Dear Mr. Smith:

Your letter of December 15 relating to payment of back dues was forwarded to me for reply. Letters from other members on the same subject have also been forwarded to me, and I am answering them as fast as I can find the time to do.so.I trust you will pardon my delay to yours.

Your check for \$25 in payment of 1929 dues was received on the 10th of November last. That you received a further notice putting a time limit on the balance of two years dues for which you are indebted was because the Board at its November meeting required that such notice should be given to every member who owed for the two years or more. It was with the greatest reluctance that the Board felt it necessary to take that action, but if it had not taken it at that time, another years dues would have been added on to those members, making them owe \$75, and in some cases \$100. From its experience the Board knew that to be extremely inadvisable and would result in the loss of the member, probably permanently. So the Board did what it believed was for the best interests of the individual members, and while the action can not be recalled, you may be sure that in your case it will not close the way to a restoration of your membership, without lapse and without formality.

So long as you are now indebted for only the two years, if, as you expect, you can make a payment within a few weeks your membership will be carried on The Institute record without lapse. If you are disappointed in your expected funds and cannot pay The Institute within the time you hope, and will state the circumstances to your Chapter officers, asking that you be carried through 1952, undoubtedly the Chapter and The Institute will do so, on the condition that if you liquidate the indebtedness before the end of the year you will be restored as a member without lapse, etherwise the termination of the membership will be recorded as of December 51, 1951. In the latter event the dues of 1952 will not be added, making it much easier to return. No petition for readmission will be necessary; a check or a note will be sufficient to have the record cleared. Also the Board will gladly accept the payment of the indebtedness in installments as low as \$5 a year, if that will be of help.

The only other thing that can be done is to have the delinquent dues remitted up to December 31, 1931. This can be done through the recommendation of the Chapter to The Institute, and the remissions by the Chapter of its dues for the similar period.

The Institute regrets that it ever has to terminate any memberahip and particularly for the indebtedness of the member. Especially regrettable is it when such a notice effects so many deserving members, as it must in this present period, but the Board has not so acted until it has extended the time of making dues payments long beyond the period contemplated under the By-Laws, nor has it ever failed to heed a request for leniency in any particular case and to comply with it when it could do so in fairness to the rest of the membership.

Those of us who have to act for the Board can only hope that you will understand the regret with which the action was taken, will recognise that no other course was possible, and will feel that the restoration of the membership is made as simple and easy as possible.

We shall be very glad to hear from you further on this matter.

At Mr. Baldwin's direction, I am responding to your letter of March 29th to him, with regard to your membership in the Institute.

Am sorry to say that we were obliged to terminate your membership on December 31st, under a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors at its November meeting.

That resolution was only adopted after long consideration and with much regret. The Board has been and is carrying a large number of Institute members who were indebted for two years or more on December 31, 1931.

Finally, and for the protection of the members themselves, it was decided that the memberships of those indebted for two years or more, on December 31, 1931, should be terminated so that the indebtedness would not pile up, thus making reinstatement very difficult, if not impossible.

Am sure you will appreciate the wisdom of this procedure. We have found that members who accumulate an indebtedness of \$75.00 or \$100.00 almost never some back into the Institute.

When they go out with an indebtedness of only \$50.00, the return is much simpler and easier.

The Board also authorised the Treasurer to accept notes from those former members who wished to be reinstated, and those notes, covering the indebtedness at the time of termination, may cover a period of from one to five years. If for a period greater than one year, payments will be accepted in equal installments.

The procedure for reinstatement is not complicated. If you will address a letter to the Secretary of the Institute, requesting reinstatement and attaching thereto such payment on account as you can make conveniently, with a note covering the balance - thus taking care of your indebtedness - and if that letter is sent forward through the Secretary of your Chapter with his O.K. thereon, the record is complete, except for the affirmative vote of the Board, which can be depended upon.

