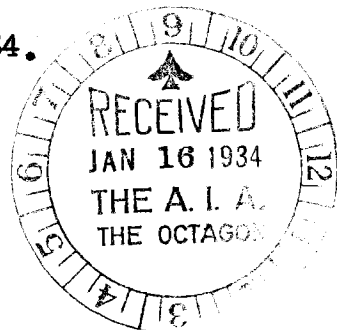

Dear Mr. Smith:

Responding to your letter of January 15th, with regard to the proposed amendment to be submitted to the Convention for the reduction of dues and the readjustment of old dues accounts:

Under this resolution we will be able to credit in full the dues accounts of members for the years 1931, 1932, and 1933, who have paid a minimum of \$25.00 for the total dues for those years.

In cases where members have paid over \$25.00 for the entire period, they will be credited on future dues accounts at the rate of \$5.00 a year until all amounts paid in excess of \$25.00 for the period 1931-1933, inclusive, have been so credited.

In cases where members have not paid a total of \$25.00 for this three year period, an additional \$5.00 will be added to each year's dues in the future, beginning with 1934, until the total of \$25.00 has been paid for back dues.

We hope this explanation of the plan will clarify the matter for you. If not, do not hesitate to write us again.
