APPOINTED TO THE CHARLOTTESVILLE BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS BY THE JUDGE OF THE CORPORATION COURT AND SERVED AS CHAIRMAN OF THIS BOARD FOR TWO YEARS. DURING THIS PERIOD THE NOMINEE'S PROFESSIONAL TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE ENABLED HIM TO LEAD THE BOARD OF APPEALS IN ACTION WHICH PERSUADED THE CITY GOVERNMENT TO REPLACE ITS TWENTY YEAR OLD OBSOLETE ZONING CODE WITH A NEW CODE AND MAP.

1953-55

HE WAS SELECTED BY THE MAYOR AS ONE OF A SIX MAN COMMITTEE TO DRAFT A COMPLETE NEW BUILDING CODE. THIS TASK REQUIRED WEEKLY MEETINGS FOR THE FULL TWO YEAR PERIOD AND RESULTED IN THE ADOPTION OF A COMPLIANCE TYPE BUILDING CODE WHICH HAS BEEN USED EXTENSIVELY AS A REFERENCE BY OTHER MUNICIPALITIES IN VIRGINIA.

1954-56

HE WAS SELECTED BY CITY COUNCIL TO BE A MEMBER OF THE MAYOR! Housing Committee. THE DUTIES OF THIS COMMITTEE WERE TO DETER-MINE IF A NEED EXISTED FOR LOW RENT HOUSING AND IF THE NEED EXISTED COULD IT OR WOULD IT BE MET BY PRIVATE ENTERPRISE. BERS OF THIS COMMITTEE ASSEMBLED VOLUMES OF INFORMATION AS TO HOUSING CONDITIONS, AVAILABILITY AND NEEDS TO SUBSTANTIATE THAT A LOW COST HOUSING WAS AN ESSENTIAL NEED. THE NOMINEE AND TWO CON-STRUCTION MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE PREPARED DRAWINGS AND CON-STRUCTION COSTS TO PROVE TO CITY COUNCIL AND THE CITY'S CITIZENS THAT PRIVATE ENTERPRISE COULD NOT AND WOULD NOT SOLVE THE LOW COST HOUSING PROBLEM. THE WORK OF THE COMMITTEE RESULTED IN A THREE MILLION DOLLAR REDEVELOPMENT AND HOUSING PROGRAM. FIRST STAGE OF THIS PROGRAM IS NOW APPROACHING COMPLETION AND THE SECOND AND THIRD PROJECTS ARE READY TO PROCEED.

1956

Due to the nominee's interest in municipal problems and his professional experience and training, he was selected by unani-mous vote of the City Council, to fill an unexpired term on that five-man body for a two-year period.

Addendum

1958-62

He was elected by the voters to City Council for a four year term. Served as Vice-Mayor in 1958 and 1960. Appointed as Mayor for the years of 1961 and 1962. During this period the nominee served as City Council's representative on the Planning Commission.

As a member of City Council the nominee has had the opportunity to help draft and be instrumental in the adoption of new zoning code, building code and the establishment of Redevelopment and Housing Authority, all of which he had worked for in prior years as a member of various citizens committees. The nominee assisted in drafting and adoption of a municipal minimum housing standards law and was primarily responsible for the writing and adoption of the Retirement Program for City Employees.

1962

He was re-elected to City Council for a four year term, serving as Council representative on Planning Commission, Chairman of Council Legislative Committee, Chairman of Public Buildings Committee and a member of City Finance Committee.

The nominee, as a Councilman, has been individually responsible for the appointment of many local architects to city boards and committees, thereby increasing the participation of architects in civic and governmental affairs. As a member of the City Public Building Committee the nominee is responsible for the selection of architects to furnish professional services on City projects.

Relations between City of Charlottesville and University of Virginia

As mentioned in previous sections the nominee has been particularly effective in developing sound and cooperative relations between the City of Charlottesville and the University of Virginia. This has included mutual programs for the enlarged architectural development of the University and the acquisition of land, development of road systems as well as utilities services. This work on the part of the nominee has lent stature to his image as a professional architect and has enriched the community of Charlottesville and has furthered the cause of the University of Virginia.

Currently the nominee is President of the Child and Family Service Agency, Vice-President and Chairman of the Torch Club, member of the Board of Directors of the National Bank & Trust Co., Director in the Chamber of Commerce, Board Member of United Givers Fund, active in P.T.A. and Boy Scout work, and a member of the Virginia Municipal League.