If you will get such a letter to this office by April 20th. the reinstatement can be acted upon by the Board at its meeting on April 22nd. We can then telegraph you and you can come to the Convention as a Delegate of the Tennessee Chapter and as an Institute Member in good standing.

We hope this suggestion will meet with your approval, and that the undersigned, and also the Treasurer of the Institute, Mr. Bergstrom, may have a chance to talk with you, personally, at the time of the Convention.

We take the liberty of sending a copy of this letter on to Mr. Furbringer, because of his very keen interest in the members and Chapters in his Division; also, to Mr. Bergstrom, the Treasurer, for the same reasons.

His interest in architectural education for the public startedwith the beginning of practice when the realization came that the (Southern) public was totally confused in architecture and the architect's place in society. On his trips to the continent in 1925 and 1926, he wrote a series of articles and sketches of European domestic architecture, which were published in the Sunday Section of the Memphis Commercial Appeal. After returning, at the suggestion of the Editor of The Commercial Appeal, C.P.J. Mooney, that the greatest good could be done

(Achievement in Literature - continued)

by applying this same treatment to our own architectural heritage of the South, he began study and sketches accompanied by necessary research in architecture of the far South. After about 10 years of gathering this information he decided to publish it all in one volume, which resulted in the publication of the book "WHITE PILLARS" in 1941.

"WHITE PILLARS", written for public consumption, attempted to set the records straight on the architectural heritage of the deep South. Its further purpose was to definitely place the evolution of the practice of architecture. The book is now in its third printing and many individuals, as well as authors of popular novels and non-fiction, say that it is widely used by them as a "family Bible."

With the book "WHITE PILLARS" establishing a basis historic background of the architectural heritage of the South, he continued research study in contemporary rural and urban community life, including its social, economic, and spiritual trends, which would bring us down to date as to our architectural development. This has enabled the author to design with a far reaching and thorough understanding of the people he attempts to serve. One example of this continued research is the enclosed pamphlet "Housing Study of Coahoma County, Mississippi."

Literary work of particular service to the architectural profession, other than its public relation, is continued under the "Achievements in Service of the Institute."







I have been away on a short vacation and this is the first time I have had a chance to acknowledge your letter of August Sth.

The A.I.A. certainly does want to have the architect's name to be published in connection with any illustrations of his work appearing in the public press or elsewhere. In some cities where excellent relations have been established between the local chapters and the press this is done as a matter of course. I think you will find that the Detroit and New York newspapers, especially the New York Times, always gives the architect due credit. In some places the relations between the profession and the press are not too good and I regret to say that we have found upon investigation that the fault lies more with the profession than with the press.

If the chapters would cultivate the editors and reporters of the local newspapers, I think they would find that the recognition would be almost automatic.

Of course, if you are able to copyright the photographs or drawings which the press uses, then the papers are legally required to publish your name. It is a very simple matter to copyright the documents, and I think the charge is still \$1.00 each. There is, however, no preventing a newspaper photographer from taking a picture of your building and using that one instead of the one you send to him.

In the special case which you cite, I suggest that possibly a letter to the editor, to be published in his paper, would be in order.

J. Frazer Smith of 1635 Peabody, one of the South's most distinguished architects, died of stroke about 7:30 yesterday morning at St. Vincent's Hospital

Mr. Smith had gone to Little Rock Friday afternoon on busi-Ress. He was found in his hotel room about 6 a.m. yesterday and taken to the hospital.

In 1952, Mr. Smith won the Modern Hospital of the Year Award for the design of LeBonheur Children's Hosiptal at Mem-

He was architect for many Memphis and Southern homes, Western State Hospital at Bolivar, Tenn. and other Tennessee hospitals.

Mr. Smith was a native of Canton, Miss. He was a graduate of the Georgia Institute of Technology. He spent a year in Europe traveling and studying architecture before opening an office at Memphis in 1921.

He wrote a book, "White Pillars," dealing with Southern antebellum architecture.

Mr. Smith was a fellow of the American Institute of Architects, a past president of the Tennessee Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and the first president of the American Architec-tural Foundation.
