

Mr. F. Leo. Smith, member of the Columbus Chapter of The American Institute of Architects, has succeeded Mr. LeRoy E. Kern as Technical Secretary of the Structural Service Department of the Institute, The Octagon, 1741 New York Avenue, Washington, D. C.

Mr. Smith is a graduate of the Department of Architecture of Ohio State University and has had a wide experience in architectural practice and in the formulation of building legislation. For two years he served as Assistant Chief of the Division of Factory and Building Inspection of the Department of Industrial Relations of Ohio, having charge of the administration of the Ohio Building Code during that period.

From 1924 until 1929 he was employed by the State as Technical Secretary to the Ohio Board of Building Standards. This work required investigation of materials and methods of construction as regards safe and sanitary installations under the Ohio Law, inspections and reports on buildings with reference to legal requirements, and code revision and amendment covering conditions not otherwise cared for by law.

For the past two years Mr. Smith has been employed by the Portland Cement Association as Field Engineer in Northern Ohio, He is also a member of the Cleveland Engineering Society. He served as Secretary of the Ohio Plumbing Code Committee, since the creation of that committee in 1928, which was responsible for a complete new plumbing code for the State of Ohio. He was formerly a member of the Building Officials Conference of America, and Chairman of the Columbus Building Code Committee.

F. LEO SMITH DIES; F. H. A. ARCHITECT

Funeral to Be Held at Marion, Ohio, His Birthplace.

F. Leo Smith, chief architect of the technical division of the Federal Housing Administration, died yesterday at Sibley Hospital. Mr. Smith, who had been ill for only a short time, was the first executive of the F. H. A. to die since that agency was established.

Mr. Smith was 42 and a native of Marion, Ohio. In 1924 he became associated with the Ohio Board of Building Standards, and the next year was made field engineer for the Portland Cement Association, continuing in that position until 1931. Since then he had served as technical secretary of the structural service division of the American Institute of Architects, holding that position at the time of his death.

He was called to Washington in 1933 to become assistant construction engineer for the Housing Division of the Public Works Administration and continued there until the establishment of the F. H. A. in August, 1934.

Mr. Smith is credited with estab-

lishing the property standards set up by the Housing Administration.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Smith, of Marion; his wife, Mrs. Jane Smith, of the West-chester Apartments; his daughter, Saundra, and three sons, Merlyn, Robert and Richard.

The body will be taken to Marion tomorrow. Funeral services will be held in Marion under the direction of the Masonic order.

FUNERAL RITES SET IN MARION FOR F. L. SMITH

Family to Take Body to Ohio Birthplace Today; Served as Chief Architect of FHA

Accompanied by members of the family and friends, the body of F. Leo Smith, chief architect of the technical division of the Federal Housing Administration, who died after a brief illness at Sibley Hospital on Sunday, will leave Washington today for Marion, Ohio, where burial will take place.

BORN IN MARION

Born in Marion, Ohio, Mr. Smith was 42 years of age. He was the first executive of the FHA to die since that agency was established. After being associated with the Ohio Board of Building Standards in 1924, he accepted a position as field engineer for the Portland Cement Association, continuing in that position until 1931.

Mr. Smith came to Washington in 1933 to become assistant construction engineer for the Housing Division of the Public Works Administration. He was transferred to the FHA in August, 1934.

DEVISED STANDARDS

One of the outstanding achievements credited to Mr. Smith was the establishment of the property standards set up by the Housing Administration.

For the last four years he has served as technical secretary of the structural service, division of the American Institute of Architects.

Funeral services in Marion will be under direction of the Masonic order.
